>MANAGING YOUR MONEY

One of your key considerations is how you will manage your money whilst at university.

Leeds is one of the more affordable places to live compared with other areas of Britain, but you will still need to budget. To help with living expenses. many students decide to work part-time. Whilst this is a delicate balance, and your studies should always take priority, working can be beneficial – it not only puts money in your pocket but it also helps you gain valuable, professional work experience. Our Joblink service is a great resource and provides plenty of opportunities for part-time work in Leeds. You don't need to take our word for it...

"Joblink in the Union is a great resource for finding extra work whilst at uni, they offer everything from bar work, to being a student ambassador or being a primary or secondary school tutor. Having a part-time job whilst at university definitely helps with budgeting, and is a great way to practise time management. "I worked part-time throughout my degree in shops in the city centre. It was fairly easy to find work, as Leeds is such a big city. I usually worked a few short shifts a week, which fitted in around my lectures... Sharing food and eating with your flatmates can work out cheaper than cooking for one, and you can save money on transport by walking to university."

"Once you've settled in, offer to cook for your housemates. Then, they'll feel obliged to cook for you in the future, and before you know it you regularly share responsibility for feeding each other. This allows you to spend less money on food by cooking in bulk. Leeds has a fantastic market on Kirkgate. Make it your 'go to' place for fruit, veg, meat and fancy-dress costume materials."

"Always have a reserve of cash that you do not spend unless it's really, really necessary. Keep an eye on it all, it doesn't take much time but you can get a good idea of just how much you are spending. If you think you can take on a part-time job, definitely get one as soon as possible."

The opportunities you get at the University of Leeds really are once in a lifetime. Many students choose to study abroad or take a year's work placement. both of which are fantastic experiences and really enhance your skills and CV.

A student's storv...

Natalie Blackburn studied French and German. and graduated June 2011. Here she tells us about her study abroad and work placement experience.



My time abroad was absolutely incredible! I studied in France for three months and worked over the summer, then went to Hamburg to do a 12-month internship at euroShell. Having to leave the UK and my housemates before the end of term in my second year was tough, but arriving in France was amazing. It takes a bit of getting used to and there will always be things you miss, but it's really nice jumping into a different culture and putting everything you've learnt into practice.

Although in France I lived in student accommodation, in Germany I had my own flat so had to deal with internet and electricity companies myself and get everything set up. Going in to German doctors and hairdressers for the first time was daunting but it gave me so much confidence knowing I was living independently in a foreign country.

My internship at euroShell has definitely put me in good stead with 12 months' work experience before graduating, and it gave me a lot more confidence when applying for jobs. Doing a work placement means that when it comes to future interviews, you have so many more examples to draw on and much more to talk about. It makes your application stand out at a time when more and more people have a degree, so I'd recommend it to anyone.

The German department offered a lot of support in arranging the internship as they had previously sent students there and knew the company. I had help putting together a German CV and my tutor checked over my application before it was sent off. My personal tutor kept in contact during my year abroad and offered advice for any problems I was experiencing.

My time abroad increased my confidence no end, as I learnt to adapt to a totally new environment, meet people from all over the world and really stand on my own two feet.

What is Leeds for Life?

It is our approach to helping you get more out of university life from day one. It provides you with the facility to develop a living CV and to reflect on your experiences, and it guides you to the full range of activities available and the wide range of personal development and CV enhancing opportunities on offer at Leeds.

What kind of resources and activities can vou access?

Study abroad: Year in industry: Language centre: Skills centre: Volunteering (over 2.000 Leeds students do over 65.000 hours of volunteer work a year); Careers – including support for setting up your own business; Student societies - Leeds student TV (LSTV), theatre, sports, language skills; boosting key skills such as mathematics, "Most employers are less interested in the precise presentation style, report writing and much more.

How does it link back to studies?

Leeds for Life also helps you structure your regular one-to-one meetings with your personal tutor, supporting your personal and academic development, and identifying opportunities outside of your course such as volunteering and work placements that can enhance your skills and your degree.

How does this help with future careers?

The Leeds for Life site links with the careers service, and allows you to capture your experiences on an online 'living CV' that you get from day one. This grows with you throughout your time at Leeds and is ready to use when you start to apply for jobs. It will help you with applications and interviews by enabling you to recognise, and utilise, the skills you have gained and developed throughout your time at Leeds.
