


Industry showcases

With nearly 2,000 creative industries in Northamptonshire, the sector brings around £610million into the region's economy and the Portfolio Innovation Centre is fast becoming a creative enterprise hub for the region.

Northampton Fashion graduates are building creative connections by taking part in the Ningbo Fashion Festival in China. This is not just a catwalk show but also comprises exhibitions from The School of the Arts' Product Design, Fine Art, Footwear, Textiles and Fashion courses.

In a visit to Ningbo in April 2011 Vicki Dean, Head of Fashion, helped plan the start of the Sino-UK textile and fashion industry-college research and cooperation centre which officially opened in October 2011.

After Vicki's trip to China 18 visitors from Chinese industry and education and The British Council, including Presidents, Deans and industry Directors, visited The School of The Arts in May 2011 followed by a tour of our world leading Fashion, Fine Art and Product Design facilities.

During this visit Paul Middleton, Executive Dean of School of The Arts, and Meizhen Wang, President of Zhejiang Textile & Fashion College in China, signed a Memorandum of Understanding. This new partnership supports the School's internationalisation strategy and highlights our commitment to offer our students a truly international experience.

St Étienne: Cité du Design

The School of the Arts and the eastern-central French city of St Étienne have had an exchange programme in place for many years and a number of French students have joined the BA Graphic Communication course for a term in the second year.

St Étienne and its Art school have recently gone through a period of change and modernisation; in 2005 The Cité du Design was set up and since 1998 St Étienne has hosted The International Design Biennial.

In 2011 two Graphics students joined the third year of the St Étienne four year Design course. The two students lived and worked in St Étienne for a semester, during which time they had an intensive French course, helping them improve their language skills for their academic studies and in order to integrate with the community. A flexible programme of study has been negotiated with both St Étienne and Northampton tutors, allowing the students to pursue their passion for video and film, photography and typography. They are supported with their accommodation and the general housekeeping involved in living abroad for four months.

Developing aspiring photographers

In 2011 twelve UK photography students flew to North Rajasthan, India to embark on a three-week project to teach photography to village children. Four of them (Adam Billing, Jo Haines, Jason Lovatt and Wayne Lennon) were from the School of the Arts' BA Photographic Practice.

Organised by Basti Ram, a charity that works with underprivileged communities in India, the project offers children opportunities to photograph and document their own communities.

The work produced by both the children and the student photographers culminates in large exhibitions in community spaces in India and London. The students received financial support from the School of the Arts

The School's MA in Fine Art has developed exceptional educational relations with Cyprus College of Art

Over the last five years the School's MA in Fine Art has developed exceptional educational relations with Cyprus College of Art, which attracts students from around the world. Postgraduate Diploma students from Cyprus can achieve a University of Northampton Masters qualification.

The relationship with Cyprus College of Art began with students submitting written dissertations and being supervised remotely by specialist staff in Northampton. Soon students applying were able to travel to Northampton and work with staff in our excellent resources over one or two semesters.

Their practice-based projects are fully integrated with those of both our UK students and other full time international students. 2011 saw the launch of a new approach with our Fine Art Masters module being taught 'by distance' without the need for students to relocate to the UK. Students based in Cyprus follow the same module at the same time as those in Northampton. Fine Art staff deliver content and supervision in Cyprus at key dates.

In 2011 the Northampton students and staff hosted their exhibition in the Walgrave Studios, while students in Cyprus presented their exhibition in the Cornaro Intstitute.

Vice-Chancellor Dr Nick Petford opened the exhibition to celebrate this new partnership.



International recognition

Feminist scholar and Reader in English, Sonya Andermahr won International recognition for her Glossary of Feminist Theory co-written with Terry Lovell and Carol Wolkowitz.

She has recently become interested in narratives of maternal loss, and gave a paper on this topic at the Contemporary Women's Writing Conference in San Diego California in July 2010. As a result she was invited to give the Keynote paper "Mourning, Melancholia and Melodrama in Contemporary Women's Grief Fiction" at Mothers at the Margins, The Sixth Australian International Conference on Motherhood, held at the University of Queensland in April 2011.

The paper was extremely well received and will be published in the radical feminist journal *Hecate*. Sonya teaches both postgraduate and undergraduate students of English, including PhD students.

The Arts and health form the subject of one of the modules in our MA in the Arts, and two international conferences on this topic have been held in the School of the Arts




The human experience of trauma is one of the most compelling concepts for study in the Arts, and two lecturers from the School of the Arts have made recent contributions to understanding it.

Patrick Duggan, Lecturer in Performance Studies, has edited (with Professor Mick Wallis of the University of Leeds) a special issue (16.1) of the celebrated international journal Performance titled On Trauma. The issue explores the ways in which performance addresses trauma and where trauma theory illuminates performance.

Senior Lecturer in English Sonya Andermahr ran a highly successful international conference in the School of the Arts on Trauma Narratives and 'Herstory'. The conference covered topics as diverse as embracing trauma to live and trauma and the Spanish Civil War and was organised in collaboration with our Spanish partner the University of Zaragoza.
