About the Bachelor of Oral Health (BOH)

The Bachelor of Oral Health is an undergraduate degree that covers four main areas:

- > Oral health sciences
- > Social sciences and health promotion
- > Preventive and clinical dentistry
- > Vocational clinical practice

Students in the Bachelor of Oral Health develop the knowledge and technical skills required to practice as oral health therapists, which includes both dental hygienist and dental therapist practice.

The curriculum reflects the latest developments in oral health, while the strong research base at the Melbourne Dental School ensures students have access to the latest knowledge and expertise.

The majority of clinical work is undertaken at the Royal Dental Hospital of Melbourne in Carlton, where the Melbourne Dental School is located, and in third year, in metropolitan and rural community clinics. The Hospital and community clinics provide access to state-of-the-art facilities.

How long is the course?

The Bachelor of Oral Health is a three year, full-time fixed course with a combined vocational outcome of professional registration as dental hygienists and dental therapists.

Career opportunities

Bachelor of Oral Health graduates provide dental care in collaboration with dentists and work as oral health therapists in both the public and private sectors, general and specialist practice, and in oral health promotion. Graduates find excellent employment prospects in private practice, public hospitals and health services. There are also career opportunities in research, education and public health.

Dental therapists provide dental care for children and adolescents, examine oral and dental conditions, restore and conserve permanent and deciduous teeth, perform extractions of deciduous teeth, and remove calculus. Under recent changes in national legislation, dental therapists are also able to provide care to adults under certain circumstances.

Dental hygienists provide dental care for all age groups, examine and record the nature and severity of periodontal conditions, and clean, scale and root-plane teeth.

Both therapists and hygienists undertake oral health promotion, a range of orthodontic and preventive procedures (including impressions, topical fluoride applications and fissure sealants) and take and interpret radiographs.

Selection criteria

To apply for the Bachelor of Oral Health, applicants must have:

- > VCE prerequisites (units 3 and 4);
- > Study score of at least 25 in English / English Language / Literature or at least 30 in ESL;
- > Study score of at least 25 in Biology or Chemistry.
