A QR code is an acronym for Quick Response Code, they are simple to use and can be read by most mobile phones with an in-built camera. This unique barcode lets you learn more about us in an instant.

How do I Scan a QR Code?

- Most smartphones have a QR code reader already installed, although for some you will need to download the reader and install it yourself.
- Once you have your reader installed, open the application and snap a picture of the QR code. Make sure that your hand is steady and that you are able to include the whole code into the picture.
- Depending on your software, it may take some 5 30 seconds for the application to decode the information written behind the code.

Our City Campus, on the banks of the River Usk, opened its doors last year and is now home to the Faculty of Arts & Business.

The building has been designed to encourage collaboration and joint working across academic areas. By bringing the Arts and Business together in one dynamic environment, students, researchers and local entrepreneurs are working together to create new commercial and creative ideas.

Caerleon Campus dates back to 1912 and is now home to the Faculty of Education and Social Sciences, as well as the Photography facilities of the Faculty of Arts & Business. COURSE

The University is not only proud of its Campuses but also its specialist facilities. Whether you study at City Campus, or at Caerleon, we have invested in some of the best equipment and facilities around.

We believe that if you are training to be a professional then you should learn using professional equipment. Here are just some of the facilities available to our students:

City Campus

Creative Sound and Music have four recording studios, with the extra ability to record from several performance spaces around the City Campus. A mobile studio is also used for high quality recording at live performances and a control room which includes one of the best studio monitors in existence.

Performing Arts has its own dedicated Black Box Dance Studio with a specialist wooden sprung floor ideal for rehearsals and actual performances.

All of our studios meet industry standards and offer a great platform for learning production techniques in a real environment with the latest industry equipment.

Design, Animation and Computer Games Design each have their own computer suites complete with Apple Macs and the latest industry standard software.

Film & Video and Documentary Film & Television have dedicated editing suites. Sound can be prepared on Pro ToolsTM in the digital dubbing suite. Students have access to HD digital cameras, complete sound kits and ancillary kit including dolly/tracks and Stedicam. There is a fully functional film studio with lighting rig and green screen facility.

Fashion has one of the most impressive studio spaces in Britain which is fully equipped with sewing machines, cutting pads/tables and manneguins for displaying designs.

The City Campus also boasts labs fully equipped for Electrical, Electronic, and Mechanical Engineering as well as two interconnecting Forensic computing labs.



Caerleon Campus

The campus's **Photography** darkrooms are widely regarded as some of the best facilities in Europe. Newport is one of the few institutions that offers both black and white and colour processing, has three digital photographic suites, as well as a dedicated studio complete with a sophisticated lighting system.

The Sports and Health Laboratory hosts specialised equipment that measures health screening parameters, cardiovascular fitness. strength, flexibility, body composition and haematological markers. A range of field testing equipment is also available allowing the opportunity to measure performance in a training and competition environment. Recent additions include video analysis software with the capability to publish detailed technical movement analyses for coaches and scientists alike.

The Engineering labs at Caerleon are used to test concrete, steel and soils as part of the Civil Engineering programmes. Fully equipped chemistry laboratories are used for the Fire Safety Engineering modules.

Art Education has its own ICT software and D&T labs for training teachers. These are fully equipped and designed to mirror the classroom, providing trainee teachers with a real working environment.

The Internationally renowned Dyscovery Centre undertakes a wide range of research projects in the area of developmental disorders at different ages from child to adulthood and offers clinical supervision to parents and carers.

Holly Milston explains how her graduate placement arranged by Go Wales reinforced the direction in which she wanted to take her career...

After studying Art, Design and Applied Crafts at College, I realised I had an underlying passion for business and conceptual design but didn't know how to evolve those passions but then decided to study Design at Newport.

I thoroughly enjoyed the course and interaction with the lecturers and students and the facilities available

to us. I soon realised it was crucially important to gain industry experience so I independently organised work experience at design studios in order to get an insight into the commercial side of design.

Before graduating, I managed to secure 10 weeks work as a Graphic Designer in a Cardiff agency which was organised through a company within the University called Go Wales who help graduates find placements. Completing the placement and having that extra bit of experience gave me the advantage of securing a permanent position as a Graphic Designer in a Design Studio. Eventually I hope to set up an independent design company with another Design graduate from the University.

Innovation and experimentation are fundamental to the creative process and students are encouraged to see themselves as 'visual explorers'. An introductory lecture programme exploring contemporary professional practice and its historical background supports this practical introduction to art, media and design.

As you progress through Stage 2 of the course you will begin to recognise your own area of specialism. You will be given the opportunity through investigation, experimentation and making, to focus your interests and you will continue to develop your creativity by taking conceptual risks and continued experimentation with media in order to determine your choice of specialism. You will begin to work independently in order to progress your choice of specialism and build a portfolio showing a selection of specialist work, based on one of the following options: animation, film/video, multimedia, photography, graphic design, illustration, painting, surface pattern, typography, fashion design, interior design, theatre design, product design, sculpture or digital media.

By Stage 3 of the course you will have identified a personal area of study for your final major project. You will be able to plan and outline your intentions for your project and you will be able to evaluate your own practice and compare it to the work of others. You will complete the course by managing and displaying your own final major project from concept to completion as part of the Foundation Course end of year show.



CREATIVE & THERAPUTIC ARTS



Involvement in the Arts has always had the capacity to be inclusive and because of this many people draw therapeutic benefit from engaging with an art form. However, few have studied how to use their art form effectively in order to work with groups creatively and therapeutically. This course offers an exciting opportunity for you to be at the forefront of a new and dynamic Creative & Therapeutic Arts Practitioner workforce.

If you are passionate about Music or Art and wish to learn how to employ your art form to benefit the well-being of others, then this course may be just what you're looking for. It will provide opportunities for you to work with groups within a variety of settings, as well as practical experience within the workplace on placement. Opportunities may be available to experience working creatively and therapeutically within another culture in your third year.

What You Study

Year 1

Provides initial personal exploration and development of your chosen art form including within a therapeutic framework. The focus is also on exploring, developing and applying an understanding of personal and participant creativity. A study of human development and play will help raise awareness of a range of developmental issues. You will learn about the basic

principles of working therapeutically, how effective interaction takes place and how to begin to define safe boundaries. A variety of placements offer opportunities to link theory with practice.

Year 2

While extending knowledge of the art form including within a therapeutic context, you will continue to develop your practical art form skills. You will also explore issues connected with working as part of a multidisciplinary team. The need to safe-guard vulnerable groups will also be studied. Learning is consolidated, developed, applied and assessed while working creatively & therapeutically with small groups on selected placements, which also provide a stimulus for consideration of a research focus for year 3.

Year 3

You will focus upon personal research linked to placement and the chosen art form.

Students are required to plan and develop a focused research project by way of a dissertation. This involves the production of protocol and ethics documentation for consideration and approval by the University's research and ethics committee. Further development of the chosen art form is pivotal at this stage, as is research linked to professional practice while on placement. This will provide an opportunity for you to explore your emerging professional practice in preparation for employment.

Inclusive Education is about delivering fair and equal access to learning opportunities in and out of the classroom. Part of this is the removal of any barriers that may exist for students who have additional learning needs.

You will consider the impact of recent legislation and the role it has played in highlighting the need to address the barriers faced by young students. You will investigate the many biological, psychological and/or sociological factors that impact on learning and explore approaches that can be adopted to support each young person to reach their potential.

INTRODUCTION TO SECONDARY TEACHING





Have you always wanted to teach but found you didn't have the entry qualifications? Are you enthusiastic about Mathematics, Science or ICT and want to share your enthusiasm with others?

Are you looking to train for a job that is stimulating, challenging and one where you learn new things everyday?

With a shortage of secondary school teachers in these priority areas, people from all backgrounds are being actively encouraged to enter teaching.

If you don't have academic qualifications, this is an opportunity to begin your training as a secondary school teacher. When you successfully complete the course with 120 HE credits at level 4 you may apply for a place on one of the two-year BSc secondary degrees with Qualified Teacher Status. You will be fully qualified to teach in three years.

The course is unique in Wales and attracts a wide range of applicants from varied backgrounds who are looking for new opportunities.

What You Study

You follow the mathematics/ science/ ICT pathway and may complete your studies over one year full-time or, for added flexibility, two years part-time.

The course will develop your study skills and self confidence and enable you to develop your knowledge, skills and understanding to a level that supports application to a range of careers including one of the two-year secondary teaching degree courses.

The programme offers you:

Although I had a good salary I was disillusioned with what I was doing. I'd thought about teacher training for some time but didn't have the qualifications so this course was perfect for me. My advice to anyone is if you're not happy in what you're doing, change your job and train to teach.

As part of the educational studies programme you will spend ten days in a secondary school. This will give you the opportunity to familiarise yourself with the secondary school ethos and observe good learning and teaching across the curriculum. You may undertake your observation in a Welsh-medium school, if you wish.

Where Next?

On successful completion of the course with 120 HE credits at level 4 you can apply for a place on one of the two-year BSc secondary degree courses with Qualified Teacher Status. Pathways are: mathematics with science; mathematics with ICT; science with mathematics and science with ICT.

Job opportunities, financial rewards, and long term career prospects are excellent as mathematics, science and ICT are designated priority subjects by the Welsh Government.

PRIMARY STUDIES WITH QUALIFIED TEACHER STATUS (QTS)



Teaching in a primary school is a varied, exciting and demanding profession. It requires individuals who have good subject knowledge, an awareness of how children develop and an ability to enthuse young learners.

This three-year degree is designed to prepare you for the challenges of teaching in a primary school. School-based and University-based elements combine to develop a range of teaching skills together with underpinning subject knowledge, understanding and skills. Course experiences and opportunities build to produce confident and competent primary school teachers.

We have an established reputation for the quality of our primary teacher training which has been recognised in the last inspection by Estyn where the top rating was awarded for support and guidance.

What You Study

The course is organised into two distinct areas:

- School-based study
- University-based study

School-based study

You have school experiences in each year of the course and in total you will spend 24 weeks on school placements in a range of educational settings.

School-based experiences are in carefully selected primary schools which operate in partnership with the University. The degree is taught in English, but if you are fluent in Welsh, you may undertake some elements of University-based work in Welsh and school experience in a Welsh-medium school. Your ability to plan, manage and teach a class and monitor learners' progress while operating effectively as part of the school team will develop incrementally over the three years of the course.

You will become aware of the curriculum in the Foundation Phase (for learners of 3-7 years) and Key Stage 2 (for learners of 7-11 years). REHABILITATION (VISUAL IMPAIRMENT)



This is a much needed training course for Rehabilitation Officers in the field of sight loss, which builds upon the expertise the University has accumulated in providing a Mobility & Orientation course and Qualified Teacher of the Visually Impaired (QTVI) course for those teaching children with a visual impairment.

The course development has received specialist input from qualified Rehabilitation Officers, Guide Dogs, SENSE, RNIB Wales, Wales Council for the Blind, Local Authorities and Sight Support. Ongoing support is received from practising Rehabilitation Workers across Wales, including past and present trainers of Rehabilitation Officers.

This Foundation Degree has been designed specifically for people who are providing rehabilitation support to people with little or no sight. Approximately 378,000 people in the UK are registered blind or partially sighted resulting in an urgent requirement to resource the rehabilitation of blind and partially sighted people and to provide appropriate, effective rehabilitative strategies in order to promote independent functioning and well-being in this growing population.

What You Study

The course is a Foundation Degree Award which, in itself, involves a strong element of work-based learning across the two years of study. Attendance for the 20 taught days at Newport is compulsory. In addition, students will undertake a placement in year 1 and 2, totalling a maximum of 80 days, which will be supervised by a qualified Rehabilitation Worker and assessed by external specialists.

Students are expected to gain additional experience by shadowing qualified Rehabilitation Workers and other professionals during their studying.

The following areas will be covered during the two year programme:

- Anatomy, Physiology, Pathology of the Eye
- Working with diverse client groups including those with dual sensory impairment or multiple disabilities
- Communications for the Visually Impaired
- Technology and specialist software
- Orientation and Mobility
- Independent Living Skills
- · Counselling / Interpersonal Skills
- Multidisciplinary practice in working with people with Visual Impairment
- Applied Practice
- Study Skills



This course is the first of its kind in Wales and has been developed in response to the evident shortage of professionals who are trained and qualified to work as Rehabilitation Workers with children, young people and adults with visual impairment.

Where Next?

As there is a shortage of qualified Rehabilitation Workers across the UK it is anticipated that employment prospects will be very favourable.

The 240 credits gained at the end of the 2 years of study will enable you, if you so wish, to top-up this award by progressing to a 3rd year of study to gain a BA or BSc, for example, in Education or Inclusive Education.



CREATIVE WRITING





Our students have gained publication, had success in competitions and been selected for prestigious writing projects. They also produce their own magazine of original writing and art, Pan. Student work is showcased at the Riverfront Theatre in Newport in our annual Best Student Writing production, and field trips, including backstage theatre visits, will also enrich your learning experience.

This is a Joint Honours only course that has to be combined with another subject. See page 234 for subject choices.

What You Study

Year 1

Starting Creative Writing: Focuses on imaginative writing. We aim to get you writing fiction and poetry with confidence and trying out forms and styles that you may not have tackled before.

Ways of Writing: This module is about different language styles for different professional purposes. Topics range from writing magazine articles to reviewing films and music and writing for the web.

Starting Scriptwriting: An introduction to plotting, creating characters and telling stories through dramatic scripts.

Year 2

Involves more specialised study, with separate courses on:

Scriptwriting: Explores writing for television, radio and the theatre.

Poetry: A more focused look at poetry. **Fiction:** Writing novels and stories.

Work-based Learning: You will also have the chance to make real use of your writing skills with a work placement. Past students have worked on Buzz, The Big Issue and on Able Radio, where their pieces have been published. Others have worked on scripts, for example in community film projects and even with the National Theatre. Other placements have included the University's Press Office, producing press releases and features, and on the publicity for productions of student work. Pan provides excellent opportunities for 'hands-on' experience of producing a magazine.

We have good links with several universities abroad and opportunities are available to study a semester overseas (in Europe or the USA) in the second year to students on all Humanities courses.

ENGLISH



This course combines traditional areas of study – major texts and movements in English literature – with more unusual topics like language and society, creative and professional writing, and Celtic, European and American literatures. Modules in literature and film, genre fiction (such as science fiction, crime, fantasy and horror writing) and children's fiction are in development.

The course covers literature from the origins of drama through to groundbreaking texts from contemporary authors whilst helping you to develop your own skills as a literary critic and writer in a friendly and welcoming environment. If this is what you want to do for the next three years, and you don't want to get lost in a crowd, this is the place for you.

What You Study

Year 1

English can be studied as a Single or Joint Honours subject. All students study The Age of Shakespeare, where we provide an introduction to the course by looking at the literature of Shakespeare and his contemporaries. Further introductory modules are offered in Drama, where we explore its origins and study texts from Classical Greece to Medieval England, and in Poetry and Fiction, where the different forms of poetry and ways of telling stories and shaping novels are studied. You will also complete an Academic Skills module which provides you with an overview of how to study

English at degree level. As a Single Honours English student you also study Language, Culture and Society and Ways of Writing, which develops your expertise in professional areas such as film reviewing and writing for the web. Joint Honours students do either two or three of the introductory modules outlined above, depending on whether you do Academic Skills in English or in your other subject.

Year 2

Year 2 modules examine the literature of the eighteenth and nineteenth century. Texts range from Gothic novels to Romantic and Victorian poetry. Further modules explore how the English stage developed right up to the present day and landmark texts of European literature in translation. A choice between two workshop-based modules, Writing Fiction or Writing Poetry, is also offered. In Year 2 you will also have the opportunity to do a work-based placement.

We have good links with several universities abroad and opportunities are available to study a semester overseas (in Europe or the USA) in the second year.

Year 3

Third year modules deal with the modern age. You study best-selling and Booker Prize-winning novels alongside modern poetry and literatures reflecting American and Celtic identities. The texts you study will often deal with important contemporary social issues. In your final year you can also write

a dissertation on a topic of your choosing which could be from any of the periods studied throughout your time with us.

ANIMATION



This well established course has been running for 15 years, and during this time has built up a strong reputation for producing professionally minded, talented and innovative animation filmmakers. Initially set up by Oscar-winning animator/filmmaker Joanna Quinn (who still supports the School through teaching visits and placements in her studio), the programme has gone from strength to strength and has fuelled the industry with ground breaking individuals, who can be found from Aardman through Framestore to WETA Digital.

We attribute our success to a well-balanced education, which combines a strong foundation in animation timing and movement, software training and an in-depth theoretical and critical study of the language of film and animation. We actively encourage our students to watch as many films as possible, through attendance at film festivals, our own extensive library of films, visiting speakers, and local screening events and exhibitions. Our close links with broadcasters and production companies combined with our hands on approach provide you with a solid grounding to enable you to approach the creative industry with confidence in your abilities, energy and flair. The filmmaking journey that you started just three years earlier will prove

COMMUNITY HEALTH & WELL-BEING



Community Health focuses on interventions that health care workers provide outside of health care establishments. CRIMINOLOGY & CRIMINAL JUSTICE



Criminology and Criminal Justice students study areas of society that affect the everyday lives of people all over the world. Criminology is the study of crime and criminal behaviour. It explores the reasons why people break laws in their country and how society deals with offenders. Criminal Justice relates to government systems and practices that are designed to maintain social control, deter crime and authorise punishments and rehabilitation programmes for offenders.

Agencies within the Criminal Justice system include the Police, Crown Prosecution Service, Probation Service. Courts and Prison Service.

You will develop your understanding of criminal behaviour. You will look at who offenders are and why some people may be more prone to engaging in criminal activity than others. You will explore social problems often associated with criminal behaviour and challenge some preconceived ideas about offenders.

NUTRITION



Nutrition looks at the various factors and processes that are involved in taking in and utilising food to support growth, repair and maintenance of the body. This is possible because of the different nutrients available in the food. These nutrients are stored by the body in different forms and used when food intake is not sufficient. It includes digestion, ingestion and absorption.

You will explore exactly what a healthy diet should consist of and debate the need for food supplements. You will explore the different nutrients - Proteins, Fats, Carbohydrates, Minerals, Vitamins, Water and more. Psychology is the study of people, the mind and the mental processes that occur. There are a variety of fields within Psychology including Cognitive Psychology and Social Psychology. Cognitive Psychology is the scientific study of thinking, information processing and cognitive performance. Social Psychology looks at how the actions of others influence the behaviour of an individual.

The programme is structured around the core sections recommended by the British Psychological Society (BPS). You will gain an insight into all of the key areas of psychology, including: cognitive; developmental, individual differences, social, the biological basis of behaviour, research methods, and the history of psychology. SOCIAL WORK



The course begins with an introduction to communication theory and skills and explores the development of individuals from birth to adulthood through the study of psycho-social theories. It examines the legal and policy context of social work practice and explores advocacy services and skills with service users.

YOUTH JUSTICE



The Youth Justice system in England and Wales is responsible for sentencing and working with young people under the age of 18 who have committed a criminal offence. The system also intervenes with young people whose behaviour is problematic before they enter the formal court system. The main aim of the youth justice system is the prevention of youth crime.

You will explore the main issues around youth crime and the youth justice system in England and Wales, for example why some young people offend and others do not. You will look at how society responds to young people that do offend. You will enhance your understanding of anti-social behaviour and debate why it has become a growing issue in recent years. You will experience a course that has been developed in consultation with youth offending teams in Wales, ensuring what you learn is based on current practice and policy as well as a range of theory.

HISTORY



History at Newport enables you to acquire a progressive mastery of historical concepts and skills, as well as a detailed knowledge and understanding of key historical episodes and issues from antiquity to the contemporary period. At the same time, the course will also develop your skills in communication and presentation, report writing, evidence gathering and data analysis, information technology, working with others, and working independently.

You will also have the opportunity to undertake valuable workplace experience as part of your History degree.

What You Study

Year 1

Modules in year 1 provide you with a lively introduction to the History degree and the essential study skills that form the foundation to the rest of the undergraduate programme. Here is a brief guide:

Academic Skills (History)

This module equips you with the subjectspecific study skills required to succeed as a History undergraduate.

History, Film and Image

This innovative module introduces you to a range of English and foreign language historical films in order to develop your critical skills in handling and 'reading' film as an historical source.

Early Wales

Early Wales provides a particular focus on local issues as it traces the development of Wales from earliest times to the Anglo-Norman invasions of the eleventh century and after. The module introduces you to the study of material culture with an opportunity to examine artefacts ranging in date from early prehistory to the early medieval period.

Insights into European History / Themes in British History

These broad survey modules provide you with a chronological framework for the study of European and British history from the fall of the Roman empire to the twentieth century.

Heritage and History

This module looks at the heritage industry, at the ways in which heritage is used in social and economic regeneration and asks: who 'owns' the past?

Years 2 and 3

These two years develop the knowledge and skills gained in Year 1 and both broaden and deepen your historical understanding. Modules currently on offer in Year 2 include Modern Italy, Medieval Studies, Reading the Past, Foundations of Modern Wales, Presenting the Past, and Europe since 1945. In Year 3, you have the opportunity to 'drill down' into highly specialised topics. In particular, the dissertation allows you to select and conduct in-depth research on a topic of special interest to you.

We have good links with several universities abroad and opportunities are available to study a semester overseas (in Europe or the USA) in the second year to students on all Humanities courses.

APPLIED DRAMA



If you love theatre and all elements of drama and wish to learn how to impart your theatre skills to others in educational and community settings, then Applied Drama is the course for you. It offers practical based training to prepare you for a variety of exciting careers within the areas of community drama, theatre in education and beyond.

You will learn about the required practical skills for performance, theatre direction, workshop leadership and 'story development' and will explore the key texts and theories underpinning these disciplines. You will benefit from work experience, providing you with practical experience of working in Theatre, the educational arm of theatre companies or in schools using drama as a teaching tool, whilst theatre and field trips will also further enrich your experience.

In addition, you will have the opportunity to work on shows as well as showcase your own work at the Riverfront Theatre in Newport and in local schools and educational and community settings.

What You Study

Year 1

You will develop your theoretical and practical skills in modules such as Educational Drama, Voice and Body 1 and Starting Scriptwriting as well as receive an introduction to the drama, critical approaches and theatre skills, giving you a foundation for more specialist work in year 2. The aim throughout is to provide a balance

of developing practical ability alongside analytical and theoretical understanding; the practical work enabling an examination of the theory and the theory enabling development of the practical.

Year 2

The Creative Sound and Music pathway has been designed to equip you with the latest ideas, insights, techniques and skills for developing a career as a musician. Launching you headfirst into a programme of creative learning, the course develops your approach to composition and performance, whilst providing you with the necessary production skills to realise your ideas.

Having established a working process that's right for you, you'll engage with the necessary media platforms and business strategies that will help you to develop your work in the context of the 21st century music industry.

You will continue to develop your chosen specialism through advanced composition, performance and production modules that culminate in a final major project designed by you in negotiation with the programme team that meets the demands of a highly competitive industry.

The course team's professional experiences include composition, performance, production, video, marketing and design; providing a unique platform for your musical development.

What You Study

Year 1

The central focus is on innovation as fundamental to the creative process, with specific emphasis on composition and performance. During your first year you'll develop your distinctive creative voice, drawing inspiration from both commercial and experimental music practice.

CREATIVE MUSIC MEDIA PATHWAY





This pathway has been designed to equip you with the latest ideas, insights, techniques and skills for developing a career as a media artist / practitioner within a musical context. It pushes you to find and make new connections between music and media practice, including moving image, mobile, online and interactive platforms.

Initially you'll integrate with other music students to gain a grounding in sound and music, developing knowledge and competency through a series of creative projects. You'll then specialise by exploring the potential for thinking musically within online and visual contexts, by developing a web presence and enhancing your knowledge of image design.

You'll continue to specialise by engaging with video, installation and interactive media. You'll also look at the possibilities offered by emergent media platforms, developing applications for smartphone and tablet platforms.

The course team's professional experiences include interactive music production, app and interactive software development, site-specific and installation art, composition for film and TV, video and film production, design and marketing; providing a unique platform for your musical development.

What You Study

Year 1

The central focus is on innovation as fundamental to the creative process, with specific emphasis on production technologies, audiovisual literacy, and developing confidence and competence with online strategies. During your first year you'll develop your distinctive creative voice, drawing inspiration from both commercial and experimental audiovisual practices.

Through a series of practical and theoretical modules, you'll develop a portfolio of projects that will reflect your engagement with all aspects of music industry practice and you'll put forward a business proposal and plan for your final major project. Your work will often reflect the broad range of the contemporary music industry, but will be grounded in business essentials such as Events, Distribution, Marketing, Economics, and International Business.

What You Study

Year 1

Your first year will act as a foundation to business practice, and will include a series of modules that will allow you to explore and understand the structure of the music industry, as well as an analysis of the opportunities open to business. This business focus will be firmly embedded within a creative context and you will attend practical classes alongside music students. You will also undertake a programme of theory, which includes contemporary and experimental music, critical thought, political economy and philosophy.

Year 2

Your second year fully engages with the multi-discursive nature of music, and through a series of modules you will engage with the practicalities of setting up and running a series of live briefs, including events, distribution, marketing and online. This will be supported by the development and strategisation of your personal online project, alongside applied research into enterprise, strategy and planning for your career post-graduation. Again, you will also undertake a programme of theory that focuses on the relationships between audio and visual media within a philosophical context. Your studies will also be accompanied by a negotiated work placement or live brief, which frequently results in postgraduate opportunities for career development and employment.

Year 3

You will develop and run a major music business project, that fully reflects your understanding of and insights into professional industry practice. You will also undertake advanced research leading to a written dissertation. These projects continue to develop and reinforce your understanding of sound and music-related media, examining the political and economic structure of the creative media industry.

Where Next?

You will be qualified to progress to a wide range of music related employment including: events management, online music distribution, music marketing, promotion and management, independent music business, arts administration and consultancy for digital music futures (property and rights). Our graduates may also progress to postgraduate study, including the MA in Creative Music Business here at Newport.

Our performing arts course offers an intensive study of performance skills specialising in theatre, film and radio. Situated in the prestigious Newport Film School we offer unrivalled opportunities for screen training in our (new) custom built studios at the City Campus. Whether it is acting in a film, directing a theatre play or devising a multimedia performance, our core skills and practices are designed to equip you for a successful career in the creative industries.

The experience of our leading staff covers a wide range of performance disciplines and includes acting for film, theatre and radio; directing theatre; dance theatre and devised performance. You have the opportunity to work with staff on research projects, including theatre productions and films and we showcase the best student work in public performances locally and at festivals such as the International Student Festival and the Edinburgh Fringe Festival. Our students have also acted in and provided voiceovers for award-winning drama, documentary and animation films.

What You Study

Your first year offers core skills in acting for film and theatre along with contemporary movement and voice practice. Training and teaching is led by professional actors, choreographers and academics, who will not only foster your practical skills but also develop your ability to consider the

DOCUMENTARY PHOTOGRAPHY



The course draws upon the traditions of documentary practice and moves forward to engage with the most significant developments within contemporary photographic practice. Documentary Photography students benefit from regular lectures from high profile guests, engage with symposia and masterclasses led by photographers, historians and curators through its association with the European Centre for Photographic Research – a world leading research community based within the University.

Students continue to be invited to exhibit in key international surveys of contemporary photography in Europe, America and Asia. They are invited to work on live briefs for industry partners and students benefit from close professional associations with major institutions that include Magnum Photos, Canon and many galleries and publishing houses central to the world they will become part of. Students are encouraged to participate in project-led field trips, to study abroad with our partner institutions and work with staff on live research projects.

What You Study

Your first year lays the groundwork for you to be able to work independently as a documentary photographer. You will learn to photograph confidently around subjects that really interest you and develop the research skills to complete picture essays on a wide range of contemporary subjects. Workshops cover the technical expertise you need including medium format cameras. lighting, portraiture, picture editing and digital workflow and printing are consolidated as central to your working practice.

As you progress into the second year you will initiate projects developed from your own interests and research, while reappraising documentary practice in all its contemporary contexts. Subjects are photographed over extended periods and you are expected to produce work to professional standards. Practical workshops continue throughout the year and explore printing for exhibition, large format photography, digital output for print, and book publication. Live projects include collaboration with renowned photobook designers and internationally active visiting photographers. 

RELIGIOUS STUDIES



Religion is an integral aspect of modern society and even if you are not religious yourself, religion will have an impact on your life in some way.

On the course you will look at different people and cultures, their views and beliefs, the world and our place in it. You will examine how and why people think in different ways, including an exploration of the ethical aspects of contemporary life. You will explore a variety of religions and diverse subject matter. You will also benefit from the strong contemporary aspect provided on the course that makes it relevant to life here and now, not simply the past.

In addition, you will have the opportunity to experience a series of field trips - including India. Visiting places of worship, and meeting the practitioners of other faiths and traditions provides a hands-on experience and 'real' insight into the world of others.

What You Study

Year 1

Year 1 is the basis of all later study. You will be introduced to Judaism, Christianity, Islam, Hinduism, Buddhism and Sikhism and you will concentrate on the visible aspect of religion, 'living religion'. We will widen your knowledge base through the inclusion of ethical discussion, encompassing a wider and more detailed analysis of culture and

politics. Added to this is an investigation of religion in its broadest sense, encompassing art, and attitudes to belonging, death and alternatives to formal religion. This first year also includes numerous visits to faith communities, guest speakers and practical sessions, such as a Tai Chi workshop.

Year 2

Year 2 will involve you in a more in-depth analysis of religion. We explore the origins of major faiths and consider the often disputed processes through which they originated. A module on Jainism (not offered by many universities) supplements the work on other Indian religions. In addition, we offer a module on the anthropology of religion and an opportunity to make an in-depth study of a faith community of your choice.

We have good links with several universities abroad and opportunities are available to study a semester overseas (in Europe or the USA) in the second year to students on all Humanities courses.

Year 3

Year 3 focuses on the contemporary aspect of the study of religion. The course includes an examination of the more recent developments in Christianity and Islam probing modern ideas and controversies such as the role of women and political violence. You will also examine contemporary

developments in the Eastern religions, particularly those that are now popular globally. A module on Religion, Culture and Film, examines religion in its broadest sense; whilst a module on religion and cyberspace emphasises the constantly changing nature of religion. The final year also includes a chance to undertake a research project into an area of personal interest.

Where Next?

We now live in a multi-cultural society and, we are told, in a "Global Village". Those who have an understanding of different cultures, their beliefs and values, and the ability to think for themselves will possess key skills applicable to most types of work. Careers in teaching, social services, the police, tourism, publishing and the civil service are a few prospects open to our graduates. With a degree in Religious Studies, the world is your oyster!

ADVICE ON HOW TO APPLY

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

It is the policy of the University to admit students to courses on the basis of their potential. We pride ourselves on our commitment to equal opportunities and encourage applications from a wide range of people who have a desire to fulfil their true potential. We hope that the following sections will help you with your application to the University of Wales, Newport and will answer any questions that you may have about admission to the University.

MINIMUM ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

The entry requirements are listed on every course page in this prospectus as they do vary from course to course.

Most conditional offers will be phrased in terms of UCAS tariff points and some courses may also specify a particular subject at a certain level. Applicants will normally be expected to have two A-levels or equivalent for entry to degree courses, and one A-level or equivalent for entry to HND or Foundation degree courses. Some courses will also have additional requirements to the UCAS tariff points. Please contact our Admissions and Enrolment team for further details.

The tables on the inside back cover of the prospectus explain the UCAS tariff point scores. For a complete listing please visit www.ucas.ac.uk

Newport welcomes applicants who have undertaken a range of studies to achieve their UCAS tariff points and the University sometimes asks for a *specified number of points from two A levels or equivalent. This is because the University is looking for both breadth and depth in your current studies. For example, if the entry requirement is 280 points including 180 points from two A levels or equivalent, the University would normally expect the 180 points to be achieved through a period of focused study for qualifications such as A levels (or equivalent) or an Access/Foundation qualification.

ADMISSION WITH PRIOR Credit

The University welcomes applications from students who have successfully completed courses or modules at other higher education institutions. We will try to match your existing qualifications or credits against an appropriate Newport undergraduate degree or HND course.

It is also possible to claim some exemptions on certain courses by demonstrating that you have relevant knowledge, skills or experience.

APPLICANTS WITHOUT FORMAL ACADEMIC QUALIFICATIONS

The University takes into account not only formal qualifications but also other personal qualities, skills, knowledge and experience. We recognise and value the importance of life and work experience and encourage applications from those with sufficient relevant experience.

CRIMINAL RECORDS BUREAU (CRB) CHECKS

Where indicated in the prospectus or on the University's website, specific courses may involve regular access to children and/or vulnerable adults, also known as regulated activity. Where this is the case, all students will be required to undertake a criminal records bureau check. The University will send further instructions regarding the CRB check as part of the Admissions process. For further guidance please look at the information shown against the course or contact the University.

ADMISSIONS PROCESS

For all full-time undergraduate higher education courses at universities and colleges in the UK, students must apply online at UCAS.

There are three types of applicant.

STUDENTS AT A SCHOOL OR COLLEGE REGISTERED WITH UCAS

All UK schools and colleges (and a small number of establishments overseas) are registered with UCAS to manage their students' applications.

Advice is available from your teacher or a careers advisor at your school or college. You fill in an online application and submit it to a member of staff. After checking your details, and having added the academic reference, your school or college submits the completed application online to UCAS. You pay online using a credit card or debit card.

INDEPENDENT APPLICANTS IN THE UK

Other UK applicants, who are not at school or college, apply online independently.

It is likely that you are a mature applicant, who, unlike school and college students, cannot readily seek advice from a teacher, but can instead consult with various careers organisations (such as Careers Wales). You are responsible for paying the correct application fee, for obtaining and attaching the academic reference and for submitting the completed application online to UCAS.

Except for those whose school or college is registered with UCAS, individuals from the EU (excluding the UK), and worldwide, apply online independently.

DEFERRED ENTRY

EUROPEAN UNION (EU) STUDENTS

WHAT HAPPENS NEXT?

Full-time Admissions

Step 1

Once your application has been received and processed by UCAS it is sent to the Admissions and Enrolment Department at the University.

Step 2

The Admissions and Enrolment Department will acknowledge receipt of each application and undertake basic checks, highlighting important information for Faculty Admissions Tutors on the forms (including disabilities which have been disclosed or any specific requirements, entry qualifications, nationality etc). If any part of the application form is incomplete the Admissions and Enrolment Department will request the missing information and retain the form until it is complete.

Step 3

Once all of the checks have been completed the application form will usually be forwarded to the Faculty Admissions Tutor for consideration.

Step 4

After considering your application the Faculty Admissions Tutor will either; make you an offer, invite you in for an interview or if you are unsuccessful turn down your application. The selection process for our different courses can vary; some courses may require applicants to undertake an assessment or a test, provide a presentation, produce a portfolio of work and/or take part in individual or group interviews. Step 5

Once the Faculty Admissions Tutor has made a decision, your application form will be returned to the Admissions and Enrolment Department who will notify you of that decision in writing. You will also be informed of the decision via UCAS Track.

Step 6

If we make you an offer it will either be 'Unconditional' with no terms attached or 'Conditional' in which case we will provide full details of any conditions or requirements that must be met prior to starting the course. If you are unsuccessful in your application you can contact the Admissions and Enrolment Department for feedback.

Step 7

Once you have received the decisions for all your applications you will be required to firmly accept an offer (your first choice), accept an offer as an insurance choice (your second choice) and decline any remaining offers.

You must do this through UCAS. If you firmly accept an offer from Newport, the Admissions and Enrolment Department will be notified by UCAS and you will be sent an Accommodation application pack from May onwards.

Step 8

If you were made an unconditional offer of a place that you have accepted, during August the Admissions and Enrolment Department will send you a Joining Pack which will include an induction timetable. If you have been made a conditional offer we will be able to send you a Joining Pack as soon as you have met the condition/s of your offer.

Step 9

When you receive your A Level results (or equivalent) in the summer, if you do not achieve the grades you need in order to meet the conditions of your offer, don't worry as there may still be a place available for you to study. DIRECTIONS TRANSPORT

London is only about two hours away via the M4 motorway, while other motorways and dual carriageways connect Newport with the North, Midlands, South East and South West England and West Wales. Campuses are sign posted from the M4 motorway.

There are excellent rail services to Newport from all major cities. London is just one hour and 40 minutes away and Birmingham two hours by high speed trains which operate hourly.

Newport is served by regular National Express coaches from London, West Wales, the North, Midlands and South West England. There is also a direct service from Heathrow and Gatwick airports.

Both campuses are served by Newport Bus routes 27 & 28 that depart from bus stand 27 of the central bus station. The City Campus is situated opposite Newport's bus station. A subsidised Uniqo bus pass can be purchased from the Caerleon Campus or Central Bus Station and offers terrific value for money, with travel from as little as 49p per day.

London's Heathrow Airport is about two hours drive away and there are also airports at Bristol and Cardiff, both less than one hour from Newport.

CITY CAMPUS

For those approaching the City Campus along the M4 from the east (from Bristol, London, via M4) exit the motorway at junction 25a signposted Newport/Cwmbran. At the roundabout take 1st exit towards Newport onto Heidenheim Drive, A4042, Continue along this road for about 1 mile passing the Riverfront Theatre on your left. The campus is on your left, after a few hundred metres.

For those approaching the City Campus from the west (Cardiff, Swansea, via M4) exit the motorway at junction 26. At the roundabout take the 3rd exit towards Newport onto Malpas Road, A4051. Continue along this road through 3 sets of traffic lights and at the next roundabout take the 3rd exit, signposted 'Docks' and up a slight incline onto the A4042. Continue along this road for about half a mile passing the Riverfront Theatre on your left. The campus is on your left, after a few hundred metres.

CAERLEON CAMPUS

From Bristol (Westbound) exit at junction 25 following the signs for Caerleon. For those approaching Caerleon from Cardiff (eastbound), there is no direct exit from junction 25. Exit at junction 26 and at the roundabout take the third exit onto the A4051/Malpas Road heading to Newport. At Harlequin Roundabout, take the fourth exit onto Heidenheim Drive, A4042 following signs for M4 East. At the next roundabout take the second exit, keep left until you reach the Caerleon Road Roundabout. Take the first exit signposted for Caerleon and follow the signs to the campus.

CAR PARKING


Newport is committed to an environmental policy that aims to reduce the impact of harmful emissions produced by vehicles through an approved Car Parking and Transport Policy. Students wishing to park on the Caerleon Campus are required to register their vehicles with the Estates Department and will be issued with permits. All drivers of vehicles parked on campus are required to pay the appropriate fee.

Residential students are not permitted to park on campus unless they require the essential use of a vehicle to assist with travelling in connection with their studies.

All applications for permits to allow residential students to park must be authorised by the appropriate Dean of School and approved by the Head of Facilities Services in advance of a vehicle being brought onto campus. Any residential student who is registered as disabled will automatically be permitted free parking on campus.


Disabled car parking spaces are available at each campus on a first come, first served basis.
