is CDU's largest teaching and research site, 12 km from Darwin's centre, covering 56 ha of parkland. Serviced by major bus routes and extensive cycle track system. Tropical architecture. Quality facilities for education, training and research. Extensive library. Student computer labs. On-campus student accommodation.

Palmerston campus

is located in Palmerston, 20km from Darwin. Set in bushland near Palmerston's retail zone. Relaxed atmosphere. Student training facilities include a restaurant that is open to the public, a commercial kitchen and a simulated hotel. The library has comprehensive electronic learning resources. 24-hour access to computer labs.

Katherine campus

is located 300km south of Darwin. Offers vocational training in targeted areas. CDU town centre study area has computer labs, classrooms, conference areas, lecture theatre and student lounge. The NT Rural College, just north of Katherine, covers 4000 ha and has workshops, cattle handling facilities, stables, library, and computer facilities.

Alice Springs campus

is located in Australia's heart, surrounded by native gardens and the incredible MacDonnell Ranges. Library has an electronic Learning Resource Centre. Extensive facilities for tourism and hospitality students, including multi-award winning Desert Lantern training restaurant.

CDU centres also operate at Jabiru, Nhulunbuy, Yulara and Tennant Creek.

Weather

The Northern Territory extends across a wide area and the weather is distinctly different from north to south.



The region north of Katherine - including Darwin - is known as the Top End. While most Australians freeze through winter, Top Enders enjoy about 10 hours of sunshine a day, low humidity and daily temperatures of about 30 degrees C. Darwin has a long dry season before receiving about three months of monsoonal rain, when the region's lush green scenery springs to life. This season is known as "the wet", and can also bring spectacular lightning displays.

The Top End

The Territory is known for its relaxed lifestyle, dramatic landscapes, rich Indigenous culture, and contrasting climates. It brings together the best of the Aussie Outback and the tropics.

The Territory is jam packed with things to do and see on a student budget. If you are an adventure-seeker who loves the outdoors, the fishing, camping, beach and bushwalking sites are world class and easy to get to.

And if you yearn to travel overseas, the Territory is the perfect launching pad for your next trip. Located on South-east Asia's doorstep, Darwin is serviced by major airlines each day, making it is as easy and affordable to reach Singapore, Bali, Vietnam, the Phillipines and Thailand as it is to fly to Adelaide or Sydney.

Darwin, the Territory capital

Darwin is a young, vibrant and friendly city with a population of about 110,000. Due to its close proximity to Asia and its large Indigenous community, the city is a melting pot of more than 70 nationalities and cultures. The average age in Darwin is 29, which is much younger than other Australian cities. This tropical city is built on Darwin Harbour and features beautiful beaches, a wave pool, great nightlife and the famous Mindil Beach markets. Darwin is also rich in military history, after suffering the worst air raid since Pearl Harbour during World War II.



Alice Springs

Alice Springs is an iconic Outback town, surrounded by the ancient MacDonnell Ranges and arid desert. With its spectacular landscapes, exotic flora and fauna and proximity to Uluru, Alice Springs is a popular tourist destination and an ideal base for starting an Outback adventure. It is the second largest town in the Northern Territory.

Katherine

Three hours drive from Darwin, Katherine is home to the internationally acclaimed Nitmiluk (Katherine Gorge) National Park, and is among the Northern Territory's most popular visitor destinations. Katherine operates as a base for exploring the Gulf region, Kakadu and the Kimberley.



Central Australia

The climate around Alice Springs is markedly different from the Top End. Summers are hot with temperatures regularly in the high 30s, though it's not as humid as the tropics. Winter days are around 20 degrees, while it can sometimes drop below zero overnight.

Getting around

It's easy to get around the Territory, so you can forget about traffic jams and long travelling times. Even in Darwin, it rarely takes more than 15 or 20 minutes to travel from home to university or work, and it's even faster to get around Alice Springs. National highways connect the Territory with the other states. Alternatively, The Ghan is a world-famous rail journey and is a great way to travel between Darwin and Adelaide.

Darwin is the Northern Territory's main international air gateway. Airline services operate to international destinations with connections to the rest of the world.

Alice Springs and Yulara airports are also busy, with direct flights to most Australian capital cities.



Student services and support

Alumni

Once you graduate, you'll be a lifelong friend of CDU. Counselling

Free counselling services are available to students who are experiencing difficulties that affect their academic studies. This can be done either in person, by phone or email. Make an appointment with the Student Counsellor to discuss any issues causing you concern with your academic and/or personal life.

Disability services

We are committed to providing teaching, learning and support to assist students with disabilities to make a successful transition to university. Students with a disability should advise CDU beforehand so we can prepare to meet special needs.

Equity Services

The Equity Services staff assists with counselling, disability support, an accommodation register, student loans, study skills, and complaints and grievances.

Learning support

The School of Academic Language and Learning offers free, one-on-one workshops on topics such as essay writing, how to become a more competent reader, coping with exams, and time management. Undergraduate courses

The minimum admission requirement is met by:

- successful completion of the Northern Territory Certificate of Education (or equivalent) and an Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) of 60 or higher, or
- successful completion of a VET or TAFE award of Certificate IV or higher, or
- attainment of a STAT score of 145 (pre April 2010) or 135 (post April 2010) or greater, or
- submission of an acceptable personal competencies statement and/or employment experience (see special entry section in the SATAC Universities Guide or website at W: www.satac.edu.au), or

successful completion of at least 0.5yr of full-time study (or equivalent) of a higher education degree/ diploma, or

40 credit points in the Preparation for Tertiary Study Program (TEP2) or other recognised bridging or tertiary preparation course. In addition to the minimum admission requirements, some courses take other criteria into consideration. Detailed information on the selection criteria for each course is available on the university's website W: www.cdu.edu.au.

Certain courses have a limit on the number of students who can enrol; this is called a quota, and offers for admission into these courses will be based on merit. This means that even though you may meet the minimum admission requirement to the university, your rank may not be competitive enough to receive an offer to a course that has a quota.

Postgraduate courses

Admission requirements for postgraduate courses are detailed in the course descriptions and are available on the university's website at W: www.cdu.edu.au.

Many of our postgraduate courses have Full Fee Places or Commonwealth Supported Places. Separate SATAC codes are allocated to each fee option. Check the course guide for details of the fees applicable to postgraduate courses.
