The Bachelor of Fine Arts offers you immersive and experiential practice-based studio studies in nine areas of specialisation:

- Animation
- Contemporary Music
- Dance
- Film and Television
- Music Theatre
- Production
- Screenwriting
- Theatre Practice
- Visual Art.

The Bachelor of Fine Arts is designed to train highly skilled arts practitioners to work independently or in ensemble in a wide range of careers and performance or production opportunities.

Critical studies subjects build knowledge of your core discipline, and you can also choose electives in the visual and performing arts, or from other areas of study.

The Bachelor of Fine Arts is an internationally recognised qualification that allows you to successfully work in your chosen profession or continue into further study or research.

WHAT DO I STUDY?

First year

You take practical studio-based classes from first year, with a structured program of high-level skills training in your chosen discipline throughout the three years of the degree.

Second year

During second year you will have more opportunities to present your work to a wider audience as well as continuing in your studio-based classes, electives and critical studies classes.

Third year

In third year you'll enjoy a capstone experience – a public exhibition or performance which will draw together your studies and prepare you for professional work or further study.

FINE ARTS ELECTIVES

In addition to the major subjects in your chosen specialisation, you will also undertake elective subjects from other disciplines within the Bachelor of Fine Arts, or select from the wider University of Melbourne undergraduate subject offerings.



HONOURS

The Bachelor of Fine Arts Honours program introduces you to practice-led research skills and methodologies. During your honours year, you will produce a major creative work and research paper, and develop skills in devising, defining and managing a project. The program offers a direct pathway to a research higher degree, as well as equipping you to work as a professional practising artist in your chosen field.

Since 1968 our School of Film and Television graduates have been keenly sought after to work on feature-length animations, television series and short films. Many graduates also apply their animation skills to video art and installation, websites, games and educational programs.

This specialisation is based on practical exploration and development of animation screen production, and covers idea development, screenwriting, storyboarding, character design and expression, 2D, 3D, stopmotion, experimentation, motion effects, editing, the use of sound and music, and exposure to a wide range of relevant hardware and software.

In class you are challenged to respond to set problems, and pursue your own creative thinking to keep the material fresh and relevant to your own experience.

You can choose to major in one of two areas: Contemporary Music Performance or Interactive Composition.

CONTEMPORARY MUSIC MAJORS

Contemporary Music Performance

Contemporary Music Performance embraces improvisation in a diversity of music genres including jazz, world music, popular music, folk music, experimental music, electronica, crossover music, a cappella and multimedia. The program balances the development of technical skills with creativity, and encourages the development of the personal voice through contemporary performance practice and original compositions.

Interactive Composition

This major focuses on commercially driven cross-art modes of composition such as writing music for events, film, television, animation, theatre, music theatre, dance, pop music, advertising, video gaming, online sites, installation art and sound design.

As an Interactive Composition student, you will learn the skills required to develop new artistic works individually and in groups within a range of cross-media environments.

The program also offers you the opportunity to collaborate with the VCA's other creative disciplines.

HONOURS

The one-year Contemporary Music Honours program allows those that are involved in commercially driven modes of music performance, improvisation and/or interactive composition to immerse themselves in a practice-based, major creative project such as:

- A performance or installation event, and/or
- A full CD recording, and/or
- A folio of new creative work.

These projects are accompanied by a thesis.

VCA Dance offers a vibrant and stimulating atmosphere in which dancers are trained for the technical demands and creative challenges of careers in dance. The course develops technically strong, kinaesthetically aware dance artists through specialist training in contemporary dance, classical ballet, dance science and somatic practices, choreography and performance. New works by professional Australian and international choreographers provide invaluable performance experience and interaction with the dance profession.

You can choose elective subjects in dance, or from other artistic disciplines at the VCA. You can also complete University of Melbourne electives from outside of the VCA's offerings, to prepare you for other pathways such as teaching.

You have access to state-of-the art facilities including:

The VCA's School of Film and Television is Australia's premier film school. Our students and graduates receive significant industry and audience recognition on national and international stages.

As a Film and Television student you develop your creative, technical and analytical skills through lectures, workshops and masterclasses. Through production-based assignments you write, direct and edit your own work, strengthening your individual creative voice, and crew on fellow student productions, building an important practical overview while developing valuable peer networks. You are encouraged to be innovative and experimental, explore fresh ideas and develop the expertise to express ideas effectively for an audience.

In the final year you continue your studies as a director, focusing on a major production that is screened publicly as part of a graduate film screening.

You have access to state-of-the-art facilities and resources including:

- Sound stages
- Animation studios
- 90 and 220-seat cinemas
- Analogue and digital cinema cameras and audio recording kits
- HD digital vision and audio postproduction facilities.

HONOURS

The Bachelor of Fine Arts (Film and Television) Honours program is for talented students who wish to extend their creative practice and develop their research ability. It is a year-long program that introduces you to creative and theoretical research skills and methodologies.

During the course you write, direct and edit a substantive and innovative short motion picture program, or specialise in a film craft such as cinematography,

producing, production management, actor direction, sound, screenwriting or editing. You also produce a minor research thesis.

The Music Theatre specialisation is designed as an intensive, skills-building program that produces industry-ready, professional performers with a strong sense of individual expression.

You will receive extensive practical training in music theatre's principal disciplines of singing, acting and dance as individual crafts, and in combination for holistic music theatre performance. You can apply these skills in public showings from second year, with fully staged performances towards the end of the degree culminating in an industry showcase for agents, directors and producers.

Melbourne is the home of music theatre in Australia and the VCA has a strong connection to the city's thriving professional scene through studio-based training, with working artists and masterclasses from international guest teachers. The VCA is also dedicated to developing new music theatre works through its two-year New Work Music Theatre Project which will culminate in a production of a new Australian music theatre work at the VCA in 2014.

Production

The Production specialisation trains you to design, create, operate and manage in your chosen area of production.

vca.unimelb.edu.au/bfaproduction

The Production specialisation focuses on performance technology, stage management and design for performance.

Semester 1 is a broad first semester that gives students an understanding of the other Production majors and builds networks amongst the group. In Semester 2 you will begin to study subjects in your chosen major.

You will apply knowledge gained in studio classes to practical projects generated both within and beyond the VCA. Given the broad span of work within the VCA, you will have the opportunity to work in a range of capacities for our productions, including dance, theatre and music theatre as well as one-off events.

PRODUCTION MAJORS

Within the Production specialisation you apply to major in one of three areas.

Performance Technology

This major will teach you about lighting, audio and vision, electrics and software in theatre. It trains you in the practical usage of the technology as well as developing your design skills.

Stage Management

In this major, you will gain skills in stage, company and production management, and be introduced to performance technology.

Design Realisation

This major trains you in costume, props and visual communication. You will

learn the skills required to create and realise a design.

Theatre Practice

Theatre Practice is an intensive actor training program that will develop you into an autonomous actor able to interpret established texts as well as generate and perform new material.

In the first year you integrate imagination, voice and body skills and apply these in a range of performance contexts. You explore creating performance from the self and develop strategies for the interpretation of text.

The second year continues to develop your kinaesthetic and perceptual awareness in performance. You learn to work within a production process from conception through to rehearsal and performance.

By the third year you will have consolidated a working methodology as an autonomous actor. You will complete performance projects culminating in a festival of new work.

The program is taught in the VCA's specially designed Performing Arts building in Southbank, next door to the Melbourne Theatre Company. It has seven studio spaces, a studio theatre and study rooms.

HONOURS

On completion of the third year, qualified students may decide to hone their professional acting or theatremaking practice by continuing into a specialised fourth year of study in the Theatre Practice Honours program.

Visual Art offers an immersive, studio-based environment that fosters self-directed studio practice in the areas of Drawing and Printmedia, Painting, Photography or Sculpture and Spatial Practice.

The Bachelor of Fine Arts (Visual Art) is a specialist course that will help you develop practical skills and theoretical knowledge in the visual arts. From the outset, your studio projects are expected to demonstrate investigation and experimentation with a range of concepts, materials, techniques and processes. Your studies will culminate in a resolved body of artwork for inclusion in the Graduate Exhibition at the conclusion of the degree.

The VCA's School of Art provides studio and workshop facilities that offer you the opportunity to explore both traditional and new media under the guidance of some of Australia's most respected art educators and artists. All students are given a studio to work in from their first semester.

HONOURS

Honours is a year-long program that allows you to undertake advanced work in the visual arts, develop a high level of studio practice and further develop your capacity as a better informed, skilled and more articulate visual artist. During the year you produce a major creative work, or series of works, and a related research paper. The course also introduces you to practice-led research skills and develops your capacity for devising, defining and managing a major project. PREPARATION FOR YOUR MUSICAL FUTURE

The Bachelor of Music offers flexible study pathways that can be tailored to meet your interests, skills and needs in preparation for your future life in music.

You can major in one of four key areas:

- Music Performance
- Composition
- Ethnomusicology
- Musicology.

WHAT DO I STUDY?

First year

The Bachelor of Music features a performance-based first-year experience that focuses on developing music performance and applied music skills, as well as historical, contextual, theoretical and aural studies.

Second year

In second year, your focus can remain heavily performance-based or shift to areas such as composition, musicology or ethnomusicology, while retaining flexibility for you to move between majors and keeping your graduate study options open.

Third year

Third year includes a capstone subject in your chosen major as well as elective options that allow you to tailor your final year to your interests and future study and career goals. You have opportunities to spend a semester studying abroad, or to take a semesterlong work placement that will give you practical work experience and networking opportunities.

MUSIC ELECTIVES

Electives allow you to tailor your degree and complement your major.

Ensemble electives

You'll have access to one of the most extensive ensemble programs in the country, with options ranging from large to small, western to non-western, early to new music ensembles. See page 20.

Applied skills electives

These are designed to extend your musical expertise to help broaden and shape your future musical career. Subjects include Practical Anatomy for Classical Voice, Computing for Musicians, Music Technology, Art of Piano Teaching, Language and Diction (for singers), Arranging for Classical Guitar, The Operatic Aria, and Alexander Technique for Musicians.

Academic electives

The MCM offers you extensive programs in Music Performance and a wide variety of performance experiences.

Individual lessons, instrument classes and concert practice form the basis of the performance curriculum, with a strong focus on individual instrumental or vocal development together with opportunities for collaborative music-making. You will learn from highly experienced teachers who will assist you in developing your instrumental or vocal potential to the fullest.

During your studies you will participate in one of the most extensive ensemble programs in Australia, with options including the University of Melbourne Orchestra, Gamelan, Big Band, Wind Symphony, Renaissance Ensemble, World Music Choir and many other instrumental, vocal, new music and early music ensembles, as well as an extensive chamber music program.

The performance area also hosts a wide array of concerts and masterclasses given by distinguished national and international performers and teachers. You will experience many performance opportunities in the weekly instrument classes, concert practice classes and ensemble performances that occur regularly throughout the semester.

INSTRUMENT AREAS

3rass

Melbourne has been home to numerous celebrated brass players – people who have left their mark on the international brass scene. Your studies will challenge you to become the strongest and most worldly musician you can be, and you'll enjoy fantastic opportunities to work with many of the greatest brass musicians performing today. This program stands out in its philosophy and practice of group learning and camaraderie ethic, and its dedication to hands-on learning.

Guitar

Guitar at the MCM is rapidly building an international reputation. Teachers Antony Field and Ken Murray cultivate a supportive, motivating and allembracing learning environment that will help you to explore and deepen your love and appreciation of music. You will be treated to frequent visits and performances from local and international guests. Specialisation in either classical or contemporary guitar (including Brazilian) is available, and cross-over studies are encouraged.

Keyboard

The MCM's keyboard program is one of the largest and most distinguished of any tertiary music program in Australia. Individual lessons are taught by an array of international performers and teachers. Piano study at Melbourne offers an enormous range of learning and performance opportunities, nurturing individual creativity in a diverse and supportive artistic environment. Piano students take a subject in piano teaching in first year, and have the option to take a special ensemble in duo and duet playing.

Percussion

Strings

As a strings student at the MCM you will be nurtured and challenged to develop a set of performing skills that enable communication of your artistic ideals, with an emphasis on technical ease and musical understanding. During your studies you will develop techniques that improve motivation, posture, and your sense of professionalism and efficacy of practice. On graduation you will be equipped to perform and teach.

Voice

MCM voice students engage with leaders in the fields of vocal teaching and performance. The depth of experience of our staff in the areas of opera, art song and early music performance makes studying singing at the MCM a hugely rewarding experience. Many MCM students find professional singing work while studying at the MCM, and many of our graduates have found employment with Opera Australia, Victorian Opera and other companies and ensembles locally and abroad.

Woodwind

The MCM woodwind program includes regular woodwind classes covering performance of repertoire (both solo and accompanied), orchestral excerpts training and other woodwind-related topics. Composition

At the MCM, you will be equipped with the skills and insights necessary to develop your own creative voice in composition.

The Composition major encourages composition in all styles. You'll have the opportunity to work through all phases of the composition process, from first ideas, to completion of a professionally presented score, to interaction with performers in rehearsals, culminating in public performance.

You will receive individual tuition, acquiring skills in instrumental and vocal writing, orchestration, electroacoustic music, professional score presentation, rehearsal skills and concert management. You will be encouraged to develop your own personal and original voice.

The works of our Composition students are regularly performed by MCM performance students and ensembles, as well as through professional workshops and opportunities.

HONOURS

Honours is an intensive and specialised one-year program that can be taken on completion of your undergraduate degree. It provides you with enhanced knowledge and expertise to kick-start your career, or master your specialisation through a graduate degree.

During your honours year, you will further develop your compositional skills and personal voice through a deep engagement with the discipline. Diploma in Music (Practical)

The Diploma in Music (Practical) enables you to study music performance and gain a music qualification while completing an undergraduate degree in another field.

The Diploma in Music allows you to study for a music qualification alongside Bachelor of Music students, and gives you the opportunity to build valuable friendships and networks in a challenging musical environment. Studies focus on practical music, including individual instrumental or vocal tuition and both solo and ensemble music performance. Through elective subjects, you will also gain a basic contextual understanding that forms part of advanced musical training.

COURSE STRUCTURE

- Six music performance subjects
- Six applied skills electives, which include ensemble and chamber music subjects
- Two academic/music studies elective subjects

You can start your diploma in first year under a three or four-year enrolment mode, or in second year under a four-year enrolment mode. Most diploma students begin in first year, enabling completion of both diploma and bachelors degree in three years.

In the three-year enrolment mode, you will undertake an expanded study load each semester, with the practical component of the diploma. You will also take your two academic/music studies elective subjects within the breadth component of your main degree, which will then be cross-credited, HECS-free, to your diploma.

The four-year enrolment mode, with both your main degree and diploma structured over four years, allows you to undertake a standard study load each semester, and also facilitates entry to the diploma in your second year.

Student advisers can assist you with choosing your enrolment mode and study plan options.

PREREQUISITES

Entry is by audition, usually held in early February. For your audition to be at a competitive standard, it is recommended that the repertoire you perform be at the equivalent standard of Grade 7 AMEB (Grade 8 ABRSM) on your instrument or Grade 5 AMEB for voice. (AMEB exams

are not a prerequisite for entry, just an indicator to guide your selection of audition repertoire.)

You should prepare a 15-minute audition program of two to three pieces, chosen from western art music repertoire (except for contemporary guitar) and demonstrating contrasting style, period and composer.

AVAILABLE TO:

Students enrolled in Arts, Biomedicine, Commerce, Environments and Science.

Please note: Bachelor of Fine Arts and Bachelor of Music students are not eligible to enrol in the Diploma in Music (Practical).

APPLICATIONS

Applications can be made as soon as you have been accepted into your undergraduate degree and close on 31 January.



Subjects vary from those requiring no prior knowledge of the discipline, through to those needing extensive experience. Some are delivered through a traditional lecture-based format, while others have a practical focus and give you hands-on experience.

MUSIC

Pop Song Writing

This subject introduces the basics of song writing for the commercial music industry. You'll examine song form, lyric writing and industry requirements, and develop an original pop song.

FILM AND TELEVISION Making Movies 1

This subject introduces professional film production techniques and examines the roles of film director, writer and producer.

THEATRE

The Actor's Process

Experience the training that forms the basis of an actor's process. You'll learn to utilise action and improvisation as ways of opening up an imaginary world, practise taking on a role and learn the skill of script analysis.

For entry into the Bachelor of Music (Chancellor's Scholars Program), you must achieve an ATAR/notional ATAR of 99.90 in addition to the prerequisites above and the extra requirements below.

Extra requirements

BACHELOR OF MUSIC

Entry to the Bachelor of Music is talentbased. In addition to the prerequisites above you must complete an audition and musicianship test. For your audition to be at a competitive standard, it is recommended that the repertoire you perform be at the equivalent standard of Grade 7 AMEB (Grade 8 ABRSM) on your instrument or Grade 5 AMEB for voice. You also need to confirm that your instrument is one in which tuition is available. If you are advanced on two instruments, and are unsure about which one you would like to specialise on, you are welcome to audition for both instruments. Auditions are usually held in late November and early December. Applicants from overseas, interstate or regional Victoria may submit an audition recording in DVD/video format.

Audition

You should prepare three pieces demonstrating your skill on the instrument you wish to study. The pieces should be of contrasting styles and periods, and the audition program should be no longer than 20 minutes. Works should be chosen from western art music repertoire (except for contemporary guitar). A sample program might include works from the Baroque, Romantic and 20th century repertoires. Percussionists have specific audition requirements, which will be advised ahead of the audition. You may also be asked to demonstrate some technical work (scales, arpeggios, etc). The audition panel will not hear the entire program and will make a selection from the works prepared.

Musicianship test

All students applying for entry into the Bachelor of Music are required to sit a musicianship test, to assess aural and theory skills. The test is held during the audition period and preparation is not required.

BACHELOR OF FINE ARTS

Entry to the Bachelor of Fine Arts is talent-based. In addition to the prerequisite subjects above, each specialisation has specific entry requirements as detailed below.

Animation

The selection process involves a test and, if you are shortlisted, an interview. The selection test requires you to complete a written story outline for a short animated film and a series of images that tell a story. You will be given a choice of three topics and have approximately one month to complete it. Following assessment of the test, shortlisted applicants will attend an interview where you will be encouraged to bring examples of your creative output – ideally a short animation video or film (of five to seven minutes maximum). Interviews are conducted in late November.

Contemporary Music

Contemporary Music Performance

You must perform two pieces demonstrating your skills as an improvising performer. The repertoire must consist of a work from the set list, and a second choice from the following options (must contrast in style from chosen set list work):

- An original work (a piece composed by you), or
- A work from other traditions, or
- A popular contemporary work.

You must also submit a 100-word statement outlining your musical goals.

In addition, you will be asked to demonstrate your knowledge of intervals, chords, chord symbols, scales, arpeggios, and sight reading ability.

Demonstration of creativity and improvisation skills is essential to gain entrance into this major. All performed works must include an improvised solo – that is, you must improvise over and with chosen repertoire, not simply perform the chosen works as scored.

Interactive Composition

You must provide a folio containing three or four of your original compositions. This can include original music of any style including pop music, concert music, band music, laptop performance, hip hop rapping, music theatre, film music or music composed for dance, games, advertising or web use. You must include a notated score for at least one of your original compositions. The folio will be evaluated on your level of compositional craft, creativity and suitability for interactive composition. During the audition you will also be required to perform one of your own works (approximately three minutes in duration). This can be instrumental, vocal and/or electronic such as a laptop performance or DJ mixing. In addition, you will complete a creative task, which will be distributed and completed at the audition.

Dance

The selection process includes an audition for all applicants and an interview for selected applicants. The audition involves a ballet class and a contemporary dance class including improvisation. Auditions are usually held in October in Melbourne, Sydney and Canberra. Please visit the website for audition dates and locations. If you are unable to attend an audition, you can submit a DVD following the guidelines set out on the VCA website. Prior training in contemporary dance and/or ballet is highly recommended. Audition preparation workshops are available prior to auditions.

Film and Television

Production

Applicants must submit a CV, recent letter(s) of recommendation, list of production or technical skills and a 500word statement to support selection of your major. All applicants will attend a short interview, in which you will be asked to discuss your production ideas for a play or a musical, selected in advance from a list on the VCA website. You are encouraged to bring items that support your ideas, for example a

prompt copy, costume or set design or a lighting plan, as well as other support material that demonstrates your major area of interest in production. Successful applicants will then progress to the workshop stage, which involves discussion of a script and group interaction responding to a series of questions. Interviews are held in early December in Melbourne and mid November in Sydney.

Screenwriting

Theatre Practice

For the initial audition you must prepare two pieces: a Shakespeare monologue and a devised performance. The Shakespeare monologue is selected from the list set out on the VCA website and it must be learnt, not read. The three-minute devised performance is to be created following the instructions set out on the VCA website. You are required to present both your Shakespeare monologue and devised performance in an initial audition. There is also a call-back audition, interview and/or workshop for selected applicants. AUDITION/INTERVIEW FEES

Applicants applying through VTAC for the Bachelor of Music or Bachelor of Fine Arts are required to pay an audition/interview fee of AU\$65. This is in addition to the VTAC application fee. Applicants who apply for both programs, or for more than one Fine Arts specialisation, are required to pay a separate AU\$65 fee for each application submitted.

Please note: Application fees are waived for current Healthcare card holders.

TUITION FEES

Domestic students

All domestic undergraduate students are enrolled in a Commonwealth Supported Place (CSP), subsidised by the Australian Government.

International students

Tuition fees are charged for each year that you are enrolled. You will pay tuition fees according to your specific enrolment in any given semester.
