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

As Principal I would like to welcome you to the University of Aberdeen's Prospectus for Postgraduate Courses and Programmes in 2012/2013. Since 1495 the University of Aberdeen has been respected the world over for the high quality of its teaching and research but never more so than today. All the available indicators of teaching, student satisfaction and research place Aberdeen in the highest echelon of UK universities and one where both teaching and research are valued equally.

In the most recent UK wide Research Assessment Exercise around 90% of the research conducted at Aberdeen was of international quality. At Aberdeen you will be joining a vibrant and stimulating scholarly community where teaching is informed by staff who are engaged in world leading research. The University is equally committed to providing you with the very best in support services and facilities. In recent years over £170 million has been spent on new facilities for students with a further £270 million of investment underway. Two examples of the kind of world-class facilities you will find are the newly opened Olympic standard Aberdeen Sports Village and our new Library which opened in September 2011

As well as giving students a wonderful educational experience, the records show that after leaving Aberdeen our graduates are highly sought after by employers. In the past few years we were one of the first universities in Britain to redesign our curriculum in partnership with students and employers to ensure that Aberdeen graduates are equipped to face the challenges of the 21st century.

Choosing a university is a very important decision. I myself recently made the decision to join Aberdeen as Principal. I did so because I was inspired by the story of a university that for over five centuries had made an impact on the world and which had enabled people to fulfil their academic potential. 

The University is founded by William Elphinstone, Bishop of Aberdeen and Chancellor of Scotland, with the ambition "...to found a university, which would be open to all and dedicated to the pursuit of truth in the service of others". The University of Aberdeen becomes the UK's fifth oldest university.

The University opens with 36 staff and students, having eight years earlier boasted the first chair of medicine in the English-speaking world. The University embraces all the known branches of learning - Arts, Theology, and Canon and Civil Law.

The University opens all Faculties to women and in 1894 the first 20 matriculated female students begin their studies. Four women graduate in Arts in 1898; by the following year, women make up a quarter of the Faculty.

The University launches its ambitious fundraising campaign with the aim of raising £150 million to mark the start of the University's sixth century of existence.

In 2004 this continues with a £9 million investment programme to appoint exceptional academics to the University, thereby strengthening the intellectual capital of the institution.



The Institute of Medical Sciences at the Foresterhill campus is completed. The custom-built Institute provides state-of-the-art facilities for medical researchers and their students.

Six years on, the Suttie Centre, the new training centre at the heart of the academic and hospital campus, opens for the modern teaching of anatomy linked to other medically-related sciences. The University celebrates 500 years of teaching and learning and The Old Town House on King's College campus is transformed to become a visitor gateway to the University and Old Aberdeen.

An £8 million renovation project sees the enhancement of student facilities on campus. 'The Hub' boasts a superb range of services, including dining, retail and drop-in centres for the student community.

The University's first-class sports and leisure facilities are further boosted by the opening of the newly developed Aberdeen Sports Village, a £28 million Olympic standard sports centre highlighting the University's commitment to sustaining sporting excellence.

As a continuing part of the University's investment on infrastructure and facilities, 2011 saw our new £57 million Library complete. The Library is a major intellectual and cultural learning centre for students in the 21st century.





History & Excellence

Leading in the 15th Century

The University of Aberdeen is Scotland's third oldest university, founded in 1495 as Columbus was opening up the New World and the Renaissance was spreading throughout Europe.

William Elphinstone, Bishop of Aberdeen and Chancellor of Scotland, established King's College to train doctors, teachers and clergy for the communities of northern Scotland, and lawyers and administrators to serve the Scotlish Crown. This fledgling university boasted, from 1497, the first chair of medicine in the English-speaking world.

Picturesque and historic Old Aberdeen - home of Elphinstone's original foundation - is now the main University site. The 15th century remains very much alive in King's College Chapel, which is still in regular use, offering an oasis of peace, beauty and a sense of history in the daily life of a university now focused on the needs of the new millennium.

Leading in the 21st Century

The University of Aberdeen, with over 500 years of achievement behind it, has survived because it has responded to changing times. The University is renowned for its historical continuity, richness and diversity, while maintaining a modern and dynamic approach to serving the needs of the 21st century.

As you would expect of a university dedicated to excellence in teaching and learning, you will be taught by people who are at the forefront of research in their particular fields. In the most recent Research Assessment Exercise (RAE), 89% of Aberdeen's research activity was assessed to be of international quality and 55% world-leading or internationally excellent.

Innovation and Excellence

Five Nobel Prizes have been awarded for work carried out or begun at Aberdeen - Frederick Soddy (Chemistry), Richard LM Synge (Chemistry), Sir George Paget Thomson (Physics) and JJR McLeod (Medicine) - McLeod being jointly credited with the invention of the life-saver insulin.

Lord Boyd Orr, first Director of the Rowett Institute and Professor of Agriculture from 1942-45, was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in recognition of his contribution to the worldwide fight against hunger.

Aberdeen has a tradition of innovation and distinction in the medical sciences. A key role was played in the invention of Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) and the discovery of enkephalins, both of great importance. Major advances in surgery, obstetrics and tropical medicine are also associated with the University.

The University is continuing to fulfil its mission to 'maintain and enhance its distinctive contribution to society in a regional, national and international context' through its programmes of education and professional training, by fostering 'the disinterested pursuit and dissemination of scholarship' and by promoting excellent research programmes. Graduates of the University have influenced the politics, culture and education of all corners of the globe. Today, this tradition continues as students coming to study and live in Aberdeen return to their own communities, enlightened and empowered by what they have learned at this highly successful institution.

A Choice Environment

At Aberdeen you will find ancient buildings side by side with modern, newly refurbished, first-class laboratories, excellent computing facilities and the latest library technology. The student population, which has almost equal numbers of men and women, has a lively sense of community and belonging. Social and sporting facilities are outstanding, and the University is situated close to superb countryside and coast, with hillwalking, mountaineering and canoeing, as well as a cosmopolitan city centre - all in an area rich in historic and natural interest, boasting some of the most dramatic scenery in Scotland.

The College of Arts and Social Sciences delivers excellence in graduate education through a community of eminent scholars internationally recognised for their innovative research and intellectual reasoning. With over 400 academic members of staff, 200 postgraduate degrees and 1,900 graduate students, coming from over 100 countries, the College is a cosmopolitan environment which is popular with students from home and overseas. Whether you are joining us as a recent undergraduate, have chosen to return to study after some years, or wish to study fulltime or part-time, you will find the College a welcoming environment which caters for each individual's desire to learn.

Schools

The College of Arts and Social Sciences is comprised of six Schools: Business; Divinity, History and Philosophy; Education; Language & Literature; Law; and Social Science, all of which offer an impressive range of opportunities for graduate study.

The **Business School** is distinguished by its specialisation in topics such as Accountancy and Finance, Economics, Management and Real Estate and delivers practical leadership and intercultural skills through a range of MBA programmes. Evidence of its world leading expertise is found in the 2008

Research Assessment Exercise, a nationwide process which evaluates the quality of research in the United Kingdom. 100% of Economics research, 90% of Real Estate research and 80% of research in Business and Management (including Accountancy and Finance) were judged to be of international quality.

The School of Divinity, History and Philosophy has a thriving graduate culture with over 80 doctoral students. It is comprised of Divinity and Religious Studies, History, History of Art and Philosophy and has also fostered the development of the Centre for the Study of Spirituality, Health and Disability and the Centre for Scandinavian Studies, among others. It is also a major contributor to the Research Institute of Irish and Scottish Studies and the Centre for Early Modern Studies. The School's excellence in research is particularly evident from the 2008 Research Assessment Exercise, where the Divinity and Religious Studies discipline was ranked first in the United Kingdom with 80% of its research activity rated as world-leading or internationally excellent and where History was ranked first in Scotland.

With a history of teacher education which can be traced back to 1873, the **School of Education** has an impressive pedigree in

the initial professional training of teachers and a commitment to research-led teaching in the context of 21st century needs. As such the School has a portfolio of externally funded major research projects of national and international significance including the Scottish Teachers for a New Era initiative and the Inclusive Practice Project. Research activity within the School is enhanced substantially through the provision of postgraduate degrees at MEd, MPhil and PhD levels, degrees in Music and through other extremely active research centres which focus on music, human traditions, the well-being and development of children, and the development of integrated provision of children, young people and their families. The College was particularly proud of the inclusion of Ubi Caritas by one of the School's lecturers, Dr Paul Mealor, in the wedding of Prince William and the Duchess of Cambridge.

The School of Language & Literature, whose English Language & Literature discipline had 65% of its research rated as world-leading or internationally excellent, leads the way in Celtic, English, Film and Visual Culture, Linguistics, and Modern Languages (with French ranked first in Scotland).

The School is also home to the **Centre for Modern Thought**, established in 2005 in order to foster dynamic and theoretically informed cross-disciplinary research, and is also a significant contributor to the **Research Institute of Irish and Scottish Studies** and the **Centre for Early Modern Studies**. As such, the School has a thriving academic community, of which students form a crucial part. The diversity of the academic disciplines in the School means that there is a diverse range of taught postgraduate programmes from which to choose from, as well as the potential for uniquely interesting PhD thesis topics.

The Law School, which has a long tradition of legal research and writing and, within its staff, has a substantial number of scholars with international reputations, is ranked first in Scotland and seventh in the UK by the Times Good University Guide. It consistently achieves excellence in student satisfaction, which is illustrated by its 95% satisfaction rate in the latest National Student Survey, one of the highest for law schools in the United Kingdom. The immensely popular taught postgraduate programme, the LLM, continues to attract top-class students from around the world (from over 20 different countries), as does the research version of the LLM and the PhD programme.

The School of Social Science completes the academic profile of the College, comprised of Anthropology, Politics and International Relations and Sociology. Anthropology, which has established Aberdeen as the principal focus, nationally and internationally, for research in the Anthropology of the North, contributes to the College's research and teaching excellence with unique links to ethnology and cultural history. Politics and International Relations, at the forefront of contemporary issues, offers a growing range of postgraduate courses including taught and research degree programmes, while Sociology, with 55% of its research rated as world-leading or internationally excellent and ranked third in Scotland by the Times Good University Guide, provides a wide choice of postgraduate study options in some of the most thought-provoking topics available. Finally, the Centre for Gender Studies, with its exclusive MSc in Sex, Gender and Violence: Contemporary Critical Approaches, contributes further to the vibrant intellectual profile of the School.

Programmes

The College of Arts & Social Sciences has a broad portfolio of taught and research postgraduate degrees. Taught programmes include the Master of Education (MEd); Master of Laws (LLM); Master of Letters (MLitt); Master of Science (MSc) and Master of Theology (MTh). Research programmes include the one-year Master by Research (MRes) and Master of Laws by Research (LLM), the two-year Master of Philosophy (MPhil) and the three-year Doctor of Philosophy (PhD). Intensive taught programmes of study include the much sought-after Master of Business Administration (MBA), which can also be taken as a Postgraduate Certificate (PgCert) or a Postgraduate Diploma (PgDip), the Professional Graduate Diploma in Education (PGDE) where one can specialise in either Primary or Secondary Education, plus the Diploma in Legal Practice (DLP).

In addition to its September intake, the College also offers some programmes for January admission.

The College continually reviews and develops its portfolio of Masters programmes to suit the needs of today's graduates. Many programmes are interdisciplinary and provide graduates with the opportunity to acquire knowledge and develop skills in distinctly different areas, such as the LLM in International Law and Globalisation, the MLitt in Art and Business, the MRes in Social Anthropology, Ethnology and Cultural History, and the MSc in Management, Economics & International Relations. Recent additions include programmes in: Design Anthropology; International Relations; Latin American Studies; Management, Economics & International Relations; Management, Enterprise & Innovation; Scandinavian Studies; Sex, Gender and Violence: Contemporary Critical Approaches; and Studies in Mindfulness.

At the postgraduate research level, the College promotes excellent research in all its disciplines and provides a framework in which multidisciplinary research can flourish. The College has many unique and prestigious research centres including the Research Institute of Irish and Scottish Studies, the Elphinstone Institute for the Study of Human Traditions, the Centre for Modern Thought, and the Centre for the Novel, all of which contribute to its intellectual strength. According to the 2010 QS-World University Rankings, the University of Aberdeen is rated 117th in the world and in terms of Research Power is ranked 29th in Britain and 3rd in Scotland.

Based on the nationwide 2008 Research Assessment Exercise, the Guardian ranked nine Departments and disciplines in the College of Arts and Social Sciences in the British top 20, including:

- Divinity & Religious Studies ranked first
- French ranked fifth
- Anthropology ranked 11th
- History and Sociology both ranked 14th

14 Departments and disciplines were rated in Scotland's top five, including:

- French, History and Divinity & Religious Studies - all ranked first in Scotland
- Anthropology and Sociology both ranked second

The College wishes to contribute further to the success of the University of Aberdeen and as such it wants to attract the best research students from across the globe.

The Graduate School: A Central Focus

The students of the Graduate School are a significant part of the College. As a group of over 1,000 postgraduate students, they comprise about 1 in 6 of the students in the College and account for half the University's postgraduate population. The most important role for the Graduate School is to support students, their supervisors and the wider academic community in striving to ensure the success of every student's postgraduate programme from application, through funding allocation to registration and, finally, graduation.

Training and Support to Enhance Employability

The College actively contributes to the Skills for Research Excellence programme which has been designed for postgraduate research students at the University of Aberdeen. The programme includes courses which are designed to help maximise generic and employability skills as well as those designed to develop skills specific to different academic areas. These academic areas also provide the opportunity for students to effectively engage with their own subject speciality in order to foster dynamic and informed academic debate. In an informal setting, students and staff present research findings and preliminary academic papers, thereby preparing students for presentation at national and international conferences.

Excellent Facilities and Resources

The College aims to create an environment conducive to the highest quality teaching and research. Consequently, the College endeavours to provide all doctoral students with their own dedicated workspace, complete with a personal computer. Hot desk facilities may be available to students who are pursuing a Masters by Research.

Students have access to an excellent library and electronic management system, both of which improved even further with the 2011 opening of the new University Library. At present, the University's Historic Libraries and Archive Section has in its care about 150,000 pre-1840 books, special named collections such as the outstanding MacBean Jacobite Collection, the Lewis Collection of Barth Literature and the Biesenthal, Daube and Burghart Collections, some 3,000 manuscript collections and substantial regional and University archives. These collections are of exceptional value and interest and offer almost limitless possibilities for those who wish to pursue a research degree.

The Graduate School of the College of Life Sciences & Medicine supports all postgraduate students in the College. Working within a culture of excellence, the Graduate School is committed to promoting the dynamic link between its teaching and research. It provides a supportive environment that works to the highest standards to promote postgraduate research and scholarship across the academic disciplines within the College.

As a new postgraduate student in Life Sciences & Medicine, you will join a friendly and lively community. There are around 250 MSc postgraduates and 350 postgraduate researchers, who make a vital contribution to the activities of the College.

The College has major research facilities required for modern molecular and cell biology, biological sciences, psychology, biomedical sciences, medical and health services research. There are a wide range of specialist core facilities that support research (e.g. microscopy, DNA synthesis and sequencing, protein characterisation, mass spectrometry, proteomics, flowcytometry and cell culture).

Individual research laboratories are well supported and are equipped to an exceptional standard with state-of-the-art equipment and computing facilities. There are also extensive opportunities for field-based work in the UK and overseas, including research in the College's field centres at Ocean Lab and Cromarty. School of Biological Sciences

The School is formed from the Departments of Agriculture & Forestry, Plant & Soil Science and Zoology. It is situated in Old Aberdeen in the Zoology and Cruickshank Buildings, linked by the Cruickshank Botanical Gardens. The School has a unique relationship with several local renowned research institutes, which affords excellent opportunities to undertake collaborative research at institutes such as the James Hutton Research Institute (formerly Macaulay Land Use Research Institute and Scottish Crop Research Institute) and Marine Scotland, Aberdeen.

Research focussing on addressing the fundamental biological consequences of environmental change is organised within the Institute of Biological and Environmental Sciences.

The recent appointment of Professor David Salt, whose research expertise is in the function of the genes and gene networks that regulate plant ionome, will enhance the School's research portfolio.

Research themes include: **Biological Interactions in Soil, Ecology, Integrative Physiology.**

Schools of Medicine and Dentistry and Medical Sciences

The School of Medicine and Dentistry is home to the traditional Departments of Clinical Medicine, and the School of Medical Sciences incorporates the former Departments of Biomedical Sciences, Biomedical Physics, Bio-Engineering, and Molecular and Cell Biology. Much of the research in both schools is interdisciplinary and is organised within two research Institutes - the Institute of Applied Health Sciences (IAHS) and the Institute of Medical Sciences (IMS).

Areas of strength within the Applied Health Sciences theme include: Epidemiology and Public Health Research, Health Economics Research, Health Services Research, Medical Statistics, Nutrition, Primary Care.

Basic biomedical research is focused in the Institute of Medical Sciences, on the Foresterhill site.

Research is organised into the following research themes: Aberdeen Biomedical Imaging Centre, Musculoskeletal, Cancer Medicine, Cell and Developmental Biology, Endocannabinoid and Lipid Signalling/ ECRA, Immunology, Medical Genetics, Microbiology, Molecular Exercise Physiology, Neurobiology, Physiology and Pharmacology, Systems Biology, Translational Medicine, Vascular.

School of Psychology

The School has a well-established tradition of empirical research with specialist laboratories, including an eyewitness laboratory, a Virtual Environment Laboratory, a 3D motion analysis laboratory, and a psychophysiology laboratory. We also have access to facilities for Brain Imaging including MRI and PET.

The School collaborates with other Schools within the College, as well as links with other agencies, including NHS Trusts, universities and hospitals in mainland Europe and the USA. Commercial collaborations include the Nuclear Industry, Power Generation, Aviation, and the Offshore Oil Industry.

Research themes include: **Cognition**, **Industrial Psychology**, **Perception and Attention**, **Social Cognition**.

Rowett Institute of Nutrition and Health

The aim of the Institute is to conduct research at the forefront of life sciences and to define how nutrition can prevent disease, improve health and enhance the quality of food. The Institute's Human Nutrition Unit is a sophisticated research facility for studying the relationship between diet and health in humans.

Research programmes include: Gut health, Obesity and Metabolic Health, Lifelong Health.

Masters Programmes

The College has MSc programmes providing training in basic science, biomedical sciences, medical specialities and healthcare. Strong research strengths provide Masters programmes in subject driven areas of importance, for example, Ecology, Environmental Science, Bio-business, Drug Discovery, International Health, Human and Public Health Nutrition.

The University also has one of the largest groupings of biological and environmental scientists in Europe. Through strong industrial links, programmes in Environmental Science and Marine & Fisheries Science provide students with training that matches the needs of industry. Biomedical Masters programmes provide accredited training in medical fields and there is an element of teaching from clinical staff in the programmes offered in the Schools of Medicine and Dentistry and Medical Sciences.

The Graduate School provides support for Masters students through the delivery of innovative courses such as IT skills training, employability and Personal Development Planning (PDP).

Postgraduate Research

Research within the College is delivered through the research themes and postgraduate research opportunities are focussed within these areas. Over 90% of the College's research that was submitted in the 2008 Research Assessment Exercise was judged to be of international quality in terms of originality, significance and rigour. Furthermore, 60% of the College's submission was rated as world-leading or internationally excellent. Underpinning these results is a vibrant research environment, illustrated by a coherent research strategy, high levels of investment in new buildings and other research infrastructure. Training & Support for Research Students





The College of Physical Sciences is home to around 500 taught and 200 research postgraduate students who come together with internationally leading academic staff in an academically challenging, engaging and supportive environment. Staff and research students pursue pure and applied research which in turn drives and informs the teaching programmes.

The College is structured around the School of Engineering, the School of Natural and Computing Sciences (Chemistry, Computing Science, Mathematical Sciences and Physics) and the School of Geosciences (Archaeology, Geography & Environment, Geology & Petroleum Geology, and Spatial Planning & Rural Surveying), all of which offer outstanding opportunities for postgraduate study. The College's over-arching Graduate School provides a central point of contact for all postgraduate matters.

Postgraduate Research

Research in the College is founded on strong academic disciplines and ranges from fundamental research to applied projects, many of which are carried out in close partnership with industry. There are strong links between Departments, and a number of research areas span Departments and Schools across the College and the University. Researchers at the College consistently perform extremely well in the UK Government-led Research Assessment Exercise with the majority of the research activity within the College being judged to be either world-leading or internationally excellent.

Within this environment students have the opportunity to undertake research at a range of levels, through either full-time or part-time study. It is possible to complete an MRes (Human Geography is a recognised ESRC outlet), MSc by Research, MPhil, PhD or an EngD (a professional Engineering doctorate) through the College.

The College has a truly international perspective on its research activities, with a number of internationally renowned and internationally active staff, and an increasing number of formal international research collaborations. These include Carnegie Mellon University, the Australian Institute for Marine Science, Hong Kong University, NASA, the Directorate General for Hydrocarbons (India), the State University in Rio de Janeiro, National University of Singapore and the University of Texas Institute for Geophysics. Locally the University has a unique relationship with research institutes, including the James Hutton Institute (formerly Macaulay Land Use Research Institute). This affords excellent opportunities to undertake collaborative research.

The College is home to the £11.8 million dot.rural Digital Economy Research Hub (www.dotrural.ac.uk) which investigates how advances in digital technologies can transform rural communities, society and business. The funding from the Research Councils UK's (RCUK) Digital Economy Programme, led by the Engineering and Physical Sciences Research Council (EPSRC), is the largest single externally funded grant to be received by the University.

At a national level the College is heavily involved in the Scottish research pooling initiatives which pull together research strengths in various disciplines across Scotland, thereby encouraging and enabling collaboration with partners in other Scottish research universities. Working closely with industry, the Northern Research Partnership, one of these research pools has established the National Subsea Research Institute (NSRI), which is based within the College. The international breadth of funded research within the College includes numerous European partners, institutions in the US through the International Technology Alliance, and leading institutions in India through an initiative funded jointly by the EPSRC and DST (Indian Government).

Training & Support

As a new research student in the College you will join a friendly and active research community. You will attend an induction programme which gives you a chance to meet key individuals in the College as well as other new postgraduates. This is followed by specialist and generic research skills courses during your period of study. In addition to centrally provided postgraduate training, individual Schools organise seminar series, where students and staff make presentations of their research. Students are also encouraged to present their work at appropriate national and international conferences.

Research students normally have two supervisors, depending on the nature of their topic, and are allocated office space with computing facilities, with well-founded laboratories providing the equipment necessary for experimental work. There are also extensive opportunities for fieldwork in the UK and overseas as dictated by the nature of the research.

Postgraduate students may be invited to contribute to teaching activities by providing laboratory or tutorial assistance to undergraduate students. Training for such activities is included in the Graduate School's induction programme and the follow-up sessions on demonstrating. As well as developing teaching skills, this is a means of supplementing your income.

An excellent library provides the essential books and journals, and all students have direct access to electronic journals from their own computers. The College has its own information consultant within the library whose subject knowledge and expertise is actively available to students to provide help in making effective use of the wide range of paper and electronic resources available. As the flagship project of the second phase of our Sixth Century Campaign, the £57 million new Library (opened in 2011) is the largest capital fundraising project undertaken to date by the University and is a landmark of learning, bringing high-quality students, researchers and academics to the University to support our academic ambitions and international reputation.

Taught Programmes

The College offers a range of postgraduate programmes that appeal to those seeking a specialist programme of study or those wishing to move into a new area. With our strong industrial links, the College is able to provide programmes which meet the needs of industry while at the same time promoting the transfer of cutting-edge research outcomes.


The College offers a number of programmes which recruit students from both a wide range of undergraduate backgrounds and from none; several of our MSc programmes are taught cross-College, e.g., with the College of Life Sciences and Medicine.

Studentship Funding

Funding is available for taught and research programmes from several sources, including the Research Councils and industry. The quality of our taught programmes is demonstrated by continued support from national and international funding agencies, such as the Postgraduate Students' Allowance Scheme, Natural Environmental Research Council, Engineering and Physical Sciences Research Council and Marie Curie Fellowships, and by the high demand for our graduates from industry. Studentship opportunities are regularly advertised via the Graduate School website.

Types of Postgraduate Study

The University offers a wide range of postgraduate study opportunities across all discipline areas, with over 150 taught Masters and research degrees available.

Research Degrees

Aims

The aim of a research degree is to provide a thorough training in a particular subject area through original exploration and experimentation. The research culminates in a thesis or dissertation which sets out the conclusions of the research undertaken. Opportunities exist in all disciplines of the University to undertake supervised research at either Doctoral or Masters level.

Entrance Requirements

Candidates for the degree of PhD must normally hold either a Masters degree or a first or upper second-class Honours degree in an appropriate discipline from an approved university, or an equivalent qualification. Those with somewhat lower qualifications may be asked to register initially for a Masters degree (MLitt, MSc, MTh, LLM, MLE, MRes or MPhil); satisfactory progress may allow conversion to a PhD programme.

Attached to your application should be a preliminary research proposal that will assist us in providing you with appropriate research training.

Your proposal should indicate in which field you wish to concentrate your research. Please provide as much detail as possible, giving reasons why you wish to conduct your research in those areas and full details of any relevant research experience you have. If you have already developed ideas for your own research project please give full details, although we appreciate that many applicants will prefer to discuss this with their supervisor(s) at the start of their studies.

Structure

Students may register either for full-time or for part-time study. For a PhD, the normal study period is 36 months full-time or 60 months part-time; the equivalent figures for an MPhil are 24 and 42 months; for MLitt, MSc, MRes, MTh or LLM 12 months full-time or 24 months part-time. In special circumstances, where a candidate has undertaken postgraduate research previously and where progress on the research degree has been faster than scheduled, the minimum period for full-time candidates may be reduced to no less than 24 months for a PhD and 12 months for an MPhil, on submission of the thesis for examination. The Supervisor, Head of School and College Postgraduate Officer must fully endorse any proposal to reduce the minimum

Study may be undertaken either wholly within the University or in association with other research centres either in the UK or overseas. Students may undertake the majority of their studies off-campus (for example, to carry out their field work); regulations require that full-time students spend a minimum of six months in Aberdeen over the 36 month period of study. However, supervisor(s) may require students to spend additional periods of time in Aberdeen depending on the progress and nature of their studies. Each student is assigned at least one supervisor who is a member of the University's academic staff.

The precise focus of research is agreed between the supervisor and the student, to suit the student's particular interests and needs as much as possible. During the first year, students may be required to undertake some formal research training which is compulsory in some disciplines. Both the Colleges and the University provide continued training and support to students throughout their studies.

Throughout the research period students will be encouraged to attend specialist seminars and conferences, and will be required to give an account of their progress to staff and fellow students from time to time, at seminars within the School or College.

Progression

Progress is monitored regularly and supervisors are asked to complete official six-monthly reports. Satisfactory reports often lead to transfer from a Masters degree to a PhD. Unsatisfactory progress, however, on rare occasions, may lead to a transfer in the opposite direction from PhD to a research Masters, or a student being required to end their studies.

Assessment

Assessment for PhDs is on the basis of a thesis and oral examination. Assessment is conducted by at least two examiners, one of whom is from outside the University.

Taught Degrees

Aims

Taught degrees are intended to impart advanced knowledge or techniques in specialised aspects of subjects previously studied more generally at undergraduate level and assist in career development. Some also serve as conversion courses, enabling students to change their area of specialisation away from that of their undergraduate studies.

Entrance Requirements

The requirement for most taught Masters courses is a second-class UK Honours degree (or equivalent) in an appropriate discipline from an approved university. Both Postgraduate Admissions and the relevant School are able to provide advice on the equivalence of qualifications awarded by overseas universities.

Students may be admitted to one degree with a view to transfer to a higher degree dependent on satisfactory progress. For example, a student may be admitted to a Postgraduate Diploma with a view to transfer to MSc. In this instance the student would commence studies on the Postgraduate Diploma programme, and if satisfactory progress were made, then transfer to the MSc programme and graduate with an MSc degree.

Structure

For MLitt, MSc, LLM, MBA, MLE, MEd and MTh degrees, the normal study period is 12 months full-time. Only certain programmes are available for part-time study, and in these cases the normal study period would be 24 or 36 months part-time. For the Postgraduate Diploma, the normal study period is 9 months full-time or 18-21 months part-time, where available; for the Postgraduate Certificate, the normal study period is 4-6 months full-time.

Taught courses normally involve formal lecture and/or seminar programmes over two semesters (September - May) which are assessed by written examination and the assessment of course work (essays, practical reports, etc). In most courses the taught elements are identical for both Masters and Postgraduate Diploma students.

Progression

Students on taught courses of study (Masters, Postgraduate Diploma or Postgraduate Certificate) must satisfy the progress requirements of their specific programme and with the University's Procedures for Determining Progression and Award in modularised taught programmes (Grade Spectrum). Candidates aspiring towards a Masters degree normally have to attain higher grades in the taught elements before being permitted to progress to the dissertation/project stage.

Satisfactory progress often leads to transfer from a Postgraduate Certificate to a Postgraduate Diploma, or from a Postgraduate Diploma to a Masters degree. Unsatisfactory progress, however, on rare occasions, may lead to a transfer in the opposite direction, or a student being required to end their studies.

Assessment

The Masters degree usually concludes with a project or dissertation over the summer period (normally June - September); assessment of the dissertation can include an oral examination. The University operates a Code of Practice for postgraduate students on taught courses of study that can be accessed at www.abdn.ac.uk/registry/quality/appendix5x3.pdf

Registered Postgraduate Study

Research workers from institutions overseas or students undertaking research degrees at other institutions may visit the University for Registered Postgraduate Study for short periods, for example to learn particular experimental techniques.

Fees for Registered Postgraduate Study are charged at the normal postgraduate fee rate according to the number of months of study. Students wishing to undertake a single course within a postgraduate taught programme may apply to undertake Individual Subject Study. Fees are charged per credit.

The Admission requirements for Registered Postgraduate Study and for Individual Subject Study are the same as for the appropriate full-time research or taught programme.

Part-Time Study

Part-time study is available for all research degrees and for some taught courses. Due to British immigration regulations it is generally not available to students from outside the European Union, although the spouses of full-time international students may be allowed to register for part-time study at the part-time overseas rate of tuition fees.

Applying to Aberdeen

Applying to Aberdeen couldn't be simpler, and with a number of scholarships available across the Colleges to provide financial assistance to postgraduate students, the University will do everything it can to make your decision to apply an easy one.

When Do I Apply?

Most taught postgraduate programmes begin in mid-September. International students can apply any time from the previous September. For application deadlines please visit

www.abdn.ac.uk/postgraduate/apply

UK/EU students can apply any time from the previous September until the start of the course. For taught programmes beginning in January, applications are accepted until the end of September prior to the start of the course; UK/EU students can apply until the programme start date. In all cases, international students should consider the time required for visa application processing.

Research programmes often have flexibility to begin at any time during the academic year. Applications can be made up to 12 months in advance but preferably no later than six months before you intend to start your studies.

There is no need to complete your previous course of study or to have achieved English language qualifications before applying; we can make offers conditional upon you successfully completing a particular qualification.

How Do I Apply?

It is important when submitting an application that you have completed all the necessary sections and have enclosed all of the relevant documentation to ensure that your application can be processed as quickly as possible.

To apply you must submit:

- > A completed Postgraduate Application Form
- > Full details of your academic achievements to date (e.g. transcript, degree certificate)
- > Proof of proficiency in English is required if you are an international applicant. Visit www.abdn.ac.uk/languagecentre for details. This can be submitted at a later date but must be verified by the University prior to commencement of your studies
- > Academic References. Two references are required for research programmes. Taught programmes generally require one reference only but there are some exceptions so applicants are advised to check individual programmes for specific entry requirements
- > Some programmes require a CV but please check individual programmes for details of specific entry requirements

How is My Application Processed? Step One

You will receive an acknowledgement when the University of Aberdeen receives your application. Completed applications are then passed to the relevant School for consideration.

Step Two

After considering your application, the Head of the School to which you have applied will decide whether an offer of admission can be made. UK-based applicants for research degrees or postgraduate scholarships and those who have been out of education for a period of time may be interviewed before a decision is made.

Offers of admission may be conditional or unconditional. Under the terms of a conditional offer, applicants are requested to obtain or provide evidence of further or pending qualifications that will allow them to fully satisfy the course entry criteria. Such students may, for example, be awaiting final undergraduate degree results.

Unconditional offers may be issued directly to applicants whose qualifications fully satisfy the entry criteria of their desired postgraduate programme.

Step Three

You will be sent a decision, informing you of whether or not the University is able to offer you a place of study. Those who have been sent an offer will also receive an Acceptance Form and a Financial Guarantee Form. You must complete and return both of these forms to the Postgraduate Admissions Office as early as possible.

Once we have received these forms, applicants with unconditional offers will be 'cleared for admission'. Applicants with conditional offers will be cleared for admission after they have forwarded, to the Postgraduate Admissions Office, documents to confirm that they have met the conditions of offer.

Step Four

Once you have been 'cleared for admission', students who are commencing study in September/October* will be sent, from May onwards, a pack of joining instructions which includes information on accommodation, registration, tuition fees payment, and their student ID number, etc. All international students who declare that they require a visa to enter the UK will receive a Confirmation of Acceptance which includes a CAS number so that they may apply for a visa.

*Research students commencing study at a time other than September/October will receive their joining instructions and a CAS number (if applicable) at the equivalent time prior to the commencement of their studies.

Academic Technology Approval Scheme (ATAS)

Please note that international taught and research applicants for certain Science, Engineering or Technology disciplines require an Academic Technology Approval Scheme (ATAS) Clearance Certificate. ATAS clearance must be obtained before applying for a visa. If you need to obtain ATAS clearance, this will be indicated in the letter detailing our offer of admission. For more information, visit

Research Excellence

Academically, Aberdeen has the strength you would expect of a 500-year old university with a growing international reputation. It is among the UK's top research universities in the latest Research Assessment Exercise (RAE 2008) – a year long independent evaluation of the quality of research undertaken across Britain's universities involving peer review and international experts.

The RAE assesses the strengths of a department's, or group of departments', research activity (for example, the quality of published work, the standard of the environment and facilities where the research was conducted, measures of research grant income, etc) across a seven year period. The RAE results are shown as a 'Quality Profile' for each research area, giving the proportions of research activity awarded at each of the quality levels, with 4* the best in the world.

The definitions of the RAE 2008 quality levels, in terms of originality, significance and rigour, are:

- 4* = Quality that is world-leading
- 3* = Quality that is internationally excellent but falls short of the highest standards of excellence
- 2* = Quality that is recognised internationally
- 1* = Quality that is recognised nationally

The most recent RAE results proved a triumph for Aberdeen. They demonstrate that the University produces a significant volume of outstanding research across all our disciplines. We are the UK's top research university for Theology, Divinity and Religious Studies and equal top for Health Services Research.

- > 89% of Aberdeen's research activity is assessed as of international quality and 55% is 'world-leading' or 'internationally excellent' (4* and 3*)
- > Research activity rated as world-leading or internationally excellent was included in all our 33 submissions to the RAE
- > Almost three quarters of our staff were submitted to units where at least half of the research activity was rated as world-leading or internationally excellent (3* and 4*)
- > 11 of our research areas were ranked among the top 25% in the UK (based on the proportion of research activity judged to be world-leading and internationally excellent)


Chair in Plant & Soil Science


Glen Cayley


The Main Library offers around 1,200 study spaces, with a further 600 seats available at the other library sites. There are spaces to suit every learning style: innovative 'co-labs' for collaborative groupwork supported by plasma-screen technology; bookable discussion

rooms, flexible learning areas which can be configured to your own requirements; social spaces with comfortable chairs and sofas for when you need a break; individual carrels for more private study, and also more traditional silent study spots for when you need perfect peace and quiet.

Also on the Old Aberdeen campus, the Taylor Library and European Documentation Centre covers law with official UK and EU publications, while the Medical Library on the Foresterhill Campus covers Medicine and Medical Sciences disciplines.

In addition to our physical collections, we also connect you to a huge range of electronic resources, investing more than £2 million a year in e-resources. Our licences enable access to over 400,000 books in electronic format, millions of journal articles from top quality academic publishers and over 100 different scholarly databases and online archives. Students are able to access these resources both on and off campus so you can study at your convenience anytime, anywhere.

The Library holds a selection of frequently used texts in a separate collection on level 1 of the Library. These items are available for reference or overnight loan so you can get the texts you need quickly. Postgraduate students involved in research may be interested in borrowing essential items from other academic institutions through our Inter-library Loans Service.





Help is at Hand

As well as the helpful staff of information professionals who are available to give advice in person, we produce over 100 information guides in electronic and print formats to offer you step-by step help in using our sites, services and resources. You'll also find podcasts, vodcasts and more on our website. Our experienced and helpful team of Information Consultants deliver induction sessions and library skills talks as part of many taught postgraduate programmes. They also offer a wide range of additional information skills workshops to help you make best use of the resources we offer. These practical sessions last one hour and are held at various times throughout the day. The team is on hand to offer detailed assistance and advice on all our information resources including the library catalogue, electronic databases and reference management software, RefWorks.

Museums

As an Ancient University, we are proud of our fascinating museum collections built up over 500 years, and exceptional in their richness. A new display space, King's Museum, is now open at the heart of the Old Aberdeen campus which has an exciting exhibition and event programme featuring artefacts from the University's museum collections, including fine art, archaeology, history, ethnography, scientific instruments, zoology, geology, anatomy and pathology. The University's museum collections are amongst the largest and most important in the country and have been awarded Recognition as nationally significant. All these collections are used to support taught courses in ways not possible in most other universities, and are available for individual study, research and enjoyment. Changing displays from the collections can also be seen around the campuses.

Resources for Language Learning

Our Language Centre is open to all University of Aberdeen students. It offers a range of audio, video, computer and satellite television facilities, a materials library covering a wide range of languages, courses for students whose native language is not English and all the language learning advice and support you need, whether you are studying for a degree in languages, preparing for an exchange visit, hoping to improve your CV, or are simply fascinated by other cultures and languages.

Looking After Your Health

Full National Health Service (NHS) medical services are available to students. The Old Aberdeen Medical Practice and Old Machar Medical Practice are located close to the King's College campus and cater for the general population of the surrounding area, including the student population of the University.

Aberdeen Royal Infirmary is the city's main hospital. It is a teaching hospital with the full range of medical and surgical specialities, which can be accessed through a medical practice when appropriate.

Nursery

The campus-based Rocking Horse Nursery provides childcare for pre-school age children of students and staff. There are forty-seven full-time places available, and the nursery has three "departments" which cater for 0-2, 2-3 and 3-5 year olds respectively.

Our Obligations and Yours

Finance is essential to university life. To help with money matters, the University has a range of financial support to help assist postgraduate students throughout their period of study.

International Students

Tuition Fees

Postgraduate students classed as international for tuition fee purposes may pay the following annual tuition fees:

- > Arts-based programmes £11,000
- > Science-based programmes £14,000
- > Graduate Business School MSc programmes £11,500 £14,500
- > Graduate Business School MBA programmes £14,500
- > PgDip in Business Administration £12,100
- > PgDip in Hydrocarbon Exploration £30,000

The fee for 'Arts-based programmes' applies to non-lab based courses. This includes the majority of courses within the College of Arts and Social Sciences as well as those in Geography, and Mathematical Sciences. It excludes programmes within the Graduate Business School. Please see www.abdn.ac.uk/business/smarthinking for details of programmes offered within the Graduate Business School.

The fee for 'Science-based programmes' applies to laboratory-based courses and includes the majority of courses in the Colleges of Physical Sciences and Life Sciences & Medicine, with the exception of Clinical Medicine, Geography and Mathematical Sciences.

Certain courses do charge additional costs for field trips, training charges etc, therefore students should refer directly to **www.abdn.ac.uk/registry/tuitionfees** for further information.

Tuition Fees

Full-time Students

For 2011/12 students from within the EU pay tuition fees of £3,400 for the majority of taught courses including MSc, MLitt, LLM, MLE and MTh programmes.

Tuition fees for research degrees including PhD and Masters by Research courses are £3,600 for the majority of programmes.

Part-time Students

The part-time fee rate for taught and research postgraduate programmes is 50% of the relevant full-time fee rate for Home/EU student; for Overseas students the part-time fee rate for taught and research postgraduate programmes is 37.5% of the relevant full-time Overseas rate.

Certain courses do charge additional costs for field trips etc, therefore students should refer directly to the relevant departmental website for further information.

Primary/Secondary PGDE Students

Students from the EU studying in Scotland and studying on a PGDE Primary or Secondary Education programme DO NOT HAVE TO PAY any tuition fees. The Students Awards Agency for Scotland (SAAS) will normally pay tuition fees for EU students (with the exception of students from England, Wales and Northern Ireland) studying at an institution in Scotland, up to a maximum of £1,820 for new students.

These fees do not have to be paid back. Students must apply to SAAS, ideally by applying online at **www.saas.gov.uk**

If you accept an offer of a place for any postgraduate taught course within the Business School, you will be asked to pay a deposit to confirm your place. Cost of Living

In addition to tuition fees, students will require a further £650 per month (minimum) to cover additional costs. A married student who wishes to bring his/her family should have additional funds of at least £400 per month, per dependent.

Employment During Your Studies

Aberdeen City and Shire's buoyant local economy means there is no shortage of holiday and part-time work.

Most international students in Aberdeen can undertake up to 20 hours per week of part-time employment during term-time, and full-time hours during vacations. However, part-time employment will not be sufficient to cover fees and living expenses. Skills for Research Excellence

As a graduate of the University of Aberdeen, you will be valued both within and outside academia. We are committed to providing you with skills that will both support your research as a postgraduate research student (PhD and Masters by Research) and will also be relevant when seeking employment within and outside of academia.

Your skills training begins at your induction where we describe the support opportunities that are available for you to gain relevant skills throughout your time with us, at times that support your research project and introduce you to our Skills for Research Excellence website.

This has been designed to assist you and your supervisors in managing your skill requirements and assist in your personal development.

You will be able to choose the skills courses that best serve your needs at your current stage of your research process. For example, you will have the chance to develop your skills in areas such as presenting your research and managing your research project, through to helping you to design your CV and enhancing your interview skills.

A sample skills training programme might look like this:

Year 1: skills for early career researchers, presenting your research, working with your supervisor, time management, project managing your research project

Year 2: creativity & research, negotiation skills, writing your thesis, writing for publication

Year 3: writing your CV, interviewing skills, assessment centres

These are, of course, only a sample of the skills training available and although we recommend them in the year illustrated many are applicable across the entire postgraduate research process.

Complementing and supporting the skills training available will be a range of e-learning opportunities ranging from an online research skills course to podcasts designed to assist the impact of the "live" skills training offered.

As well as the group skills training offered there is also a variety of supportive events as well as 1-to-1 support for postgraduate research students.



International Students

A warm welcome awaits all international students at Aberdeen. Here you will find a thriving cosmopolitan community which includes 120 nationalities, making up over 20% of the student population.

The University of Aberdeen has a long tradition of welcoming both international students and staff to Aberdeen. As one of the six Ancient Universities in the UK, Aberdeen boasts tradition which is rooted in our 500 year history - but we are focused firmly on the future and are at the cutting-edge of research in many fields. Postgraduate students are attracted to Aberdeen by the quality of our courses and teaching, the research opportunities we provide and our excellent facilities.

English Language Requirements

For postgraduate study, there are two distinct English Language criteria, referred to as Postgraduate Standard and Postgraduate Higher as outlined in the table below. Postgraduate Standard refers to the English language proficiency required for entry to the majority of Postgraduate courses at the University of Aberdeen. Postgraduate Higher courses currently include all courses offered by the College of Arts and Social Science as well as MSc Oil and Gas Enterprise Management and MSc Integrated Petroleum Geoscience.

English Language Support

The University of Aberdeen offers various English Language Programmes which are provided by a team of experienced and friendly tutors at our fully-equipped Language Centre. Before the start of term, we have a number of English language courses that you can take including an English Foundation Programme and an intensive English Language Summer School, both focusing on the development of English for Academic Purposes.

We offer a 1-year English Foundation Programme from October to September each year for students whose English is below the minimum level required by the University. This course is offered full-time with a range of different entry points depending on individual needs and profiles. The course focuses on developing the four main language skills (speaking, listening, reading and writing) and also helps to expand vocabulary and develop effective self-study skills.

Summer School

The English Language Summer School runs between June and September each year and is aimed at students whose English proficiency is slightly below the level needed for direct University entry. The Summer School has two entry points depending on individual needs and profiles and consists of intensive language and skills preparation for studying at a UK university. It provides students with a solid base on which they can build their academic development.

After commencing academic studies, you will still have access to the wide range of language learning resources at the Language Centre and can sign up for in-sessional language support.

Employment After Studies



Accommodation

Living with other students can give you a great start at university. You will make new friends that will stay with you throughout your university life and beyond.

Make Yourself at Home

Aberdeen is unusual for a big city university in having most of its student accommodation within walking distance of its main teaching site. University accommodation houses approximately 2,500 students and all single, new students are guaranteed a place as long as they apply by the stated deadline. That is a real benefit compared with other universities of a similar size.

University Halls of Residence

Effective administration and a comprehensive structure of care are ensured in all the Halls. Friendly help is available from the halls management and from Student Resident Assistants (SRAs), who are usually members of the University academic staff, senior students, or mature students, and are there to assist and advise students as part of the University's commitment to student support.

Hillhead Halls are self-catered halls with single study bedrooms. They are part of a 'student village' on the north bank of the river Don overlooking Seaton Park. It is 15 minutes walk from the main campus and there is a regular bus service to the King's College campus, city centre and Foresterhill campus.

Crombie Johnston Halls are catered halls with single study bedrooms. The complex is situated in the heart of the King's College campus with a regular bus service to the city centre and Foresterhill campus (Contract for 39 weeks - meals are provided for 37 weeks, you will be required to vacate your room during the 2 week Christmas break but you will be able to leave your belongings).

Self-Catering Flats Leases of 39, 40 and 50 Weeks:

Hillhead self-catering halls consist of both flats with shared kitchen and bathroom, and flats with ensuite facilities. They are located in the student village 15 minutes walk from the main campus.

Self-catering Flats and Rooms Leases of 50 Weeks:

The Elphinstone Road and Kings Hall complex consists of single study bedrooms within flats. They are both located in the heart of the King's College campus, only a minute away from the Library and the Hub.

Other Accommodation

Students choosing not to live in a Hall of Residence - or not wishing to stay in a Hall after their first year - can choose from a wide range of alternative accommodation throughout the city. There are student lodgings available in all parts of Aberdeen - single or shared rooms, at various levels of luxury, with prices ranging accordingly. There are also private flats which many students prefer to seek out and rent, or even buy, on their own or sharing with friends. The Accommodation Office can provide a list of solicitors and estate agents on request.

Information regarding alternative accommodation can also be obtained from the Students' Association.

Frequently Asked Questions

1) Is There Special Accommodation For Postgraduates?

Yes, most halls have a postgraduate block. However, you cannot be guaranteed to be placed there, as it depends on when you apply.

2) What Kind of Accommodation Can I Apply For?

You can apply for a single study bedroom or flat, catered or self-catering, on-campus or off-campus, 39-50 week leases. The Accommodation Office aims to match your preferences as closely as possible, although it will not always be possible to offer you your first choice.

3) I Have a Family, Can I Get University Accommodation?

The University does not offer family accommodation but the Accommodation Office can help by providing a list of local solicitors and estate agents who may be able to assist in locating appropriate accommodation.

4) What are the Different Lengths of Leases?

- 39 weeks self-catering runs from mid-September to mid-June, including holiday period
- 39 weeks catered runs from mid-September to mid-June (meals provided for 37 weeks, you will be required to vacate the room during the 2 week break at Christmas but you will be able to leave your belongings)
- 40 weeks self-catering runs from mid-September to end-June including holiday period
- 50 weeks self-catering runs from mid-September to early-September, including holiday period

In general, it is better for postgraduate students to choose accommodation with a longer lease (i.e. 50 weeks) as then they do not have to move out during holiday periods.

5) When Do I Get My Application Form?

Yet, Scotland possesses a great diversity of landscapes and cultures, and cosmopolitan city living neighbours unspoilt countryside.

To many, Scotland is characterised by castles, kilts and ceilidhs, William Wallace and the works of Burns. However, Scotland's colourful cultural life creates a backdrop to its thriving arts and creative industries. For a modest sized country of just over five million, Scotland has proven to be a breeding ground for innovation and ingenuity, whilst retaining a unique cultural identity; although one of the four countries that make up the UK, Scotland possesses its own legal and educational system and, since 1999, its own devolved Parliament.

Scotland's businesses and education institutions are internationally recognised world leaders in many areas, specifically life sciences, computing and oil and gas. Higher Education in Scotland was established in the 15th century and many countries have since adopted a similar system, including the US and France. With an emphasis on independent thinking, a Scottish education encourages skills that are much sought-after by employers.

Made in Scotland

Scotland has been the birthplace for an impressive number of inventions that have changed and shaped the world we live in. For example, the television and telephone belong to the Scottish-based scientific pioneers John Logie Baird and Alexander Graham Bell, respectively; whilst in the field of medicine, penicillin, antiseptic and anaesthesia have all been discovered and developed by Scots, as well as the more recent cloning of Dolly the sheep.

Today, Scotland's research economy goes from strength to strength. Ranking as 3rd in the world – ahead of the US and Germany – in terms of research publications and citations per capita, Scotland boasts many centres of research excellence.

Arts & Culture

Scots are famous for their friendliness and zest for life and this can be seen first-hand during the year round programme of events and festivals. From the Edinburgh Fringe festival (the largest arts festival in the world) to Aberdeen's cultural engagement programme (University of Aberdeen Music Prize, Café Science Programme, Sound Festival and the Aberdeen International Youth Festival etc), through to T in the Park, one of the most critically acclaimed music events on the international festival circuit – Scotland has it all

Museums and galleries showcase a wide variety of collections whilst theatre thrives. With plenty to offer in the way of bars, clubs, restaurants and shopping, Scotland doesn't disappoint.

Religion

Like the rest of the United Kingdom, Scotland is a multi-ethnic society, where all backgrounds are welcome and all major religious denominations are represented.

Weather

Although often epitomised as cold and wet, Scotland, on the whole, has a mild climate and four very distinct seasons. On the east coast, in particular, the climate is relatively dry, cool in the summer but rarely very cold in the winter.

The Students' Association

The Aberdeen University Students' Association (AUSA) is the organisation that represents and serves your interests, and works to make your time in Aberdeen as happy and enjoyable as possible.

Advice & Services

AUSA attempts to alleviate student hardship through the provision of its services. It has an Information & Advice Centre to answer all your important questions from healthcare to bus routes and everything in between. AUSA provides a money advice service, which can help you manage your money and help keep you out of debt. The Centre provides a comprehensive resource of private accommodation which is also available online.

The AUSA Sabbatical Officers are there to help you with any problems you may have during your time at University. AUSA also hosts a comprehensive overnight support service called Niteline, which is a confidential listening and information service run by trained volunteers. AUSA runs a Joblink and Volunteering Centre with services to help you find part-time work and volunteering opportunities to enhance your CV.

Societies and Student Activities

AUSA runs over 100 societies and has divided them under the following headings to make life easier for you:

Departmental Societies – Societies relating to the various departments at the University

Cultural Societies – Societies dedicated to celebrating different world cultures

Faith Societies – Societies celebrating different world faiths

Create Change Societies – Societies dedicated to environment or political concerns

Creative Arts Societies – Societies who like to perform or create art

General Interest Societies – Societies who have a particular interest or hobby

AUSA has a plethora of activities going on at all times and run successful 'Give it a Go' sessions throughout the year. Students can take part in one-off activities on campus or try out the activities of a particular society before deciding to become a full member. All current societies hold regular events and socials which offer a fantastic opportunity to meet like-minded students.

Sporting Competition

AUSA is very proud of its sporting achievements, with many of its students actively participating in one of 56 sports clubs. Successes have been achieved in a wide variety of sports: British University medals have been won in rowing, boxing, shooting, climbing and athletics; and in team events such as volleyball, golf, fencing, rugby, and tennis. The University has an excellent record in the Granite City Challenge, where our students compete fiercely against our local rivals: Robert Gordon University. This is the largest multisports event in Aberdeen, and is supported and enjoyed by the whole city. If you don't want to compete, AUSA organises a wide range of noncompetitive clubs, intra-mural leagues and one-off sporting events.

Student Media

The University of Aberdeen has its own radio station, Aberdeen Student Radio, and is one of the only institutions in the UK with a free, weekly newspaper. This comes in the form of *Gaudie*, totally run by students, for students, which reports on news from the University and the wider world.

Aberdeen Students' Charities Campaign

Aberdeen Students' Charities Campaign is a collection of students from across Aberdeen who raise huge amounts of money for local charities through a variety of events.

Two of the largest events are the Student Show; and the Torcher Parade, the largest torch-lit parade in Europe involving around 2,000 students, 45 lorries and 50,000 spectators. The Charities' Campaign also hosts a beautiful Fashion Show and are the people responsible for providing a charitable second hand book shop called Bookends.

University Sport

Aberdeen is one of the most successful universities in Scottish and British levels of university sporting competition. The University aims to be the centre of excellence for sport in north-east Scotland, with the opening of Aberdeen Sports Village - our new £28 million sports development.

Aberdeen Sports Village

Whether a budding sports star of the future or just an occasional exerciser, it is the most exciting time in the University's history for those interested in sport, exercise and health. In summer 2009, phase 1 of a new £28 million flagship sports facility opened, in partnership with Aberdeen City Council and supported by sportscotland. These first-class sports facilities, backed up with an array of excellent services, provide the ideal venue for a range of activities, available to all students, at all levels.

Facilities in the Sports Village include:

- > Full size indoor football pitch
- Indoor athletics area (135m running straight with throwing and jumping areas)
- > Large sports hall
- > 4 squash courts (2 glass-backed)
- > Large fitness suite and performance gymnasium
- > 2 studios
- > 400 metre outdoor athletics track and stadium
- > Floodlit water based hockey pitch
- > Performance and Well-being Centre (with physiotherapy clinic)
- > Crèche, café and spectator seating

Services provided include:

- > Exercise classes that cater for a wide range of tastes and levels of ability - from novice to advanced, including lunchtime and evening classes such as aerobics, circuits, sports conditioning, boxfit, body conditioning, step and studio cycling
- > Personal advice on all aspects of fitness and training, health-related fitness, nutrition and weight management, fitness assessments, body fat analysis and 1-to-1 training

Phase 2 of the development will be to create additional artificial pitches on the site. Finally, ambitious plans are being developed for Phase 3 of the Sports Village which will have as a showpiece a 50 metre swimming pool, with 25m diving pool and health suite.

The facility will allow the North of Scotland to play an integral part in the run up to the London 2012 Olympic Games and future Commonwealth Games. It will be a training ground for elite athletes and allow sports stars of the future to achieve their full potential and compete at the highest level. Add to this a vibrant and growing Sports Union with 56 sports clubs, 3,500 members, numerous events and six intra-mural leagues and we look forward to greeting students for a sporting experience second to none.

Other Facilities

King's Pavilion and Playing Fields

The King's Pavilion contains a swimming pool and changing facilities. The attractive outdoor playing fields boast two rugby pitches, a lacrosse pitch, an artificial cricket wicket, as well as a single tennis court and three additional tennis courts, which double as a floodlit training area during winter.

Balgownie Playing Fields

Situated two miles from the King's campus in the Bridge of Don, Balgownie plays host to football and shinty teams, providing extensive pitches and changing rooms.

Hillhead Centre

Situated approximately one mile from King's campus next to the Hillhead Halls of Residence, the Hillhead Centre plays host to an exclusive stadium, grass football pitch, a full-size sanddressed synthetic pitch, and an impressive sports pavilion. We also have a boathouse on the banks of the river Dee which serves the thriving rowing club, as well as a climbing bothy in Royal Deeside.

Who Are We?

The University Sport & Exercise Team and the Sports Union work in partnership to provide sporting activities for everyone.

Sports Union

The Sports Union is responsible for the management of all aspects of the sports clubs at the University of Aberdeen. We boast the second largest number of clubs of any Scottish University and are proud to offer competitive sport aimed at beginner level all the way up to international. Most clubs compete regionally, in British University & College Sport (BUCS) and Scottish University Sport (SUS) leagues against teams from any of 150 universities.

The second main function of the Sports Union is that of sports events coordinator. We run the second largest intra-mural programme in Scotland, with leagues for students to enter and compete against other University of Aberdeen students. We currently provide rugby, six-a-side football, eleven-a-side football, squash, indoor cricket and hockey leagues. We host the Blues Ball annually with 600 guests celebrating the years sporting achievements and nationally recognised rugby, football, cricket and hockey tournaments.

One of the highlights of the sporting calendar is Superteams, a multi-discipline event which attracts over 600 participants and is designed for those wishing to enjoy a light-hearted, fun filled day of sport with a healthy element of competitiveness!

There is a friendly rivalry with Robert Gordon University (RGU), culminating in the annual university Aberdeen Asset Boat Race and Granite City Challenge, in which all University of Aberdeen teams compete against their RGU counterparts. We proudly remain unbeaten in the Granite City Challenge.

Sport & Exercise Team

Our professional team consists of highly qualified and experienced staff including sports scientists and physical education teachers. We provide excellent sporting, and health and fitness-related services for students, staff and members of the public. The team provides first-class instruction of exercise classes, from pilates through to specialist sports conditioning, for all levels of participant. The team also boasts a diverse range of sporting expertise, including Strength and Conditioning (coaching for the Scottish and Grampian Institutes of Sport), and extensive experience in coaching a variety of sports, from recreational to elite level.

The Alumni Future Fund Sports Bursary Scheme

Each year we provide support for high performance athletes through our Alumni Future Fund Sports Bursary Scheme. Those individuals on the scheme receive a seminar programme, strength & conditioning programming and physiotherapy support, as well as financial support up to a maximum of £1,000. In the past the Scheme has supported up to 20 students who are competing at national level (or close to national level) in their chosen sport. Applications are available from the Sports department or through the University website. Other Sports Scholarship are available, see our website for more information.

What Does it Cost?

Students and staff of the University automatically obtain use of facilities and services at a reduced rate. A flexible membership scheme also exists, providing excellent value for regular users.

The University and the Environment

Almost 20,000 people create a big impact on our environment. Here at the University of Aberdeen we take this very seriously. Since 2005 the Environment Office has been working hard, putting environmental protection at the forefront of policy and practice.

The main role of the Environment Office is to reduce the impact the University has on the environment. This means that we give advice and support to help staff and students make informed decisions on travel, energy use, water use, recycling and waste disposal. Some of the things we get up to are:

Travel

The University has a Sustainable Travel Plan which incorporates lots of projects and initiatives to help staff and students travel in environmentally sustainable ways. The University promotes many forms of sustainable transport and works closely with the local authority, bicycle groups and public transport operators to provide facilities and discounted rates to encourage sustainable travel. In particular, students can use lockers to keep their bikes safe and secure on campus.

Energy and Water

The University has developed a Carbon Management Plan and this details the carbon emissions for the base year 2008/09 together with the target to reduce these emissions by 20% by 2014. One area where the University has reduced carbon emissions is by installing a Combined Heat and Power (CHP) plant. This provides over 50% of the electricity and over 90% of the heating for the Old Aberdeen Campus, reducing CO2 emissions by over 3,000 tonnes p.a. compared to the old system.

Further, where electricity is purchased off the grid over 27% is green electricity. The Carbon Management Plan details a number of additional measures to be implemented, some of which have already been completed. In addition to reducing carbon dioxide emissions we place a high priority on water conservation, fitting toilet and showering facilities with a range of water saving technology and automatic controls.

Recycling and Waste Disposal

The University currently recycles 35% of its waste and re-uses just over 1%. On campus, there are Recycling Points at two locations, at Hillhead and Crombie-Johnson, which cater for domestic waste from halls of residence including plastic bottles, glass bottles, food and drink cans, paper, cardboard, and textiles. We support waste reuse in particular and actively endorse the local reuse charity, the Creative Waste Exchange.

We also donate end of term hall clearance items to Instant Neighbour and the New Hope Trust, and have a partnership with Edinburgh based ReusingIT, donating between 400-600 phased-out PCs a year to NGOs, charities and community projects in the UK and Africa.

We have also been involved in the launch of 'SMUG Mugs' where if you use a thermal mug at Tiki outlets on campus you will receive a discount on your purchase. This, along with many other initiatives, have successfully raised the profile of sustainable waste management on our campus.

Fairtrade

The University of Aberdeen and the Students' Association have been awarded Fairtrade University status. Fairtrade gives power back to consumers who can make a difference to the lives of disadvantaged producers in developing countries by choosing Fairtrade certified products. Able Campaign


Our impact is not just local but affects us nationally and internationally. It is so important that we encourage students and staff to adopt sustainable working practices which can also be adopted outside the University environment.

Follow the Environment Office top tips to becoming a sustainable student:

- > Consider walking, cycling or taking the bus to campus. One third of all journeys are less than a mile in Aberdeen
- > Try taking the train home when term finishes. Students can save a third on most rail fares
- > Switch off unused appliances
- > Report any faults such as leaking taps to the Estates Section
- > Only boil enough water in your kettle for what you want to use
- Switch off lights when there is sufficient daylight
- > Do not obstruct radiators
- Instead of turning the heating up put on a jumper
- > Only print what is necessary
- > Duplex print and photocopy this can be done on campus and will save you money!
- > Use single sided scrap paper for note taking
- > Use the 'Shred-It' Recycling Points to recycle the waste paper you produce
- > Consider giving unwanted clothing to charity through the textile banks

Travel to Aberdeen

The University is located within a city at the heart of a diverse and thriving regional economy. Aberdeen's pivotal role in the international oil and gas industry means that it enjoys excellent communications and travel links.

By Air

Aberdeen's international airport is served by a number of major carriers, providing an extensive network of routes throughout the UK, direct to Europe and worldwide through major hubs. British destinations include three London airports (Heathrow, Gatwick and Luton - just over an hour's flight time at fares from £50 return), Belfast, Birmingham, Bristol, Dublin, Durham Tees Valley, Exeter, Humberside, Leeds Bradford, Manchester, Newcastle, Norwich, Nottingham, East Midlands, Southampton, as well as the Scottish Highlands and Islands. Other destinations include Amsterdam, Bergen, Copenhagen, Esbjerg, Oslo, Paris, Stavanger and Tenerife. There is a frequent bus link to the city centre, and taxis from the airport to the University cost around £15.

By Bus

First-class roads south to Edinburgh, Glasgow, and onwards, carry fast coach services linking Aberdeen with the UK's major cities. Competitive return fares, using Travelcard schemes, make coach travel popular with students. The earlier you book your travel, the cheaper the prices, for example:

By Car

Entering the city from the south or west, follow signs for the A90 (Fraserburgh and Peterhead). This leads round the ring road (Anderson Drive). Exiting from a roundabout (signed Old Aberdeen) onto Cairncry Road, continue to follow the A90 signs through two further roundabouts onto St. Machar Drive. After a third roundabout, the road bisects Old Aberdeen and local signs will direct you to University sites. From the north, Old Aberdeen is signposted on the A96 (from Dyce and Inverness) and on the A90 (from Peterhead).

By Local Bus

The number 20, from Littlejohn Street, next to Marischal College, links the city centre with the main Old Aberdeen site, and the Hillhead Halls student village. The number 19, from Broad Street, opposite Marischal College, passes to the west of the University along Bedford Road. From Union Street, the city's main thoroughfare, the numbers 1, 2, and 14, travelling east, all run along King Street and pass the University. Alight just after the King's playing fields on your left. Aberdeen buses require exact fare, so have 10p and 5p coins ready, or buy a bus Farecard from local shops.


