
Our colleges and research centres are spread right across the Highlands and Islands – from small towns and Island communities to the larger towns and busy cities of the region.

For book-lovers, the Ullapool and Inverness book festivals celebrate writers from around the world.

Visual arts, film, music, drama and crafts thrive in the Highlands and Islands with many internationally-renowned musicians, artists and writers making their homes here. In recent years there has been an explosion of new music and arts venues across the region.

UHI courses and student life reflect the unique cultures and heritage of the Highlands and Islands. Study with us and be inspired.

Learning resources


Each centre is equipped with computer and video conferencing facilities, and access to the UHI online library service.

Highland Theological College UHI (HTC UHI) is located in the centre of the thriving market town of Dingwall in Ross-shire, nestling between Ben Wyvis and the Cromarty Firth. A safe, relaxed environment with good local amenities such as shops, restaurants and leisure facilities, Dingwall combines town and country living to offer a lifestyle to suit everyone.



Campus

HTC UHI is one of the smaller UHI colleges. The low student/staff ratio means that staff and students get to know each other well, contributing to the family atmosphere and excellent support. HTC UHI specialises in theology but also has students from networked degree courses. The campus has excellent IT facilities and a well-stocked library of around 65,000 volumes. Worship is an integral part of college life; staff, students and visitors are welcome. but not obliged, to attend.

HTC UHI keeps a list of landlords offering rooms, flats and houses to rent in Dingwall and the surrounding area.


Learning resources

Inverness College UHI

Location

Inverness College UHI is situated in the thriving city of Inverness.

Inverness has excellent leisure and recreational facilities and an abundance of outdoor and sports activities. The city has a fantastic range of restaurants, cafés, bars, pubs and clubs where you can see live bands playing new and traditional music.

Campus

Inverness College UHI is one of UHI's largest partners and offers you a welcoming and friendly atmosphere. Our active students' association gives you the chance to join clubs, take part in events and get involved in many other activities.

The Scottish School of Forestry is also part of the college, offering world-class courses in all aspects of forestry operations.

Lews Castle College UHI

Location

Lews Castle College UHI is located in the Outer Hebrides. a beautiful island chain that extends 130 miles down the west coast of Scotland.

Campus

The main campus is set in 600 acres of parkland beside the principal harbour town of Stornoway, with additional campuses in Barra, Benbecula and Lochmaddy.

Lews Castle College UHI has a thriving cultural scene that embraces rock bands, Gaelic tradition and contemporary visual arts.

You'll find centres of excellence in renewable research. health, and rural development at our Stornoway campus, and possibly the UK's most attractive location to study art – the beautiful waterfront gallery and museum of Taigh Chearsabhagh, North Uist. The Benbecula campus is home to our traditional music and Gaelic courses.

Subject areas

Renewable energy, engineering, art and design, Gaelic, health, business, computing, music, and rural development.

Accommodation

Purpose-built student accommodation, managed by a community company, is available in a harbour-front development within ten minutes' walk of the Stornoway campus. Private rented accommodation is located close to our other campuses.

Learning resources

Library, computer suites, learning resource centre, study rooms, video conferencing, energy laboratories, and art studios.



Recreation

Surfing, diving, sailing and sea-kayaking nearby. Good music (traditional and rock), arts and culture opportunities. Excellent indoor and outdoor sports facilities are available within walking distance of the Stornoway campus.

Moray College UHI





Location

Moray College UHI has its main campus in the ancient cathedral city of Elgin, a vibrant city with excellent sport and social facilities and easy train and road links to the cities of Inverness and Aberdeen.

Campus

Our main campus is close to the centre of Elgin and provides firstclass learning facilities on a modern site. You'll enjoy comprehensive academic guidance and support, well-qualified and enthusiastic lecturers, and a well-equipped

learning resource centre. When you are not studying you can participate in activities organised by our students' union, or you can make use of our on-site leisure facilities including: great catering, a games hall and a fitness suite.

The Elgin campus is home to Scotland's fifth art school and the only one located in a non-urban environment. We also have smaller sites in Buckie, Keith, Forres and Nairn.

Private rented accommodation is available in Elgin and the surrounding area.


Learning resources

NAFC Marine Centre UHI is located on the seafront in the historic village of Scalloway, the ancient capital of the Shetland Islands. The islands have close cultural links with Scandinavia and are a beautiful and dynamic place to study and live. A strong local economy, based on seafood and energy, means that islanders enjoy a good quality of life, a vibrant social and cultural scene, and excellent public facilities.


Campus

From our modern campus we support all types of maritime activity through high quality accredited and bespoke training; research, development and knowledge exchange provision; and expert consultancy. You'll benefit from excellent facilities, including a state-of-the-art bridge simulator, laboratories, classrooms, a marine hatchery, engineering workshops and a library. We also carry out

research projects to support the development of Shetland's aquaculture and fisheries industries. We have a crucial role to play in contributing to the sustainability of the local economy and, ultimately, helping it to continue to grow.

North Highland College UHI

Location

North Highland College UHI has four campuses spread throughout the north of Scotland. We have two campuses in Caithness: our main campus in Thurso, and one in Wick; and two in Sutherland, one in Dornoch and one in Alness.

Campus

Our main campus in Thurso has a highly-regarded equestrian centre, as well as a broad range of courses from business to care to engineering, with Wick hosting a number of courses including health and social care.

Music courses are the specialist subject of the Alness campus.

Dornoch is the base for the UHI Centre for History and our courses in golf management. Tourism and hospitality courses are also based in Dornoch at our unique training hotel, Burghfield House.

Subject areas

We offer a very wide range of subjects, including speicalisms in history, equestrian, music, golf and gamekeeping courses.

Orkney College UHI

Location

Orkney College UHI is principally based in Kirkwall in the Orkney Islands, with a second campus in Stromness and learning centres based on the smaller islands. Orkney offers a welcoming and strong sense of community with a high standard of living at surprisingly affordable rates.

Campus

Kirkwall is home to a modern, purpose-built campus. Along with a range of general and specialist teaching areas the campus hosts well-equipped research facilities for agronomy, archaeology, geophysics and Nordic studies. The college provides a friendly cosmopolitan community with a mix of students.

Subject areas

Agriculture, archaeology and geophysics, art and design, business and management, construction, hospitality and tourism, information technology, maritime studies, Nordic studies, Scottish cultural studies, science, education, health and social care.

Private rented accommodation is available in Kirkwall and Stromness.

Library, computer suites, video conferencing suites, study room, art studio, workshops, and hospitality kitchens.



Recreation

The Pickaguoy Centre offers modern sport and leisure facilities. The community excels in cultural and artistic activity ranging from major annual events to impromptu musical events on a weekly basis. The islands are a paradise for those interested in archaeology and birds.



Perth College UHI is situated in the city of Perth on the southern edge of the beautiful Highlands of Scotland. Location

The Scottish Association for Marine Science UHI (SAMS UHI) is located on Dunstaffnage bay on the west coast of Scotland, three miles from the busy seaside town of Oban. This is a premier diving and yachting area, with easy access to the mountains of Glencoe and ferry connections to the Western Isles.

Campus

SAMS UHI is one of the UK's leading independent marine research



institutes, with more than 125 years of research expertise. Our young and dynamic staff are currently researching climate change, marine renewable energy, prosperity from marine ecosystems, industrial impacts on oceans, and the Arctic.

Students benefit from stateof-the-art research facilities, a spacious new £6M education centre, unrivalled access to active researchers, fantastic opportunities for fieldwork, and optional exchange semesters in the Arctic.

Shetland College UHI is situated on Britain's most northerly islands. Shetland is an inspiring and dynamic place to study and live, with great educational facilities, a lively social and cultural scene and first class public facilities. You will be greeted with a warm island welcome.

Campus

Our main campus in Lerwick is being extended this year, with many new and exciting facilities. We also have a number of learning centres



throughout the islands.

The unique natural and cultural environment of Shetland is reflected in many of our courses, particularly in contemporary textiles and studies of the culture and heritage of the Northern Isles.



Mar oileanach aig Oilthigh na Gàidhealtachd agus nan Eilean bidh cothrom air leth agad Gàidhlig ionnsachadh agus iomadh cuspair a dhèanamh tro mheadhan na Gàidhlig ann an sgìrean far a bheil i na pàirt de chultar an t-sluaigh. Tha cùrsaichean tro mheadhan na Gàidhlig rim faotainn aig Colaisde a' Chaisteil UHI agus Sabhal Mòr Ostaig UHI, agus tha cuid dhiubh cuideachd ri fhaotainn aig àiteachan eile san sgìre agus le ionnsachadh aig astar.

Tha ar n-oileanaich a' toirt a' chànain chun na 21^d linn le bhith a' cleachdadh an cuid sgilean ann an roinnean cho farsaing ris na meadhanan agus na h-ealain, foghlam, an t-seirbheis chatharra agus leasachadh coimhearsnachd.

As a student at the University of the Highlands and Islands, you will have a unique opportunity to learn Gaelic in regions where Gaelic is a real part of the local culture. Courses taught through the medium of Gaelic are available at Lews Castle College UHI and Sabhal Mòr Ostaig UHI, and some are also available at other locations across the region, and by distance learning.

Our students are carrying the language into the 21st century by applying their skills in areas as diverse as media and the arts, education, the civil service and community development.

Archaeology* BA (Hons)

The Highlands and Islands of Scotland are world-renowned for their archaeological heritage sites, such as Skara Brae, Maes Howe, the Camster Cairns and Mousa Broch, so there's no better place to study your degree in archaeology.



You'll gain a wealth of experience and skills in the practical elements of archaeology, including fieldwork, surveying and post-excavation, as well as an excellent knowledge of archaeological theory, focusing particularly on the distinctive cultural heritage of the Highlands and Islands.

You will learn through a combination of face-to-face (at Orkney College UHI) and VC seminars in the classroom, and online study via the UHI VLE, supported by your tutors.

Course structure

You have the flexibility to exit each level with a valuable qualification.

Year 1 (CertHE)

Subjects include: world archaeology; archaeological method and theory; historic landscapes; and options from History, Scottish Cultural Studies and Environmental Sciences.

Year 2 (DipHE)

Subjects include: Scottish archaeology; digital heritage; contemporary archaeology; excavation skills; and options from History, Scottish Cultural Studies and Environmental Sciences.

Years 3 & 4 (BA and BA (Hons))

Subjects include: sustainability, past and present; archaeology and interpretation; and an archaeology project. Option subjects include: Vikings and Norse archaeology in the North Atlantic; funerary and burial archaeology; maritime archaeology; geophysics and remote sensing; landscape archaeology; the Iron Age of Scotland; and Neolithic Orkney.

To achieve the award of BA (Hons) you must also complete a dissertation in your final year.

Scottish History and Archaeology

BA (Hons)

If you're interested in delving into Scotland's rich and colourful past, this joint honours degree gives you an excellent grounding in the study and practice of Scottish history and archaeology.

You'll explore Scottish history from the medieval to the modern period focusing on the cultural, political, social and economic links between Scotland and other northern European and Atlantic regions.

You will also develop a wide range of archaeological skills such as fieldwork, surveying and post-excavation, with an emphasis on the cultural heritage of the Highlands and Islands.

You will learn through a combination of face-to-face and VC seminars in the classroom and online study via the UHI VLE, supported by your tutors.

Course structure

This course offers the flexibility to exit at each level with a valuable qualification.

Year 1 (CertHE)

Subjects include: historic landscapes; Scottish history, 1066 - 20th century; world archaeology; archaeological theory and method; and the Atlantic World.

Year 2 (DipHE)


Subjects include: Scottish archaeology; Scottish Highlands; Scotland, the North Sea and the Baltic; digital heritage; contemporary archaeology; travelling cultures; and global diasporas.

Year 3 (BA)

Subjects include: archaeology and interpretation; varieties of history; pre-history of the Highlands and Islands; Crown-Magnate relations; Scotland and Ireland; archaeological sciences; and Scots in North America.

Year 4 (BA (Hons))

Subjects include: funerary and burial archaeology; people, plants and animals; Neolithic Orkney; maritime archaeology; Scotland from revolution to rising; a society at war, Scotland 1296-1403; and Britain's empire.

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

Scottish History BA (Hons)

This degree looks at Scottish history within a northern European and northern Atlantic perspective, focusing on the cultural, political, social and economic links between Scotland and these regions.

In the first and second years, you will follow a traditional broad approach to the study of history from the medieval to the modern period. In years three and four, you will examine in-depth particular topics of Scottish history allowing you to study the history of the nation and the Highlands and Islands region in detail.

You will learn through a combination of VC lectures and tutorials, and online study and discussion groups on the VLE. You will also have support from your tutors and studies adviser.

Course structure

This course offers the flexibility to exit at each level with a valuable qualification.

Year 1 (CertHE)

Subjects covered in first year include: historical skills and methods; Highlands and Islands history; Scottish history; British history; and Atlantic history.

Year 2 (DipHE)

Second year subjects include: historical skills and methods; Highlands and Islands history; Scottish history; European and Baltic history; and Canadian history.

Year 3 (BA)



Year 1 (CertHE)



It is designed to meet the Scottish subject benchmark statement, The Standard for Childhood Practice.



You will have the opportunity to relate theory to workplace practice and investigate in-depth an area of interest to you.

The course will also give you the skills needed for further professional qualifications.

You will study part time through supported online learning via the UHI VLE, with a compulsory one-day induction at your enrolling college.

Complementary Therapies

HNC/HND UCAS codes: 103B/003B

Aiming to provide qualified personnel for the health and fitness industries, these courses cover a range of therapies (such as aromatherapy and reflexology) as well as how to deal with clients and other aspects of health care provision.

Oral Health Science BSC

This degree will give you the comprehensive training and practical skills to pursue a career as a dental hygienist and therapist. Dental hygienists/therapists work as part of a team providing clinical and educational care for children and adults in the community, including those with special needs. They work under the written prescription of a dentist.

The course provides career pathways for dental nurses and school leavers. who will have the opportunity to train for a structured professional career.

The degree is delivered from state-of-the-art facilities at the Centre for Health Science in Inverness and **Dumfries Dental Centre.**

You will learn through a combination of practical clinical and patient skills sessions, VC lectures and tutorials taught by experts in Dumfries and Inverness, and online studv.

You must attend an induction in Inverness the week prior to the start of your course.

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Applied Sciences (Pathway to Medicine)

HNC UCAS code: 00FC

This nationally-devised qualification offers tuition in a wide range of scientific disciplines including: human biology; biotechnology; chemistry; laboratory practice; and microbiology. Experienced and specialist staff will guide you through this interesting and exciting course.

The course enables eligible students to progress directly to study Medicine at the University of St Andrews.

You can study this course full time at Perth College UHI.

Social Care

HNC UCAS code: 045L

The HNC Social Care will give you the caring skills and knowledge you need for all areas of social care. The course includes: people in society; workplace experience; health and safety and social policy.

You can study this course full time and part time at Inverness College UHI and Perth College UHI. You can study part time at North Highland College UHI, Orkney College UHI and Shetland College UHI, and full time at Moray College UHI.



This course provides a high-quality, broad-based business and management qualification introducing you to marketing, human resources, business law, accounting, information technology and the domestic and global environments in which they operate.



At year three, you can choose to study for a generic degree in business and management, or select from the specialist themed pathways above.

You will learn through a combination of face-to-face lectures and tutorials, VC lectures and independent online study, with support from tutors and classmates in online discussions, via email and telephone.

Course structure

Sustainable Rural Development BSc (Hons)





Shetland School of Nautical Studies, at NAFC Marine Centre UHI, offers sponsored Merchant Navy Cadet training. If you're interested in serving as an officer on seagoing ships in the Merchant Navy this training course will give you a direct route into this career path.

NAFC Marine Centre UHI is located in Scalloway in the Shetland Isles. With state-of-the-art facilities including a ship bridge simulator, it is the ideal place to train for a career in the Merchant Navy.

The training usually runs over three years and consists of a mixture of time spent in college on Shetland and at sea. Successful completion of your classroom studies and practical work will lead to a qualification to serve as a deck or engineer officer at sea.

As a trainee cadet you'll be sponsored directly by a shipping company/shipping manager, or

indirectly by another organisation acting on their behalf, who will provide the sea service and support throughout your training.

You'll receive a training allowance for the duration of the course from your sponsoring organisation, which will help to pay some of your college and other costs.

On completion of your training you will gain an Officer of the Watch certificate, which, after further sea service and study, could lead you on to the rank of senior officer and eventually Master or Chief Engineer.

Nautical Science (Deck Cadet) HNC and Marine Engineering (Engineer Cadet) HNC

These are sponsored courses for students entering the Merchant Navy as either deck or engineer officers. You will be supported throughout your training by a shipping company and receive an allowance and support at college, as well as spending a portion of your time onboard ships gaining hands-on marine training.

Further studies and exams will lead to senior certificates of Chief Mate/Master or Second/Chief Engineer following sea service as a junior officer. You can study these courses full time at NAFC Marine Centre UHI.

Entry and progression routes

UHI is proud to welcome and support students with a wide range of backgrounds, qualifications and life experiences. We will do all we can to assist your application and to support your needs once you are studying with us.

We aim to provide a learning structure which helps you to reach your goal no matter where you start from. We do this by being flexible with our entry requirements and offering a range of alternative progression routes through our courses.

Entry requirements - FAQs

What qualifications do I need?

Entry qualifications are shown in the course pages. If you do not have the standard entry requirements we would still encourage you to apply.

Can I use my qualifications from another institution? Yes, you can sometimes receive credit for qualifications gained from other institutions. For example an HNC or HND in a relevant subject from another institution could be used to assist your application or in some cases could provide exemption from parts of a UHI degree.

Can I use my work experience as credit for a course? Yes, we will accept properly evidenced voluntary and paid work experience. You may be asked to provide some additional information along with your application and could also be invited for interview. Admissions staff and course leaders will give advice on compiling an evidence claim.

What if I've had a break from study?

If you feel you would benefit from a more gradual transition into student life we offer access courses to help you back into study. Call our information line for details on 0845 272 3600 or email info@uhi.ac.uk.

Degree pathways

Scottish Credit and Qualifications Framework (SCOF) The SCOF is a framework which allows you to compare levels across different awards, build a progression route to your desired qualification and to transfer credit from one award to another. For example, if you complete an HNC or HND in one institution you may be able enter year two or three of a degree course with UHI and go on to gain an Honours degree.

At UHI you can follow different pathways to a BA or BSc (Hons) degree. The pathway available may vary according to the course, so please check the individual course pages for specific information. In general, you can usually progress from Higher National awards (HNC and HND) and Higher Education awards (CertHE and DipHE) to degree level (BA or BSc), then Honours.

Postgraduate study

If you want to continue studying beyond an Honours degree then UHI offers you a range of postgraduate qualifications from PgCert (SCQF level 11) to Masters degree and even research. 

Late applications through UCAS

This service lets you apply for courses with vacancies between the end of February and the end of June and means that you do not have to wait for Clearing to start.

If you applied to UCAS after 30th June or have not achieved your expected grades and do not have a university or college place, UCAS Clearing can help you find a suitable vacancy on a higher education course. Financing your studies

A university education is a big investment, but it's an investment that will almost certainly pay off in the future. It's important to think carefully about the costs of your course beforehand and to work out the best way to manage your money and finance your studies. A little budget planning now can make a big difference later.

How much will it cost me?

At UHI your two main costs will be:

- Tuition fees the fees charged by us to teach you (see table below)
- Living expenses your accommodation, food, clothing etc.

The cost of living in the Highlands and Islands varies from area to area. In some places private rented accommodation could be cheaper than in a city, but travel might be more expensive.

How will I pay?

Depending on where you live and your personal circumstances you may be eligible for financial assistance in the form of loans, grants and bursaries. You should look for student finance as soon as you apply to UHI, even if you have not yet been offered a place.

For full-time study

- If your home is in Scotland your tuition fees are normally paid by the Students Awards Agency for Scotland (SAAS) and you can apply for a student loan to help you with your living expenses. For full details visit www.saas.gov.uk.
- If your home is in England you can apply for loans and grants to cover your tuition fees and living costs in a single application to Student Finance England. For full details visit www.direct.gov.uk and go to education.
- If your home is in Northern Ireland you can apply for loans and grants to cover your tuition fees and living costs through Student Finance NI. For full details visit www.studentfinanceni.co.uk.

- If your home is in Wales you can apply for loans and grants to cover your tuition fees and living costs through Student Finance Wales. For full details visit www.studentfinancewales.co.uk.
- If you are an EU national or a national from outside the EU you might still be able to receive help with your tuition fees and living expenses. For details visit www.saas.gov.uk.

For part-time study

 If you are planning to study part time you may be eliqible for ILA500 or ILA200 funding.

For students who require support

 If you have a particular need, such as a learning difficulty or disability, please speak to your chosen UHI college about the financial and learning support available to you.

Note on 2012 fees

At present the Scottish Government is engaged in a public consultation process on the long term sustainability of higher education in Scotland. This consultation will, among other things, consider how Scotland reacts to changes made elsewhere in the UK to existing tuition fee regimes. The outcome from this consultation is expected to be known some time after the Scottish Parliament election in May 2011. Depending on the outcome of this consultation, some changes may be made to funding arrangements for Scottishdomiciled students as well as those from elsewhere in the UK or the EU. Prospective students are advised to monitor the Scottish Government and Student Awards Agency for Scotland websites for further information as it becomes available. At UHI you'll study in various ways, using different technologies. The blend of technologies used on your course will depend on the modules you've chosen, but it is likely that you will use some or all of the following learning resources:

Video conference (VC) – using cameras and microphones, a VC can connect staff and students at two or more UHI campuses, or any other site worldwide, with the required technology.

Audio conference (AC) – using traditional phone systems or web-based phone technology, an audio conference enables three or more people to share a conversation or discussion.

Virtual learning environment (VLE) – a web-based system that enables you to access learning resources, guidance and support, and also access and submit assessments, plus communicate with staff and other students through discussion boards or live "chat".

Online – using the VLE, web and other technologies, you may study at flexible times and locations. You will usually be part of a group studying in the same way and will be able to interact with the other students. Some online courses do not require any physical attendance at a college, with all study and support from tutors available online. You will, however, be required to attend a face-to-face induction at your enrolling college at the start of your course.
