he University

The University of Buckingham was founded in 1976. It is the only independent University in the United Kingdom to hold a royal charter, which gives it the power to award its own degrees, and is currently ranked in the top 20 in the country. It is a non profit-making charity. From the outset its primary aim has been to focus on the teaching of students, at a time when government has decided that research should be a university's primary goal (though of course Buckingham has significant and growing research strengths too).

The University of Buckingham is a thriving and challenging academic community, dedicated to excellence. However it remains a university on a human scale: with just under a thousand students on campus it is a place where nobody is lost in the crowd and friendships are quickly made. It has one of the best student:staff ratios in the world and its professors and lecturers are as involved with students as is humanly possible. Thus it is not surprising that it heads the league tables of student satisfaction.

We hope this prospectus will give you a picture of life and

standards in all UK universities.


At Buckingham it is possible for you to complete a normal three-year honours degree in two years. This is not a soft option and there are no short cuts; it should not be confused with a two-year foundation degree or a two-year honours degree where each summer you undertake distance learning or independent reading. Here you simply forego the conventional long summer vacation and are taught on campus for four terms rather than three each year. Although all students pay fees, your saving on living expenses makes a Buckingham degree remarkably cost-effective and you will be able to start earning a year before your counterparts in other universities.

However you may prefer to work at a more leisurely pace or incorporate a period of work experience in your studies.

Most of our programmes are flexible enough to allow this.











Buckingham

The Town

Buckingham is a picturesque English market town. It lies between Milton Keynes to the east and Oxford to the west (there is a regular bus service to both) and is about an hour's journey from London, so the shopping malls, cinemas, theatres and clubs are not far away.

Buckingham boasts such stores as Tesco, Waitrose and W. H. Smith, as well as more specialist shops. There is a range of hotels, restaurants and public houses, as well as the Swan Leisure Centre, which offers a large indoor swimming pool and a gym and fitness centre.

Stowe House, which lies in one of the finest landscape gardens in Europe, is close by, as is Silverstone Circuit, the home of British Motor Racing and the British Grand Prix.

The Campus

The University occupies two historic sites. The Hunter Street site, on the banks of the River Great Ouse, is home to the Business School, the Department of Economics and International Studies, the Clore Laboratory, the Postgraduate Centre, the Students' Union and Refectory, the University Bookshop and a number of the Student Residences. The adjacent Chandos Road Building is home to the English and Modern Foreign Languages

Departments, as well as to the Business Enterprise Hub.

Verney Park is a ten-minute walk away, though a free minibus service runs between the sites. Here are the Law School, the School of Science, the Franciscan Coffee Bar and further student residences.

In view of increasing student numbers, the university has acquired a new six-acre site adjacent to the Hunter Street campus.

The University libraries offer a comprehensive service, with specialist staff available to help you during normal office hours, and a loans and reference service for

at least twelve hours a day during term. Opening hours are extended during examination periods.

There are extensive subject collections to support both recommended and background reading, and a web-based library catalogue provides access to search and user services across campus or from home. Considerable investment in electronic resources gives access to the full text of many journal articles and reports. On the rare occasion when material is not immediately available, it can usually be acquired quickly from other libraries or document supply centres.


Most books in the libraries are on open access and may be borrowed for a month at a time, subject to recall. Multiple copies of essential course texts are provided on special loan arrangements.

Buckingham consistently ranks in the UK's top five universities for IT spend per student. Open access computer rooms across campus are available to students day and night and each contains a high-capacity duplex laser printer.

All study bedrooms are networked and wireless Internet access is provided in the libraries and at hot-spot locations around campus. A 'Moodle' Virtual Learning Environment is used on many courses to give blended learning and access to course materials at any time from anywhere.

Specialist facilities are provided to support particular courses: two dedicated teaching laboratories and two dedicated research laboratories for Applied Computing, a Computer Aided Language Learning laboratory for language courses, and a dedicated Mac laboratory with digital audio and video editing facilities for media courses.

IT Services and the Library actively seek student feedback and are focused on improving and developing the University's information services.

The Student Community
The University of Buckingham is a vibrant
international community. About 40 per cent of our
students come from the United Kingdom or the
European Union; the remainder hail from countries
across the globe. With around 80 nationalities
represented, Buckingham students form friendships and
build up contacts which span the world.

Our students come from a number of different age groups too. Some are school leavers; others are tackling an undergraduate course later in life; others are taking postgraduate courses or are engaged in research. When considering applications from mature students, Buckingham is interested in more than formal educational qualifications.

So the Buckingham culture is rich and varied, with students of different nationalities and ages bound together in a shared and supportive academic life, and learning so much from each other.

Schools
Buckingham comprises four academic Schools:
Law, Business, Humanities (incorporating Social Science and Education), and Science and Medicine, each led by its own Dean. The Schools have a large degree of autonomy.

They are all on a human scale, with our small class sizes offering a degree of integration between staff and students that sets Buckingham apart.

The administrative staff in each School are hugely caring, ensuring that you negotiate your programme, from application to graduation, as smoothly as possible and that any difficulties are ironed out along the way.

ccommodation

Buckingham is able to guarantee you

accommodation for your first year (provided you book and pay for your room beforehand) and it is sometimes possible for undergraduate students to live on campus for the entire programme.

Living on campus enables you to become involved in University activities, make friends and integrate with the University community. For some, this will be the first time in the UK; for some it will be the first time away from home; for some there will be the worry of returning to student living after a gap of some years. But whatever your circumstances, we know how important it is for you to feel at ease and we offer the warmest of welcomes.

All study bedrooms are furnished and centrally heated and most are equipped with a small refrigerator and wash basin. There are shared kitchens for when you wish to cook for yourself. There is some en suite accommodation.


Sunley House, Bishop's Court and Hutber House are designated 'quiet' buildings, and there are a small number of cottages for married couples.

University Accommodation is the responsibility of the Accommodation Officer. There is also a Residence Manager, who will deal with any problems outside office hours, and there is 24 hour security cover on campus. Each residence has a Residential Assistant – a current student who has experience of communal living and is able to sort out any minor problems.

There is also plenty of private accommodation for rent in Buckingham. Many students enjoy the extra independence that this affords, especially in their second year. You can obtain details of local rental agencies from the Accommodation Office.

Ttudent Life

Student life at Buckingham is centred on the restored Tanlaw Mill, on the banks of the River Great Ouse and overlooking one of the town's parks. Here the Refectory is open for hot meals and snacks (if you're worried about survival, you can pay in advance for breakfast and lunch throughout the term) while the refurbished Student Bar offers the cheapest beer and latest opening hours around! On the first floor of the Mill there is a Games Room and a Music Room, as well as 'The Studio' for fitness classes and a number of other social activities. The second floor houses the well equipped Fitness Suite, the Snooker Club, the Table Tennis Room and the Students' Union Office.

At Verney Park there are a further Games Room and Television Room, while the Franciscan Coffee Bar offers a range of hot and cold drinks and snacks.

The Events Officer supports the many societies in putting on the social events – usually discos and live bands – that are held on most Friday nights during term. Other events – such as pool tournaments, quizzes and live music – are also arranged regularly in the Bar, and trips are organised to Clubs in Oxford and Milton Keynes.






For those who prefer more academic or artistic pursuits, there are the Vice Chancellor's *Economist* Club, a termly series of concerts and public lectures, and numerous talks and seminars led by distinguished speakers of which are open to all.

There is also plenty going on in the town of Buckingham, where societies, churches, the Swan Pool and Gym, pubs and restaurants all extend a genuine welcome to students.

There are good transport links to Oxford, Cambridge and Milton Keynes (from where London is a 40-minute train journey). For those who want to bring a car, there is plenty of free parking in the University's car parks.

The highlight of the Buckingham social calendar is The Swan Ball, at which graduating students are able to celebrate their success with family and friends. The Ball is open to all students and staff of the University: can you make it through to the 'survivors photograph' at dawn? Other favourites include the Law Society Ball and Rag Week, when you can have a tremendous amount of fun raising money for local charities.



The Students' Union
Your interests as a student are represented by the
Students' Union, whose President and Executive are
elected by the student body.

A student forum is held twice each term, at which you can raise any concerns. The Union President and Executive also meet regularly with the Vice-Chancellor and his senior staff.

Sport and Fitness
The University's Sport and Fitness Programme
offers you the opportunity to participate in an extensive
range of activities, either at a competitive or a
recreational level.

Why not volunteer for The Chancellor's Cup, which reaches a grand finale during Rag Week? This is a hard fought competition between the Schools, involving students and staff and encompassing a range of sports. You might choose to participate in weight training; develop your skills in kick boxing, tai chi chuan, tae kwon do, golf, Pilates or yoga; or become a member of the Tanlaw Mill Fitness Centre, which is equipped with

a comprehensive range of free weights, resistance and cardiovascular equipment.

E nglish Language Foundation and Pre-degree Programmes

English (EAP) Foundation

The English for Academic Purposes (EAP) Foundation
Programme is designed to prepare you for life and to
study for a degree at a British university. Many
international students may struggle at degree level
because of poor English and lack of study skills. We focus
on the language and study skills you will need to be a
successful student at undergraduate or postgraduate
level. We also focus on the cultural awareness which will
help you to adapt to life in Britain.

You will be introduced to the various academic skills required for university work and given plenty of practice in improving your English. You will also learn effective techniques for giving oral presentations, attend a series of formal lectures to practise listening and note-taking skills, and receive tuition from specialists in business, law and other subject areas. In the final term, you will be shown how to research and produce a written academic project on a topic related to your chosen degree. Each term is ten weeks long and can act either as a free-standing certificated course or as part of a progression

towards university entry. Successful completion of the
1-term EAP Foundation will lead to the award of the
Buckingham EAP Foundation Certificate.

IELTS Foundation

The intensive IELTS preparation course is designed for students of intermediate to upper intermediate level (IELTS 4.5 – 5.0, TOEFL 475 – 500 / 153 – 173) who need to improve their score to qualify for undergraduate admission to a university degree programme in the UK. We keep group sizes small (usually eight to ten students) so that you can benefit from the individual attention of our highly qualified and experienced tutors. You will have 18 hours of classroom tuition each week and regular consultations with your tutor for guidance and advice on your progress and your self-study projects.

If you go on to a Buckingham degree programme, you will have the advantage of knowing the University, fellow students and lecturers before your degree starts.

Entry Requirements, Start Dates and Duration of Course

You should apply directly to the University. An application form is available on our website. The length of your

foundation programme and your possible start date will depend on the standard of your English on entry:

International Foundation Programme

This programme prepares international students for undergraduate degree programmes. It provides a bridge between school study in your home country and undergraduate study at a UK university. All the courses are taught by subject specialist staff at Buckingham, so you will be part of university life from your first day.

On successful completion of the programme you can progress onto a nine-term degree programme in the Schools of Business. Sciences or Humanities. This will mean that for many students your foundation and degree programmes can be completed in three calendar years. If you wish to study for a Law degree, you will, after successful completion of the first two terms, join the Access to Law course. For more details see www.buckingham.ac.uk/law/access/ For students with English as a foreign language, the programme starts in September and lasts four terms. The first term is an intensive English Foundation course. This is followed by three terms of the main International Foundation programme. Other students will join the programme in January for three terms. During the programme you will develop your knowledge of academic subjects through courses related to your future

programme of study. You will also raise your knowledge and confident use of English for academic purposes, and develop your study skills and critical thinking skills before beginning your degree programme.

After the first term of intensive English (if required) the courses studied in the next two terms are English and Study skills, The Business Environment, Introduction to Economic Studies, Life and Institutions, Mathematics for Business and Business Computing. In the last term you will study English for Academic Purposes, Introduction to Financial Studies and International Studies. You will also undertake a project associated with your chosen degree subject.

Teaching, learning and assessment

The International Foundation programme trains you to become an independent learner who is prepared for university study. You will experience all the teaching and learning methods used in British universities, such as lectures, seminars and tutorials. For example, you will develop your listening and note-taking skills and learn how to take part in seminars. You also develop your own ideas through group discussions and class presentations. You will gain practice and training in the different kinds

of assessment that are common in higher education, for example essays, reports, individual and group presentations, learning journals, project work and examinations.

Entry requirements

- Minimum age 17 years
- 12 years of schooling with a good school leaving certificate
- English Language requirements:
 - For September Minimum of IELTS 5.0
 - For direct January entry Minimum of IELTS 6.0 or equivalent
- Mature students will be considered on an individual basis.

ntroduction

The Law School, situated on the University's Verney Park campus and the largest School in the University, offers a stimulating environment for the study and teaching of Law in the modern world.

You will have the opportunity to complete a conventional three-year honours degree in just two years. You can also gain an LLM in International and Commercial Law in a further nine months. High academic standard, combined with a very high level of student supported learning, mean that Buckingham is one of the most respected Law Schools in the United Kingdom. We were in the top 20 in *The Guardian's* league table (2007) and have maintained our strong position ever since. Our dynamic Law School staff are committed to student learning and will help you, through opportunities for vibrant mooting and negotiation and mini-pupillages, to become a confident, competent lawyer, able to practise anywhere in the world. We are very proud of our Personal Tutor system, which provides close, caring support in our small, intimate environment.


The key to successful student learning is our small group teaching – at undergraduate level no more than five or six students in each tutorial group. This small group size is not always offered by other Universities.

Our unique small group tutorials allow you to learn the law with the maximum academic support possible. Your teachers will know you personally and ensure that you will achieve the very best degree you can, by giving you continuous support throughout the year.

You will become proficient in written and oral presentation, develop sound research skills and learn to solve problems in a logical and structured way. In addition, we recognise that law graduates are highly sought after in a broad range of careers outside legal practice and the legal knowledge and skills learnt are transferable skills for those not planning to enter the legal profession.

- The opportunity to engage in practical legal experience by shadowing judges in court and taking up minipupillage opportunities, which the Law School facilitates as part of its Street Legal programme.
- A guaranteed place on our LLM programme and on the Legal Practice Course at the College of Law if you gain second class honours or better.

Programmes

All Buckingham LLB programmes (whether single honours or combined honours) lead to an English 'qualifying law degree' – recognised by the Solicitors Regulation Authority (formerly the Law Society) and the Bar Council – qualifying the holder to be exempt from the academic stage of training for entry into the legal professions.

The core or compulsory foundation subjects must be taken in order to satisfy the requirement for a qualifying law degree. Of the 360 units that make up a Buckingham LLB, 240 are devoted to an Introduction to Legal Studies and the core foundation subjects: European Law, Constitutional and Administrative Law, Criminal Law, Law of Contract, Law of Torts, Land Law and Law of Trusts.

Some countries have additional requirements with regard to optional subject choices. If you are an overseas student you should confirm exactly which additional subjects you must take in order for your degree to qualify as a 'qualifying law degree' for your jurisdiction.

The Buckingham Single Honours programme will qualify students for most other common law jurisdictions.

Single Honours Law (M100) is the most popular choice and consists of the seven core foundation legal subjects required by the professional bodies, with the opportunity to specialise in other subjects. Options currently offered include: Commercial Law, Company Law, Conflict of Laws, Criminology and Criminal Justice, E-Business Law, EU Competition Law, Law of Evidence, Family Law, Intellectual Property Law, International Law, Jurisprudence, Sex and Gender, and Sports Law. Proposed new options under consideration – include Medical Law and Ethics, and Employment Law.

Students may choose to study one non-Law course, for example, a Modern Foreign Language, Computer Skills, Psychology or Business. Further details can be found on the Law School's Web pages.

Combined Honours Law allows students to take the core foundation subjects and devote the remaining one-third (120 units) of the degree to another subject area.

Students may also take Law as a minor element with two-thirds of the degree in another subject area such as Business or Psychology. For further details, please refer to the relevant major subject in this prospectus.

Assessment

Students are generally expected to complete 90 units of study every six months. Assessment is predominantly through written examinations held at the end of each six-month period, although there is continuous

assessment in the form of written assignments in some subjects, and practical skills are assessed in our Legal Skills course.

The Buckingham LLB (Part-time) Single Honours Law (part-time) may be taken over four years. The programme follows a more traditional academic year, starting in September with annual examinations each June. The course covers all the core subjects taken on the full-time programme and are generally taught by the same members of the teaching staff.

Optional subjects are taken in years 3 and 4, and delivery of all subjects is by seminar. Teaching takes place on Wednesday evenings over 30 weeks each year. A separate booklet on this programme is available directly from the Law School, and there are Open Evenings twice a year.

Assessment

The LLB taken by part-time study has an element of continuous assessment in every course, also examinations held once a year in June.

Entry Requirements for the Full-time LLB and Part-time LLB

Normally applicants will be required to have:

- At least 300 points at A-Level or the equivalent school leaving qualification.
- If English is not your first language, an IELTS score of
 6.5 or a computer-based TOEFL score of 233+.

The School is able to be flexible for mature students applying to either the Full-time or Part-time LLB programmes. Certain approved professional qualifications may also be considered.



The Law School expects applicants generally to have three good A-levels or their equivalent. Where this is not the case – perhaps because secondary education in your home country does not extend to 18 years of age, or you have not been engaged in full-time study for some time – we may recommend that you take our six-month Access to Law programme, starting in January or July, before proceeding to the LLB.

Unlike most Access programmes elsewhere, ours is taught by academics who also teach on our LLB programmes. They understand the skills you need to gain the best possible degree and will help you to acquire them.

Programmes

You may then choose your own options from a combination of full courses (40 units), half courses (20 units), and a research element (40 units) to make up the total requirement of 180 units. The **Diploma in International and Commercial Law** requires successful completion of 100 units, as well as the Legal Research and Research Methodology course (20 units).

Programme: Banking Law, Agency and Insurance Law,
Commercial Conflict of Laws, Law of Business Organisations,
Corporate Insolvency Law, Public International Law:

- World Trade Specialist designation: To be awarded an LLM with a 'World Trade Specialist' designation you need to obtain a pass in courses totalling no less than 120 units from the designated courses of Corporate Insolvency Laws, Commercial Conflict of Laws, International Intellectual Property Law, International Trade and Maritime Law, Law of World Trade, Banking Law, Tax Havens, Money Laundering and Trust Laws, plus dissertation on a relevant area of Law of World Trade (40 units).
- International Law Specialist designation: To be
 awarded an LLM with an 'International Law Specialist'
 designation you need to obtain a pass in courses
 totalling no fewer than 120 units from the designated
 courses of Commercial Conflict of Laws,
 Fragmentation and Methods in International Law,
 Public International Law: Issues and Contemporary
 Practice, Law of World Trade, International Trade and
 Maritime Law, Law of War, International Medical Law,
 International Sex and Gender Law plus dissertation on
 a relevant area of International Law (40 units).
- Research: You may choose to complete either three

As part of the learning experience, trips are organised for LLM students to visit International and EU Legal Institutions.

Entry points

January entry

The taught programme starts in January each year and lasts for three terms, finishing in September of the same year.

English EAP Foundation

You can take a 2-term EAP Foundation course starting in July, or a 1-term EAP Foundation course starting in September, before joining the taught LLM in January of the following year, if your IELTS is below 6.5. These courses are intended for overseas applicants whose English Language skills are insufficient to enable them to undertake postgraduate level study immediately. For English language entry requirements, please see page 20.

Entry Requirements for the LLM or Diploma

Normally you will be required to have:

 A first – or second-class honours degree from a UK university or an equivalent academic qualification from an overseas institution. Usually this will be in Law or in a degree programme where Law is a significant element.



The Business School offers outstanding undergraduate and postgraduate programmes in Accounting and Finance, Business and Management, Marketing and Business Enteprise. For the last four years the University has come top of the National Student Survey, with the Business School being ranked first in its category in 2008 and third in 2009. This is undoubtedly because of its focus on high academic quality, excellent small-group teaching, full and constructive feedback, and ongoing caring support for students. Also in May 2010 the Business School ranked 2nd in *The Guardian* league tables.

The Buckingham Business School, which is situated in the Anthony de Rothschild Building on the Hunter Street campus, encompasses the Departments of Management, Accounting and Service Management as well as the Centre for Automotive Management. We are an accredited study centre for the Chartered Institute of Marketing and we have a growing number of collaborations with universities in other parts of the world.

The world of business is constantly changing. It has become more global, more entrepreneurial and more concerned with the environment. The Business School at Buckingham is small and flexible enough to keep pace with such change.

Management (Undergraduate)

We are unique in being able to provide you with a fast track to success:

- Small group teaching by stimulating, dedicated and accessible staff.
- You may start your undergraduate Business and Management programme in September or January.
- Because Buckingham forgoes the long summer vacation, you will be able to complete the equivalent of a conventional three-year honours degree in two four-term years.
- We place a strong emphasis on innovation in programme design and believe in a stimulating and entrepreneurial mindset.
- We realise the importance of employability and we hope you will join the ranks of our graduates who hold senior positions in a multitude of companies throughout the world.

BSc (Hons) Business and Management (NN12)

Business is a live and many-faceted subject area: on this recently re-designed programme, conventional teaching and learning approaches are enhanced by practical projects,

equipping you to meet the needs of commerce and industry. In the first year, you will develop an understanding of core business functions and activities, as well as developing your knowledge of Accounting, Economics, Law, Analytical Methods and Information Systems.

In the second-year, the core courses include Human Resource
Management, Business Operations, International Business
and Corporate Strategy. Optional courses enable you to
pursue your own particular interests and include
Entrepreneurship, Consumer Behaviour, Service
Management, Operations Strategy, Supply Chain
Management, Management Accounting, Financial
Management, Business Psychology and E-Commerce.

Business and Management can also be studied as a major/minor combination with French or Spanish.

BSc (Hons) Business and Management with French (N1R1)
BSc (Hons) Business and Management with Spanish (N1R4)
Both of these programmes equip students not only with
the necessary skill-set to succeed in the world of Business,
but open up a myriad of global opportunities by teaching
the additional skill of a Modern Foreign Language,

whether students are at A-level standard, have a basic knowledge, or are starting from scratch.

BSc (Hons) Business and Management with Information Systems (N1G5)

This programme equips students to become innovative Information Systems designers with career opportunities in business, industry and commerce. There is a particular emphasis on the fundamentals of the underlying technologies that support the development of computer-based information systems, so that you will be able to cope with the rapid advances in this field.

BSc (Hons) Business and Management with Communication Studies (EFL, N1P9; ESL, N1PX)

This programme is aimed specifically at non-native speakers of English. It contains the core courses of the Business and Management programme with modules designed to develop students' language and communication skills, so that they can function effectively in the global business environment of today.

BSc Marketing (Combined Honours)

Marketing at Buckingham can be studied in combination with Media Communications (N5P3), Psychology (N5C8),

or a Modern Foreign Language, (N5R1, French; N5R4, Spanish). These programmes start in January only.

The core Marketing courses are Marketing, Marketing
Communications, Consumer Behaviour and International
Marketing. These are supported by options that include
Business Psychology, E-Commerce and Service Management.

The Media Communications minor includes courses in Publication Design, Press Journalism, Principles of Media Practice, Advertising, News Management and Public Relations.

The Psychology minor includes courses in Cognition,
Perception, Forensic Psychology and Individual Differences.

Languages taught at Buckingham are French and Spanish.

Either language is studied throughout the two years of the Marketing programme.

BSc Business Enterprise (N190)

The BSc Business Enterprise programme is a unique business degree that helps you to study and learn practical business and life skills, by starting and running a real business as an integral part of the degree. This

two-year (eight-term) programme has a practical emphasis and is aimed at those who have flair, creativity and a "can-do" attitude. It helps nurture in you a fearless ability to "make things happen".

The programme also encourages innovation and entrepreneurship and guides you through the process of developing, launching and running a business. This equips students with the highly transferable skills of analysing complex business problems, creating a personal reputation and developing business-networking skills. This expertise will enable you to run a business to participate effectively in management decision-making in any business or organisation.

Alongside the study of Marketing, Financial Accounting, Management Accounting, Business Law, Economics, Quantitative Methods and other subjects, you will develop a business plan (either individually or as part of a management team) and then pitch to the Venture Capital Panel for the "seed-corn" capital needed to establish and run the business. At the end of the course you may buy the business from the University at an attractive price or it will be closed. This programme starts in January only.

Assessment

Students are generally expected to complete 90 units of study every six months. Assessment is through both continuous assessment (including, for Business Enterprise students, an appraisal of the management of your business) and examinations held at the end of each six-month period.



Entry Requirements

- At least 240 points at A-level or an equivalent school leaving qualification.
- For Business Enterprise, at least 300 points at A-level is preferred or an equivalent international school leaving qualification. However, as this programme is aimed at entrepreneurial students, if students do not achieve these grades but have an entrepreneurial drive and commitment, they should still apply. Because of the practical nature of the Business Enterprise programme, numbers are limited. Entry to the programme is therefore competitive and short-listed candidates are invited for interview. We are looking for students who not only have good A-level grades (or their equivalent) but are also entrepreneurial in spirit, able to think laterally and prepared to work hard to make a success of their business.
- At least five GCSE (or equivalent) passes, including Mathematics, at grade C or above.
- We are able to be flexible for mature students and will consider certain approved professional qualifications.
- If English is not your first language, an IELTS score of 6.0 or a computer-based TOEFL score of 213.

The Buckingham MBA

The prospect of a rewarding career and more lucrative economic lifestyle draws students to MBA programmes from almost every sector of the globe. Today's employers search for graduates of MBA programmes to find the best talent available. On the Buckingham MBA you will develop the skills and knowledge necessary for meeting the challenges of today's changing international business world, through the enthusiasm and expertise of our tutors.

The MBA is a four-term programme which takes one year to complete and begins in January each year. You will be joined by students from a range of different countries with a variety of work experience in different industries. This will give you first-hand experience of working in multicultural groups, which is recognised as being vital for networking in expanding global businesses.

MBA students are encouraged to participate in a range of activities and talks by experts from industry, aimed at personal and career development. You will also have the opportunity to get involved in real-life projects as well as real-time business simulation.

During the first term, a unique series of assimilation modules prepares you for the core courses taught in the remaining terms, whilst the optional courses allow a degree of specialisation.

Core courses are: Strategic Management, Managing
People across Cultures, Finance, Business Law, Operational
Management, Marketing Research, Human Resource
Management, Global Business, Marketing in the 21st Century.

MSc in Service Management

Over 70% of the world's economy is in services and the ability to create and deliver reliable customer-centred service is a differentiator for business today. In many industries profit margins on product sales have shrunk enormously, leading to an increased focus on generating profits through value-added services. Thus the best firms now bundle customer-centred service with a manufactured product and create service-centred solutions. Some, like

IBM, have moved completely to service and solutions. Service Management as a body of knowledge is still in the early stages of development. Buckingham is among the very few universities in the world to have responded to the demand for the creation of expertise in this area and to have established a track record of success.

The MSc in Service Management is designed to enhance and develop executives' skills and knowledge so that they can play effective roles in helping their organisations win through service. The taught component of the programme is from January to September and it focuses on building knowledge in core areas, delivered through 18 two-day intensive modules.

Core courses include: Integrated Service Marketing and Management, Managing People in Services, Practical Research Methods, Services Quality and Operations, Service Leadership for Organisational Transformation, Managing People across Cultures, Project Management and Financial Information for Business.

The last three months include both taught courses and a Dissertation. The taught courses augment students' knowledge in the core areas and help them understand

the complexity of managerial decision-making.

Supplementary courses include: Project Management,

Financial Decisions in Business, and Business Ethics and

Corporate Governance.

The Dissertation is normally project-based. Projects normally deal with live issues of concern to organisations.

Other options available are a specialisation in **Human**

Resource Management and a Sandwich programme.

The Sandwich programme allows students to add a sixmonth work placement, which makes it an 18-month programme. Past projects and placements have included KPMG, PWC, Accenture, Deloite Touche, Thomas Cook, Taj Hotels, Granada, Air Seychelles, Lufthansa, Seimens, Hutch, Yahoo, Thames Water, Anglian Water, VW, Daimler Benz, Jungheinrich, Peugeot, Volvo, Abbey National, Prudential, HDFC, NCR and IBM.

Certificate in Management Studies (Pre-Masters)

The Business School offers a two-term (six months)

Certificate in Management Studies programme from July
to December. It is designed primarily for those who need
an introduction to Management education before
proceeding to a Masters course. The programme is also



suitable for those who wish to acquire sound management skills, perhaps because of a change in career direction, but are unable to devote a whole year to study. Students with a good first degree who successfully complete the Certificate with IELTS 6.5 (or equivalent) and with three years of relevant work experience are eligible for entry to the MBA or MSc in Service Management the following January.

The subjects offered are:

Term 1 – Principles of Microeconomics, Marketing,
Organisational Behaviour, Business Ethics
Term 2 – Integrated Operations Management, Law for
Business, Marketing and Quantitative Methods for Business

Assessment

Examinations are held in December.

Entry Points

January entry

The MBA and MSc programmes start in January each year and last for four terms, finishing in December of the same year. The MSc Service Management (sandwich) programme takes 18 months to complete as it includes six months on work placement.

July entry

The Certificate in Management programme starts in July and lasts two terms, finishing in December of the same year.

Entry Requirements

- A first or second-class honours degree from a UK university, or an equivalent academic qualification from an overseas institution. Usually this will be in a business related subject.
- For MSc and Certificate students, certain approved professional qualifications may be considered in the absence of this requirement.
- If English is not your first language, an IELTS score of 6.5 (6.0 for Certificate students) or computer based TOEFL score of 233+.
- The personal motivation and commitment to make a major contribution to your programme.
- Candidates for the MBA are normally expected to have at least two years of relevant work experience.

Accounting (Postgraduate)

MSc Accounting and Finance



HUMANITIES

T ntroduction

At Buckingham the term "Humanities" encompasses a wide range of subjects including Economics, Politics, History, Modern Foreign Languages, Philosophy, English Language and Literature, Journalism and Education. In other words the "Social Sciences" find a home within the School in addition to Language and Literature. The teaching of such subjects is much enhanced by the one-to-one and small-group teaching that Buckingham emphasises.

Studying the Humanities is sometimes falsely characterised as a type of indulgence – "consumption" in the language of economists rather than "investment", a "luxury" suitable for retirement rather than a useful preparation for life. Even by the narrowly utilitarian standards of much modern discourse however, this view is mistaken. The skills developed through studying the Humanities – clarity and precision of language, knowledge of cultural evolution and historical change, the ability to communicate with others and to construct clear lines of argument – are of the greatest importance for all kinds of worldly success whether in business, politics, consultancy, journalism or academic life. "The

light of all humane minds is perspicuous words,"
asserted Thomas Hobbes. The development of "humane
minds" remains the ultimate objective of the School of
Humanities, but preparing students to pursue their
future career goals is also of central importance.

- History may be studied as a major or minor subject with most Humanities subjects, and focuses on conceptual and specialised history in the 19th and 20th centuries.
- Situated in the Anthony de Rothschild Building on the Hunter Street campus, the Department's small size and unique international student mix provide the ideal venue for programmes in Economics, International Studies, History or Politics.

ndergraduate Programmes BSc (Econ) (Hons) Economics (L100)

This programme offers the opportunity to study issues of economic policy. For example, the problem of achieving macroeconomic and exchange rate stability has been of great importance to many countries in recent years, while microeconomic issues such as the allocation of resources to health or to raising environmental quality continue to figure prominently in public discussion.

Buckingham Economics graduates are working as academics in major universities throughout the world, as analysts and bankers in the City of London, and in other financial institutions and NGOs worldwide. To choose two prestigious appointments at random, the Director, Resource America, Inc. is an Economics alumnus from Buckingham, as is the Head of the Economics

Department at the University of Concepcion, Chile. There are many, many others.

Courses studied include Microeconomics and

Macroeconomics, Introduction to Business, Introduction
to Management, Quantitative Methods, Statistics for
Business and Economics, and Mathematics for Economists.

Second year courses include International Economics, the
Economics of Europe and Money, Banking and Financial
Markets. Options include History of Economic Thought,
Regulation and Privatisation, Industrial Organisation and
Strategy, Public Sector Economics, Welfare Economics,
Policy Issues in Less Developed Economies, Health
Economics and Policy, and Legal Economics.

BSc (Econ) (Hons) Business Economics (L112)

The Business Economics degree aims to provide a sound foundation for students wanting to work in the modern business world. It focuses on the study of important economic and social ideas, in order to help you understand the processes behind growth and change in the modern economy. It will also enable you to appreciate the many problems emerging in an interdependent world, where prosperity is increasingly threatened by the pressure on resources and by the possibilities of economic and political conflict, but where opportunities for the internationally aware are steadily growing.

Courses studied include Macroeconomics and Microeconomics, Introduction to Management, Introduction to Business, Financial Accounting and Management Accounting, Quantitative Methods, Mathematics for Economists, Statistics for Economists and Marketing.

Second year options include History of Economic

Thought, Regulation and Privatisation, Industrial

Organisation and Strategy, Applied Business Techniques,

Consumer Behaviour, Human Resource Management,
Law for Business, Financial Management, Public Sector
Economics, Welfare Economics, Business Psychology,
International Economics, Macroeconomic Theory, Quality
Management, Taxation, Macroeconomic Policy, the
Economics of Europe, Marketing Communications,
International Marketing, Operations Management and
Money, Banking and Financial Markets.

BSc (Hons) Economics, Business and Law (LM11)

This combined degree appeals to students who recognise that the interface between Law, Business and Economics is a fascinating and crucially important area. It is also an excellent preparation if you are considering entering the legal profession and going on to take the Common Professional Examinations, or if you wish to enter the business world.

After gaining the necessary background knowledge in the first year, you will be able to choose from a wide variety of options in the second year to suit your particular interests, including: Regulation and Privatisation, Welfare Economics, International Economics, Public Sector Economics, Money, Banking and Financial Markets,

Economics of Europe, Marketing Communications,
Information Systems, International Human Resource
Management, Business Ethics, Quality Management,
Company Law, Commercial Law, Comparative Securities
Regulation, EU Law.

BSc (Hons) Economics with Information Systems (L1L2)

Economic advice is only as good as the information upon which it is based. As a professional economist with training and competence in Information Systems, you will be uniquely well placed to understand the processes that generate the knowledge and information which are becoming ever more critical for decision-making within the modern organisation. During the first year you will follow introductory courses in both Information and Communication Technologies and Fundamentals of Database Systems, as well as in Microeconomics and Macroeconomics. During the second year you will study such specialist areas as Information Security, Human-Computer Interaction, Strategic Management of Information Systems, the Economics of Europe, International Economics, Legal Economics, Welfare and Regulation and Privatisation.

BSc (Hons) Economics with Journalism (L1P5)

Business and financial journalists play an important role in describing and analysing economic events and complicated policy issues for a wider public, and in bridging the cultural gaps between the worlds of commercial markets, government service and academic research.

This degree programme – one of very few in England to develop the skills of the traditional economist and match them with those of the business journalist – will equip you to embark upon a fascinating career. A spring term placement offers you the chance to practise your newly acquired skills and to bring them to the attention of future employers.

After mastering the introductory and intermediate concepts in Microeconomics and Macroeconomics, you will develop your expertise in such areas as Investigative Journalism, Business Journalism, Broadcast Journalism and Press Journalism. You will also study such specialist areas as Europe, Health, Industrial Organisation, Welfare, Public Sector Economics, Regulation, and Less Developed Economies.

The 21st century is seeing enormous social tensions as technological and political developments come into conflict with long established ways of doing things in every country. Political and social systems are in a continuous process of adjustment to an increasingly open world; and as the peoples of the world come into closer contact with each other there are increasing opportunities for international co-operation and understanding, but also, unfortunately, for international conflict.

The International Studies programme at Buckingham gives students an opportunity to learn about these fundamental problems. The programme is inter-disciplinary

and covers economic, political, legal, historical and cultural dimensions. Graduates from the International Studies programme will have acquired a knowledge of Economics sufficient to analyse and understand the global marketplace; a familiarity with political systems in a range of different countries; and a good historical understanding of how the international framework has evolved over time.

The International Studies programme is an ideal preparation for careers in the media, journalism, international business, politics, diplomacy or education. It also forms an excellent basis for entry into the MA in Global Affairs or Security and Intelligence Studies, or if you have sufficient work experience for admission to an MBA programme. Recent alumni are working with the EU in Brussels, have founded their own companies and are working in both public relations and international relations.

Politics

Indispensable to a well-rounded education in the increasingly globalised 21st century world, the study of Politics has been an established part of teaching at Buckingham since the foundation of the University.

Studying both political science and political theory, students receive a comprehensive exposure to this wide-ranging field. Politics courses range from regional specialisations such as the politics of the UK, EU and Latin America and theoretical issues relating to cultural diversity and the role of markets in contemporary societies to international relations theory and the status of international organisations.

BA (Hons) Politics, Economics and Law (Looo)

Politics can be studied with Economics and Law in a programme that provides a broad-based education in the Humanities and Social Sciences. Politics forms the core of the degree and you have the opportunity to choose from a wide variety of Economics and Law courses. This degree

equips you extremely well for careers in public service, both in the UK and overseas.

In the first year, as well as a study of UK and US
Government and Western European Political Systems,
options include:

Economics: Principles of Microeconomics; Principles of Macroeconomics; Microeconomic Theory; Macroeconomic Theory; Money, Banking and Financial Markets; Industrial Organisation and Strategy.

Law: Constitutional and Administrative Law; Law of Civil Obligations.

History at Buckingham has long had a close connection with international studies generally and the courses on offer reflect that focus. In addition, it has recently expanded the range of its courses to include a strong British element, particularly the role of Britain in the evolution of democracy and the nation state and in the political and intellectual evolution of Victorian Britain. An opportunity for pursuing personal historical interests is also provided through the introduction of a final term Dissertation (if History is studied as a major subject).

History can be studied as a major subject in the following degree programmes:

History with Journalism (V2P5)

History with Politics (V2L2)

The following joint honours programmes (with equal weighting) are also available:

Assessment

Students are normally examined every six months.

Some options contain an element of coursework and the opportunity exists to submit a

Dissertation in place of a written examination in certain cases.



Study Options: Two Years or Three Years?

By working for four terms each year, Buckingham allows you to complete the equivalent of a three-year honours degree in just two years.

However, degree programmes in Economics and in International Studies can also be studied over a period of three traditional academic years (running from late September to June). If you join in September, you will take your preliminary examinations in June of the following year. You then have two options:

Either you can proceed immediately to the next stage of your degree by working through the summer term, in which case you may complete your studies after a further consecutive six terms, i.e. in December of the following year.

Or you can use each of the summer vacations for travel, work experience or leisure and complete your degree programme in June two years later.

Entry Points

January, July (eight terms) and September (nine terms or three years – see above).

Entry Requirements

- A minimum of 240 points at A-level or the equivalent school leaving qualification.
- A minimum of five subjects, including Mathematics and English, at grade C or above at GCSE, or the equivalent.
- The School is able to be flexible for mature students and certain approved professional qualifications may also be considered as a qualification for entry.
- If English is not your first language, an IELTS score of
 6.0 or a computer-based TOEFL score of 213.

Postgraduate Programmes MA Global Affairs

The aim of this professional training programme – the only one of its kind in the UK – is to prepare graduates for rapid advancement into high-powered senior professional work in the following areas: financial and commercial institutions, serious international journalism, trade and industry, global civil society (including non-governmental organisations), foreign ministries and international organisations. The programme is also suitable for those without a particular career aim in mind but who wish to acquire an advanced understanding of global affairs.

The programme is based on four areas of study:
International Law; Global Economics and Finance; Global
Governance, and the Evolution of the Global System.
Other more specific related subjects are also considered:
Security Challenges, including Environmental Issues,
Diplomacy and Global business. The courses, which are
taught intensively through lectures and small-group
tutorials, assume little prior knowledge and rapidly bring
students to an advanced level of understanding.

Entry points

The programme starts in April, July and September and lasts for four terms.

MA in Security and Intelligence Studies

The MA in Security and Intelligence Studies provides students with a deep, research-led understanding of contemporary security and intelligence issues, examining how intelligence agencies operate within western democracies and the policy and political environment in which this takes place.

The programme comprises a 10,000-word Dissertation and six taught modules: Terrorism and Counter Terrorism; Intelligence and International Security since 1939; Current Threats: Internal and External; Case Studies in Intelligence: Success and Failure; Intelligence Tradecraft and Machinery; and a Simulation Exercise. Emphasis is placed on relating academic and historical analyses to current problems and policy questions. Uniquely, the course explores the actual practice of security and intelligence work, making it specially useful to those with professional or potential career interests in this or any intelligence-led security activity.

MA in Intelligence History with Bletchley Park Studies

Bletchley Park (or 'Station X') is known across the world as the place where Britain's code-breakers created the most valuable and productive source of intelligence in World War II. The programme aims to demonstrate the unique importance of Bletchley Park in the context of the history of intelligence in World War II, and its outcomes, whilst at the same time identifying how Bletchley Park's successes led to further advances in intelligence-led activity. Students will also gain an understanding of the depth and nuance of historical intelligence study, which will serve not just to satisfy the curiosity of postgraduates but to stimulate them to undertake their own research into Bletchley Park's legacy. Assessment is by Dissertation under supervision.

Entry points

These programmes start in January, April and September and last for four terms.

Entry requirements for MA programmes

Normally, for both programmes, you will be required to have:

• A first or second-class honours degree from a UK

university or an equivalent academic qualification from an overseas institution

- Appropriate work experience will also be taken into account in assessing an applicant's suitability for the programme.
- If English is not your first language, an IELTS score of
 6.5 or computer-based TOEFL score of 233+.

ndergraduate Programmes BA (Hons) English Literature (Q300)

The English degree is focused on serious intellectual engagement with works of literature, in their social, political, and cultural contexts, as texts and as works of art. The Department concentrates on literature from 1500 to the present day. We consider literary study in the 21st century to be a frontier discipline, embracing debates emerging from the adjacent fields of philosophy, history, politics and psychology, and the study of communications and the media. Your encounter with great writers and thinkers will raise your intellectual level, give you powers of argument and analysis and a serious understanding of language, and at the same time develop a skills base that includes professional-level writing skills, research methods and presentation skills. Our recent graduates have gone on to pursue careers in the media, writing, teaching, academia, and marketing and business.

You will be expected to read widely and to develop strong lines of argument and personal responses to what you find, anchored in an informed understanding and reference to the critical debates that animate the discipline. The degree is structured around a combination

of period study (Eras of English, Renaissance Literature, Shakespearean Drama, Restoration and Augustan Literature, Romantic Literature, Victorian Fiction and Poetry, Modernist Writing, Modern American Literature, Contemporary Writing, Contemporary Drama), thematic study (Art of Journalism, Women's Writing, Film Studies, Plays in Performance), and courses inculcating theoretical and practical skills (Creative Writing, Approaches to Literature, Stylistics). The range of options means that you have the chance to pursue your own particular strengths and areas of interest.

If you take the single honours degree, a six-month Dissertation option allows you scope to study and develop a favourite subject to an advanced level of sophistication. The completed Dissertation can make an ideal calling-card for students wishing to apply for MA or doctoral programmes. In the last six months of study we encourage our students to lay the foundations for working life post-graduation through a closely supervised external placement.

BA (Hons) English Studies (Q301)

English Literature with Spanish (Q3R4)

The BA in English Studies offers a combination of English Language and English Literature courses, and aims to immerse students in both linguistic and literary specialisms of English The programme includes elements of literary history, contextual analysis and thematic text-based study as well as stylistic and social examination of global, trans cultural and interpersonal communication in different media. It is available for native speakers of English and for EFL students.

BA (Hons) English Studies with Media Communications (Q3P3)

This innovative programme is primarily aimed at native and second language speakers of English, or very advanced EFL speakers. It combines the study of English Literature and the English Language in its many varieties

and uses, with a minor programme that introduces students to a wide range of skills and disciplines associated with the use of English in the media, communications and journalism. You might also wISH to consider our alternative programme, English Studies with Journalism (see below). For competent EFL speakers, the Communication (EFL) and Media Studies programme offers a degree for those wanting to work in the media industries in their home countries.

BA (Hons) English Studies for Teaching (XQ13) BA (Hons) English Studies for Teaching (EFL) (QX31)

These programmes - each aimed at students with different English language skills - are particularly attractive to students who want to learn about the latest methodology for teaching English. Each programme consists of a combination of courses in English language and communication studies together with literature courses, applied linguistics courses and specialist teacher training courses in TEFL Skills and TEFL Methods, Teaching Young Learners and Teaching Literacy, Testing and Materials, and Teaching Academic English.

The EFL programme (QX31) is designed for speakers of

English as a foreign language from overseas who want to work as teachers of English as a foreign language in their home countries. The non-EFL programme (XQ13) is designed for native or speakers of English who want to teach English at home or abroad.

BA (Hons) English Studies with Journalism (Q3PM)

This programme differs from English Studies with Media Communications (above) in the emphasis placed, in the last half-year of study, on preparing students for work specifically as a journalist. Core courses in Broadcast Journalism and Photojournalism allow you to specialise within the field and acquire key skills and understanding of the structure, design and language of these visual media. For competent EFL speakers, the Communication (EFL) and Media Studies programme offers a degree with a related but somewhat different focus.

BA (Hons) Communication, Media and Journalism (Q335)

This programme comprises study and training in a wide range of aspects of the subject-field, including online media, news management, public relations, advertising, photojournalism, broadcast journalism and legal/ethical issues in journalism, and is intended for those

considering careers in these and related fields.

There are courses in communication and English language studies together with a range of introductory and then advanced-level courses in media and journalism. The former aim to professionalise students' English language and writing abilities, while the latter cover the technological aspects of media and journalism.

BA (Hons) Communication (EFL) and Media Studies (Q3Po)

This programme is for competent speakers of English as a foreign language from overseas who want to work in the media, journalism or communication industries, usually in their home countries. It offers courses in communication and English language studies (EFL) together with a range of introductory and advanced courses in media and journalism. The former aim to improve your English language abilities to a high level, while the latter allow you to get to grips with the increasingly important technological aspects of the subject.

The programme is particularly attractive to students who intend to pursue careers in areas where the English, journalistic skills and media knowledge which they have

acquired on the programme will equip them for work in an exciting, international or global media environment.

BA (Hons) Journalism with English Literature (P5Q3)

Journalism informs, entertains, introduces debate, publicises truth, and is an essential component of a democratic society. It is practised across a variety of media (print, broadcast, online) and uses a number of technologies.

At Buckingham you are taught by practising journalists with a love of teaching and of sharing their expertise and knowledge.

We offer several combined honours degrees. The following core courses are common to all: Advertising Art of Journalism, Broadcast Journalism, Business Journalism, Introduction to Reporting, Introduction to Multimedia, Investigative Reporting, Media Discourse, Media Studies, News Management and PR, Online Media,

Photojournalism, Press Journalism and Principles of Media Practice.

You are also guaranteed a substantial work placement with a media firm, tailored to your choice and the department's recommendation. Not only will you become familiar with life in the workplace, but the experience you gain will be valued by employers.

Journalism with English Literature combines practical, hands-on instruction in journalism with an approach to English Literature (see above) that emphasises critical skill and scholarship. It draws on the many natural synergies between literature, language and media production.

Journalism with Communication Studies combines the study of journalism with the study of the use of English as the essential communicative medium, training you as a journalist while developing your understanding of the English Language.

Journalism with International Studies is aimed at those who want to explore the wider world as a journalist. It combines journalism with detailed study of international politics and history, drawing on the close alliance

between politics, the communicative media, and the complex role of the press and broadcasting in the mediation of politics to the public.

Journalism may also be studied with French or Spanish subject to timetable constraints.

Free Choice and Voluntary Options

Six-month French and Spanish language courses are offered at all levels – from Beginners to Advanced –

during each academic year, and are open to undergraduate and postgraduate students. There are entry points in January and July.

If your undergraduate degree programme allows you to choose a 30-unit (two-term) 'Free Choice' option, this is an ideal opportunity to learn a language. However only intermediate level courses at Part I, and advanced level courses at Part II, may contribute to your final degree classification.

The Department also welcomes you if you wish to learn a language on a voluntary basis – in addition to your degree programme. While voluntary students do not gain credits towards their degree, you will nevertheless acquire a valuable and valued set of skills that will be an important addition to your c.v. and make you stand out to potential employers.

Syllabuses are graded to match the linguistic competence of each group and incorporate skills applicable to the world of work. If you have had previous experience of learning a language, you will be individually assessed to ensure that you start at a level that is right for you.

Postgraduate Programmes MA in English Literature by Research

The focus of the MA is on achieving high-level skills in literary research. During the programme students complete a research thesis, of approximately 30,000–40,000 words, on a particular subject in English Literature that interests them. The emphasis is on independent research on a topic chosen by the candidate, who works with a supervisor who guides them, helps refine their ideas, and comments in detail on the drafts of the thesis.

There are seminars on research methodology and other seminars on a range of literary topics led by faculty academics and eminent guest lecturers. These seminars, held at times convenient to the group, are of value in themselves, but they also allow students to meet together and benefit from each other's experiences. The

Department has particular expertise in 19th and 20th century literature, though proposals for research in other areas are also welcomed.

Part-time Option

Those with limited time may prefer to spread the writing of their Dissertation over two years, in which case an individual timetable of lectures and supervisions will be arranged.

Entry Requirements

- Applicants will be expected to have a good honours degree in English Literature or a related or relevant subject.
- EFL students need an IELTS or equivalent of at least 6.5 and demonstrable knowledge of English language.

Programmes in London

It has become increasingly clear that some of our more specialist postgraduate programmes are best taught in London, where students benefit from easy access to major libraries, museums and galleries. The University is now offering two new MA programmes – The MA in Decorative Arts and the MA by research in Military History. The long established MA in Biography is also being taught in London.

We have a base for both administration and teaching at the European School of Economics in Grosvenor Place; other teaching takes place at the Wallace Collection (Decorative Arts) and the Royal Society for the Arts (Military History).

MA in Biography

This ground-breaking programme is aimed at anyone

who has an interest in biography or in researching and writing biography for themselves. Graduates have gone on to publish their own books and to win prizes. Some have embarked on further research for the MPhil or DPhil in Biography. The programme is more relevant than ever today when people are taking time out of the job market to sharpen their skills and enrich their interests.

Guest seminars are led by leading biographers, critics, publishers and agents, including Frances Wilson, Frances Spalding, Jeremy Lewis, Rupert Shortt, Caroline Dawnay and Andrew Lownie.

The programme runs for a year, with entry points in September and January. Teaching takes place over three terms. Students have a choice between following the taught MA or the MA by research. All students on the programme are required to attend seminars, and these classes are one of the most distinctive and valuable elements of the MA. The modules on Biography and Autobiography are designed to combine the study of classic biographies and memoirs with contemporary writing. In addition, the Research Methods module provides an invaluable and innovative training especially devised for biographers.

One of the unique strengths of the programme is the supervision which is provided for students working on dissertations. One-to-one supervisions are held every two or three weeks during term.

MA in Decorative Arts and Historic Interiors

This unique MA in French and British Decorative Arts and Interiors is taught in collaboration with the Wallace Collection, home to one of the finest collections of French eighteenth-century fine and decorative arts in the world. Much of the teaching takes place in the Wallace Collection galleries, drawing on the unrivalled resources of the Collection and the expertise of its curatorial staff. The programme, which is generously supported by the Esmée Fairburn Foundation, appeals to those wishing to make careers in heritage organisations, antique-dealing and auctioneering, museums, interior design or university teaching and research.

The MA concentrates on the development of interiors and

decorative arts in England and France in the "long" eighteenth century (c.1660-1830) and their subsequent rediscovery and reinterpretation in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. A key element of the programme is the emphasis on the first-hand study of furniture, silver and ceramics, where possible in the context of historic interiors. There are frequent trips to collections in and around London, and a study week at Buckingham exploring local country houses such as Woburn Abbey, Waddesdon Manor, Boughton and Blenheim Palace. In the second term there is a study week in Paris, where students have an opportunity to explore some of the private apartments at Versailles, as well as a number of very important eighteenth-century private houses in Paris.

The programme starts each September and finishes the following September. Teaching takes place two days a week (excluding class trips) over two terms, or one day a week for part-time students. During the third and fourth terms students write a dissertation under supervision.

MA in Military History by research: The Art of War from Napoleon to Iraq, 1793 – 2003

This programme is directed by one of the country's finest Military Historians, Professor Saul David. Uniquely it features guest seminars led by a star-studded list of eminent scholars, bestselling authors and soldiers, including Professors Gary Sheffield, Hew Strachan, David Cesarani and Nicholas Rodger; Andrew Roberts and General Sir Frank Kitson, Antony Beevor and Sir Max Hastings.

Students are required to produce an interim essay and a 20,000 - 40,000 word dissertation on a suitable military subject within the parameters of the course. The best dissertation wins for its author a year's representation by the literary agent Peter Robinson.

The programme runs with the traditional academic year.

The first half (September – February) consists of thirteen research seminars, three on historical method and ten by guest lecturers, and a 2,000 – 5,000 word interim essay.

The second half (March – August) is devoted to the completion, under supervision, of the research dissertation.

At the heart of the MA is the close working relationship between candidate and supervisor. While the final thesis must be the candidate's independent work, it is the supervisor who offers advice on refining the topic (if necessary), on primary sources, on secondary reading, on research techniques and on writing the final thesis.



Postgraduate Certificate in Education (Independent)
The Buckingham Postgraduate Certificate in Education,
which has been developed in close consultation with the
Headmasters' and Headmistresses' Conference (HMC),
offers teachers in the independent sector who have not
undergone a period of formal teacher training the
opportunity to participate in a year long structured
programme of professional development. The PGCE is
normally available to teachers of all subjects and at all levels.

To join the programme you must be employed in the independent sector and be put forward by your Head

Teacher. You will receive school-based training in your own school, overseen and supported by a school mentor.

Once each term you will be visited by a subject specialist mentor from Buckingham, who will help to ensure comparability of standards across the participating schools.

You will also come to Buckingham once each term for a three day residential meeting, where you will join other members of the programme to reflect more systematically on the subject you teach, the craft of the classroom and the educational enterprise more generally.

Postgraduate Certificate in Education with QTS (Qualified Teacher Status)

The PGCE with QTS, which is fully accredited by the Government's Training and Development Agency for Schools, is offered to teachers in both maintained and independent sectors.

The programme follows the same pattern as the Independent PGCE (above) while at the same time training and assessing its students against the Government's standards for qualified teacher status. It thus gives successful students the right to teach in state schools as well as in the independent sector.

The Buckingham MEd in Educational Leadership

This programme aims to improve the quality of education in the nation's schools by developing the leadership capacities of existing and potential heads and deputies. Current participants praise its "deep practical usefulness", "stimulating and challenging material" and "inspirational" approach. All written assignments are rooted in live issues in participants' own schools, and term-time demands are sensitive to the practical realities of their professional lives.

Course Features:

The course has 4 units, each with its own supporting text (Leadership Theory; Managing People; Teaching and Learning; Effective Use of Resources) and four 2 or 3-day residentials. Online support is available throughout the course.

Course speakers in 2008/9 included: a head who is very successfully running two of the most challenging comprehensives in the north of England; the High Master of St Paul's; one of the country's most entrepreneurial primary heads; the head of one of the country's foremost prep schools; ex-HMCI Chris Woodhead.

Assessment:

One 5000 word essay on Leadership Theory (20% of total marks); one 7000 word essay on Teachers and Teaching (30%); a 12000 word research project (40%); plus oral mark (10%) based on contributions at residentials.



SCIENCE AND MEDICINE

Buckingham's School of Science is at the cutting edge of international research. Thus we provide a stimulating environment for both undergraduate and postgraduate studies and research – where staff and

ntroduction

researchers are available to give guidance outside formal

classes and where some student projects have led to

work being published in international journals.

The Applied Computing department responds to rapid changes in computing and computational technologies. It supports a significant range of research interests and is actively involved in real-time technology projects. Funded from a variety of sources, including the European Union, it enjoys collaborative links with other universities and research establishments both in the UK and overseas.

Psychology, the study of the human mind and behaviour, is a large and diverse discipline, extending from behavioural neuroscience to cross-cultural comparison of social customs. At one extreme, there are psychologists who model the complex structure of the billions of tiny nerve cells that make up our brains, and the effects these have on our behaviour. At the other extreme, there are

psychologists who view the entire person as one of many similar units that make up large social, cultural and work groupings. The Buckingham degree programmes are shaped around this diversity and recognise the considerable inter-relations between Psychology and other disciplines such as Business Studies, Information Systems and Media Communications. Graduates from these programmes are eligibile for the Graduate Basis of Chartered Membership to the British Psychological Society, provided a minimum standard of a second class honours is achieved. This is the first step towards becoming a Chartered Psychologist.

Diabetes, obesity and metabolic disease have become the modern epidemic in the developed and developing world. The University of Buckingham is an internationally recognised centre of excellence for research into the discovery and validation of new molecular targets that could be the site of novel pharmacology and enable the examination of the therapeutic potential of pioneering agent, including plant-derived therapies. Associated with this group of researchers, the Bioinformatic research group is developing sophisticated methods for analysing large data sets. There is also a skin group, looking at both

diabetic skin and cancer.

The Postgraduate Medical School, run in conjunction with Ealing Hospital, offers qualified doctors from overseas the opportunity to gain experience in UK hospitals and to obtain a Clinical MD. This course will shortly expand into other hospitals.



Faculty Our permanent faculty includes:

Professor Mike Cawthorne, Dean of Science and Director of Metabolic Research, was formerly Group Director of diabetes and obesity research at SmithKline Beecham. He is the author of more than 100 peer-reviewed publications and has been awarded the Society of Medicine's Research Award for Drug Discovery for the discovery and development of the insulin sensitiser drug Avandia.

Professor Karol Sikora, Dean of Medicine, has been
Clinical Director for Cancer Services at the Hammersmith
Hospital for 12 years, where he has established a major
cancer research laboratory funded by the Imperial Cancer
Research Fund. He has published over 300 papers, written
or edited 20 books, and is the founding editor of *Gene*Therapy and Cancer Strategy. He was a member of the UK
Health Department's Expert Advisory Group on Cancer
and of the Committee on Safety of Medicines, and he
remains an advisor to the World Health Organization.

Professor Jon Arch, Deputy Director of Metabolic Research, was formerly a Director at SmithKline Beecham and

GlaxoSmithKline R&D, where he was involved in the discovery of candidate drugs for the treatment of obesity, type 2 diabetes and asthma. He is the author of more than one hundred peer-reviewed publications.

Professor Paul Trayhuin is Honorary Professor in the Clore Laboratory. He has over 150 peer-reviewed publications, and more than 100 published reviews, book chapters and symposia articles on obesity, particularly on adipose tissue. His major awards include Fellowship of the Royal Society of Edinburgh.

Dr Claire Stocker was the 2002 winner of the International Association for the Study of Obesity New Investigator Award for her research on metabolic programming in utero and early life to prevent obesity and insulin resistance.

Dr Kenneth Langlands specialises in skin research, particularly in relation to the ageing process. He also leads the Bioinformatics research. He is Admissions Tutor for the Clinical MD programme.

Dr Jacqueline O'Dowd is searching for new molecular targets in pancreatic islet cells.

Mr Ed Wargent specialises in pre-clinical evaluation of pioneering therapies.

Dr Mohamed Zaibi specialises in pre-clinical evaluation of novel agents.

Professor Chris Adams has worked in the field of computer networks since the 1970s and is currently sponsored to research into broadband wireless networks in difficult geographical regions.

Professor Sabah Jassim, Head of Applied Computing, is working on formal methods in computing and computational aspects of image processing. He is currently sponsored to research facial biometrics for mobile phone and PDA transactions.

Mr Hongbo Du is researching into databases, in particular data-mining techniques and discovery problems and solutions, classification, association and clustering.

Mr Naseer Al-Jawad is researching wavelet-based analysis, feature recognition and extraction in still and video images.

Dr Jeremy Martin, visiting fellow, is a software developer in chemoinformatics in the pharmaceutical industry.



Computing (Undergraduate)

The focus of this programme is to address the skills needed by the IT industry, thus ensuring that graduates have many job opportunities and a successful career. This unique programme provides you with:

- A practical knowledge and hands-on skills in the latest IT systems, tools and methods.
- An in-depth understanding of techniques and algorithms used in web development and cloud computing.
- Courses that are tailored to industry requirements, to ensure current and future relevance.
- The option of completing an honours degree in two years (four terms per year) instead of the typical three year option.
- Advanced study and research methods designed to capture the ever-evolving nature of computing and internet technologies.
- A focused, safe and fun study environment, including small group lectures and practicals.
- Optional programme start dates in January or September.
- A pathway to study postgraduate degrees (MSc, Mphil or DPhil).

Graduates of the Department are currently employed across the IT industry, including software development, systems analysis and design, web and multimedia application development, networks, database and systems management as well as user support.

BSc (Hons) Computing (G500)

Knowledge of and problem-solving in the dynamic and continuously changing field of Computing and IT, are at the heart of this programme. The aim is to make you a specialist in this field and ready for work in the real-world environment. The programme builds on the Department's world-class research strengths in web security and Biometrics authentication and wireless communication technologies. Other areas of particular interest include data-mining and its use in e-commerce and e-business, image processing applications, cloud computing, image processing and pattern recognition, cryptography and authentication, database, mobile application development and human – computer interaction. Computing teaching includes programming in C++, C#, Java and MATLAB.

First-year courses include Fundamentals of Computing, Mathematics for Computing, Introduction to Web Computing, Human Computer Interaction, Fundamentals of Database Systems, Structured Programming, Network Applications and their Environments, Algorithms, Software Engineering and Object Oriented Programming.

Second-year courses include Multimedia Systems,
Advanced Programming, Information Security, Image
Processing Software Project Management, Database
Technologies and Data-mining, plus a final-year project
tailored to suit your interest.

Computing can be studied as a combined honours degree with university-wide programmes such as Accounting and

Finance (G4N4), Business Studies (G4N1), Communication Studies (G4Q3), and Economics (G4L1).

Assessment

Courses are assessed by a combination of continuous assessment and written examination (typically, 25% continuous assessment and 75% written/practical examination).

Entry Requirements

- At least 240 points at A-Level or the equivalent school leaving qualification.
- At least five subjects, including Mathematics, at grade
 C or above at GCSE, or equivalent.
- Mature students and approved professional qualifications may also be considered.



Computing (Postgraduate)

Focused on offering industry-based and innovative computing applications, the Department of Applied Computing offers graduate programmes in two modes: a flexible research-oriented path and a fixed-term taught programme.

Fixed-term taught programmes include:

MSc in Innovative Computing

This programme engages students in the practical and dynamic aspects of innovations in computing. Students are exposed to state-of-the-art development of computing technologies, focusing on a range of specialised areas such as security of mobile and wireless communications, biometrics-based authentications, data-mining and knowledge discovery, image and multimedia processing, web technologies, bioinformatics and cloud computing. Specifically designed for holders of a first degree in computing or a related discipline, the programme is a blend of taught courses in the focus areas and a substantial individual project. Close collaboration with research groups within the Department and beyond provides you with direct access to up-to-date research

results. Collaboration with local industry partners helps you to develop real-life problem-solving skills. Previous graduates of this programme have undertaken a variety of careers in the IT industry, ranging from data analyst to technical consultant, in areas such as security, network planning and implementation, business and image processing. Graduates of this programme can also undertake further research for DPhil degrees in Buckingham or elsewhere.

Graduate Diploma in Computing (Pre-Masters)

The aim of this programme is to develop a solid understanding and obtain a range of key practical skills in Computing and IT. The programme is intended primarily for graduates from a non-Computing background who want a career in IT. Graduates will acquire real-world hands-on experience in a wide range of subjects such as web computing, human-computer interaction, programming, databases, algorithms, software engineering, network communication systems, multimedia systems, information security, imaging processing, prject management, data mining, etc.

This programme is designed to be flexible where candidates can choose the length of study (typically 9 or

12 months on full-time basis, or 24 months on part-time basis) as well as the focus project which is an important part of the programme. Graduates of this programme are invited for direct entry to the MSc in Innovative Computing programme.

Graduate Certificate in Computing (Pre-Masters)

Designed for candidates from a non-computing background, this intensive six-month programme provides fundamental knowledge and understanding of a range of essential subjects in Computing and Information Systems.

Graduates from the course are equipped with practical IT skills and can develop small-scale software applications.

Other skills learnt include Microsoft application software, programming in C++, database development and system analysis and design. Graduates of this programme are invited to apply for entry to the MSc in Innovative

Computing programme. Previous graduates of this programme have been employed in IT as data analysts, programmers, web application developers and IT service specialists.

$P_{(\text{Undergraduate})}^{\text{sychology}}$

We offer the only two-year psychology degree in the UK. This means we can offer you the same amount of teaching time as a three-year programme in just two years. In 2010 we became fully accredited by the British Psychological Society (BPS), offering professional recognition to our graduates. You can study psychology alone or with one of several minor combinations (see below).

- Excellent staff:student ratio; you are not simply another face in the crowd.
- A unique 2+1 degree opportunity: BSc and MSc (by research) in three years.
- Small-group tutorials on all courses, of around six students, conducted by lecturers – not teaching assistants or postgraduate students.
- Two entry points to the same programme: in January (24 months) or September (27 months).

The programme is designed so that students are introduced to psychology at the beginning of the programme; this is to help those who have not studied psychology before. After the preliminary introductory period, students cover the core theoretical components

of psychology: Individual Differences; Biological, Cognitive, Developmental and Social Psychology; and the History of Psychology.

Throughout the degree programme students also take courses that introduce them to the six areas of professional psychology: Business Psychology, Clinical Psychology, Educational Psychology, Forensic Psychology, Health Psychology and Counselling, and Psychotherapy.

Most courses are assessed by a combination of coursework and written examination (typically, 40% coursework and 60% written examination). Courses are assessed in sixmonth blocks, with the final classification decided on the

basis of courses taken in the last 18 months of the programme.

- At least 240 points at A-Level or the equivalent school leaving qualification.
- Mathematics at GCSE or equivalent is preferable.
- The School is able to be flexible for mature students and certain approved professional qualifications may also be considered.
- If English is not your first language, an IELTS score of

Applied Computing

The Applied Computing Department offers research programmes leading to the degrees of MSc (one year), MPhil (two years) and DPhil (three years) by thesis.

We support a range of research interests including data-mining (and its use in e-commerce and e-business), image processing applications, networking and network applications, and cryptography and authentication.

Currently we have two significant research grants in the European Framework 6th programme:

- Biometric research, where we are investigating facial recognition using wavelet compression techniques.
 These image recognition techniques, together with smart cards, will be used to enhance security access.
- Wireless networking, investigating the provision of broadband network access using wireless techniques – especially important in rural areas with poor infrastructure and island or mountain communities.
- Bioinformatics research in conjunction with the
 Diabetes, Obesity and Metabolic Research group to

investigate programming and data-mining problems associated with biological data.

Diabetes, Obesity and Metabolic Disease Research

This internationally recognised research group, housed in the purpose-built Clore Laboratory, has interests in molecular genetics, biochemistry, pharmacology, nutrition, the physiology of metabolic diseases (particularly diabetes and obesity) the physiology of skin, and bioinformatics.

The Clore Laboratory also has strategic research alliances and collaborations with a number of pharmaceutical companies. Members of the research group have a proven record in drug discovery and development, and a possibly unique understanding of the requirements of industry. The Director welcomes approaches for new

strategic alliances and collaborations.

Research programmes leading up to an MSc in

Bioinformations or Clinical Sciences (one year) and

PhD/DPhil (three years) in Bioinformatics or metabolic

diseases are available.

Students benefit from the holistic nature of our research, which allows laboratory studies at the molecular and cellular level to be integrated with whole-body physiology.

Bioinformatics studies are fully integrated into the diabetes, obesity and metabolic disease research programme and the Applied Computing department's expertise in algorithm development, scripting language and data-mining.

A recent bequest to fund basic research into Langerhan's Cell Histiocytosis will complement ongoing molecular studies of skin physiology in insulin-resistant states.

Supervision of postgraduate students is under the control of the Director, with each student supervised in the laboratory by an experienced researcher. Where

students cannot be resident in Buckingham, but have full-time access to laboratory facilities, it may still be possible to register for an MPhil/DPhil degree, subject to the proposed research programme and the availability of local supervision.

Clinical MD in General Internal Medicine

The recently introduced MMC programme for junior doctor training in UK, with subsequent changes in Home Office rules, has made it very difficult for international medical graduates to gain structured medical training in the UK. The Buckingham Clinical MD is designed to fulfil this need. Clinical training is delivered at Ealing Hospital, London, under the supervision of the Postgraduate Deans, Professors Rajat Mathur and Jayantha Arnold. Classroom-based lectures covering leading-edge innovation in healthcare are delivered in Buckingham.

The MD programme is fully quality assured and is equivalent to an MD from any other UK university.

As with all university degrees, international recognition is on a country-by-country basis in accordance with local regulations.

The programme is divided into seven clinical modules of ten weeks each, covering all sub-specialities of Internal Medicine. In addition, the Buckingham courses cover Medical Law, Oncology, Public Health, Medical Statistics, Molecular Medicine and Clinical Audit.

Entry Requirements

We aim to ensure that only those candidates who are best equipped to study at Buckingham are admitted to degree programmes. We assess all applications carefully and individually and do not make decisions on the basis of any single factor in an application. We understand that sometimes we can all make a wrong choice and that for many of us our potential is greater than our success so far.

We want to work with your potential, not your history. Wherever possible we encourage applicants to attend an interview at the University. This is a two-way process, giving us the opportunity to explore your motivation and commitment, and you the chance to meet academic staff and see the facilities at Buckingham.

Individual departments have their own minimum entry requirements and you should check our website for the most up-to-date information. We are happy to consider a range of international qualifications.

English Language

If English is not your mother tongue, you must be able to demonstrate proficiency in English. The University prefers the International English Language Testing Service (IELTS) examination, where generally you require an overall band score of 6.0 for direct admittance to one of our undergraduate programmes (6.5 for Law). If your score is below this, you can follow one of our Foundation programmes (see page 20). The minimum entry level is 4.5. For postgraduate applicants you need a minimum overall score of 6.5. If your score is slightly below 6.5 you can follow a one-term pre-sessional course before starting your studies.

Mature Students

Buckingham welcomes mature students and one third of our students are over 25. You may wish to include a detailed curriculum vitae with your application form, since our Admissions Tutors will be assessing you on your education background, employment and personal experience.



We charge the full cost of tuition to our students.



Getting to Buckingham

By air

Buckingham is close to several international airports.

Those arriving by air can travel to central London by train or taxi (from Gatwick) or by taxi, bus or underground (from Heathrow).

By rail

Milton Keynes, close to Buckingham, is easily accessible by rail from London (Euston), the Midlands, North West England, North Wales and Scotland. When you arrive at Milton Keynes Central station, you can take the X5 coach towards Oxford. Buckingham is the first stop, after about 20 minutes.

By road


Buckingham lies just off the A421 road which connects

Oxford to Cambridge, and is easily accessible from both
the M1 and M40.

By coach

Coach links to Milton Keynes Coachway (by M1 junction 14) from all parts of the country are fast and efficient. On arrival at Milton Keynes Coachway, take the X5 coach towards Oxford. Buckingham (Tesco) is the third stop (after approximately 40 minutes). There are frequent 'Oxford Tube' coaches from London to Oxford (Gloucester Green). On arrival at Oxford, take the X5 coach towards Cambridge, which stops at Buckingham (Tesco) (after approximately 50 minutes).


