### Terms and conditions

### University/Student Terms and Conditions

The University will use all reasonable endeavours to deliver courses and programmes of study in accordance with the descriptions set out in this prospectus. The prospectus is inevitably produced at the earliest date to provide maximum assistance to intending applicants and it is possible that some changes will occur between the date of printing and the start of the academic year to which it relates (including academic exchange programmes). The University therefore reserves the right to make variations to the content or method of delivery of courses, to discontinue, merge or combine courses if such action is reasonably considered to be necessary by the University. Such changes may occur either before or after admission. If the University discontinues any course, it will use its reasonable endeavours to provide a suitable alternative course.

The University will, in the event of industrial action or circumstances beyond its control, interfering with its ability to provide courses or services, undertake to minimise the disruption as far as practical.

The University aims to offer students flexibility of study within the relevant regulations and the academic timetable is drawn up with this objective in mind. However, while every student will be able to take appropriate modules in the programme for which he/she is registered, no timetable can guarantee that all modules will be available to all students who are qualified to take them. Options offered may be subject to a minimum level of interest being shown in any given year.

#### **Disclosure Scotland**

As a condition of entry to the School of Health, some students will be required to undergo an enhanced criminal disclosure procedure with Disclosure Scotland. Students should note that criminal records will not be deemed as spent under the Rehabilitation of Offenders Act (1974) (ROA) (Exceptions) Order 1975. Consequently all convictions, no matter when they occurred, will be included on the disclosure. Potential students who wish to discuss issues relating to criminal convictions are strongly recommended to contact the relevant admissions tutor in the first instance.

#### **Hepatitis B Policy**

In accordance with the recommendations of the Department of Health, if you enter a programme which leads to a qualification in a Healthcare setting, then you should be immunised against Hepatitis B (HBV) before you start the programme. Your response to the vaccine should also be checked. Evidence of immunity will be required by the programme organiser before clinical work is undertaken. If you are found to be a carrier of HBV, your application will be considered on an individual basis.

## Taking the leap

Exciting as it is, the decision to progress from college to university is a big one. You will probably have many questions about your course, studies, resources and campus life. This prospectus supplement should answer some of those questions or tell you where you can find out more.

#### Is university for me?

We believe that the opportunity to study at university should be available to people from all walks of life, regardless of age, sex, race, ethnicity, religion, disability, national origin, sexual orientation, prior educational background, socio-economic background, or any other irrelevant factor.

The great thing about GCU is that it attracts a range of students from across the world. Our community of nearly 17,000 students is comprised of people from more than 100 countries and from a wide range of backgrounds. These include students from disadvantaged backgrounds, students who are first in their family to study at university, students of all ages many of whom are in their 30's, 40's, 50's or older, students with disabilities, students who are parents, and students who study part-time.

In short, our student population is diverse and we have a wealth of experience in helping people of all backgrounds to start studying.

## What is university like and what is expected of me?

University provides a different experience for everyone, but hopefully always an enjoyable and challenging one. It will be a change from wherever you come from, but you will be able to shape your own experience. You will be expected to remain committed to what you are doing and make informed decisions that will help you in completing your degree. An important part of this process will be making use of the wide range of support services, resources and facilities available to you at Glasgow Caledonian University.

#### You will be supported all the way

There is plenty of support available to help with any academic, personal or financial concerns you may have.

There is not only a wide range of formal dedicated support for students (that you can find on our website, on posters and notice boards, and via staff members) but there is also invaluable support provided by students for students.

### Getting the most out of your time on campus

When you come to university you aren't just coming to study. GCU offers a great social life and plenty of opportunities to meet other students and make new friends. There are a range of clubs and societies which make this possible as well as helping you keep up with your favourite sport or hobby or develop new interests. You can get involved with the Students' Association and work or volunteer with other students. The excellent facilities on campus will also help to enhance your experience.

#### **Student Mentors**

The great thing about GCU mentors is that they are all current students and have been through the transition to university already. They can help with any question or query you may have and can offer reassurance and guidance.

The most important thing to remember is that although university is new to you, you are not the only one taking this big step. Hundreds of students begin their university journey at the same time as you and will have just as many questions.

Getting used to university life and study can take a bit of adjustment and, during your degree, your schedule will be busy. Your time will be split between lectures, seminars, labs and practical work, not to mention independent study. This page provides a rough guide to what to expect when starting your degree programme.

#### Hours in a normal week

Hours of work vary from programme to programme, however you will be surprised how flexible your timetable can be. There will be days where your timetable is completely full, then days when you have very few or no classes at all.

As university is much more focussed on independent study, when you're not in classes you should aim to spend much of your time studying.

#### An academic year

One of the biggest changes will be the way your studies are structured throughout the year. Both the pace and the intensity of your learning may surprise you. Remember, though, that a great deal of encouragement, support and guidance is available to you throughout your studies and there will be plenty of opportunities to socialise with new friends and let off steam.

#### **Seminars**

A seminar (sometimes called a tutorial) is designed to expand on the topic that is introduced in the lecture. Styles of seminar can, again, vary dependent upon the subject covered. However,

there are always a relatively small number of students (approximately 12) and you are free to raise questions and discuss issues covered by the lecture. In some cases, you may be asked to prepare a paper that will be used to start the discussion.

#### Lectures

Styles of lecture vary, however they are designed to be an initial step to introducing different topics to you. Whilst it is not impossible to ask questions, with up to 200 people in the room, you are usually expected just to listen and take notes whilst the lecturer speaks. Lectures usually last an hour.

#### Labs

In subjects such as engineering, science and computing, you will receive tuition in laboratories using either IT or other equipment necessary to learn the subject. This will, almost always, be done in a small group, using high technology equipment under the supervision of trained staff.

#### **Modules**

One of the most difficult adjustments for a college student coming to

university is the move to a modular system and final exams. Within each year you will usually complete six modules, and each will usually have some form of final examination, which is normally unseen.

Each module will cover a specific topic, most of which are compulsory parts of your programme. However, as you get beyond Years 1 and 2 of your programme, you will be given more options to choose from in terms of the modules you can study.

To complete a module, around 175 hours of work is necessary prior to your exam. Half of this time will be spent in class and the other half spent in private study or research in the library. At the start of each trimester you will be given a timetable for class work and can decide when it is most appropriate for you to study privately.

#### **Assessment**

Your learning is assessed using a combination of coursework and examinations. During each trimester, your performance in your coursework will allow you to demonstrate your grasp of the subject out with exam conditions.

Coursework can take the form of essays, written assignments or practical work in labs. These will then count towards your final overall score in a subject (e.g. coursework might be worth 30% and examination worth 70% of the final grade).

Unseen examinations may be very familiar to you. However, using past papers as a guide to your strengths and weaknesses is helpful and good exam techniques are a vital ingredient to success in your studies.

Please seek advice from academic and support staff at the University if you have concerns over the transition to this new way of studying.

### Life on campus

Glasgow Caledonian University provides one of the most innovative, dynamic and supportive learning environments in the UK at our modern campus in heart of Glasgow.

#### **The Saltire Centre**

Opened in 2006, and designed to support you throughout your studies, this state-of-the-art facility is home to the University library. It has superb resources, with over 276,000 books as well as 37,000 e-books. It's also somewhere that you can access over 21,000 (mainly electronic) journals, containing over 55 million articles. Every floor has a 'self-issue' and return point, or you can visit The Base on level 0.

Part of what makes it such a good environment for study is that there are a variety of different spaces available: so there are lively interaction areas that are ideal for group work, with quieter spaces as you go further up the floors of the building.

Within the library, specific subject librarians are available to: tell you about library services; help you find information for coursework and dissertations; show you which databases to use and how to access them; and show you how to use electronic journals and books.

#### Continuing Professional Development Centre

The Continuing Professional Development (CPD) Centre opened its doors in early 2007, offering a flexible space for both business and study. In addition to providing modern, state-of-the-art seminar rooms for students, the high-tech conference space offers facilities for local, national and international businesses and organisations.

On the ground floor of both the CPD and Saltire Centre, you'll find our Real Learning Cafés which provide yet another relaxed environment for study and socialising.

#### **Academic Registry**

Responsible for all matters of goverance of the University, the Academic Registry deals with students records, registration, extension visas, student visas, student funding, exams, appeals and graduation. You'll find the Academic Registry desk on the ground floor of the Saltire Centre next to the Base. For more details visit: www.gcu.ac.uk/student/academicregistry

#### IT facilities

During each trimester you have access to computers throughout campus seven days a week. These can be found in the Saltire Centre, learning cafés, specialised teaching labs and many other locations across the campus.

Off campus you can log onto your webmail account, 'my.caledonian', to access university information, exam results, timetables, lecture notes and to apply for modules. It's also an ideal discussion forum for any points you want to bring to others attention.

#### Academic and IT support

You may find that your programme is supported by our virtual learning environment 'GCULearn'. This system is ideal for accessing learning material, staying up to speed with classes and keeping in touch with lecturers and other students

The University's online information literacy training package, SMILE, can be accessed by logging in to GCULearn on any computer, on or off campus. It aims to teach you the basic IT skills you need as a student at GCU. You can work through each of the units and test yourself as you go.

Each School has an Academic Development Centre, where you will find that support is available to help you cope with practical aspects of your new workload, so you can best achieve your academic potential. Whether you're wondering how to take lecture notes or structure an effective essay, support staff are here to help. You can also get help and advice on using the IT facilities at your disposal.













#### **Accommodation**

Situated just across the road from our campus, our student accommodation complex, Caledonian Court, houses 660 students in 100 modern, self-catering flats. Perfectly-located for those early morning lectures, you can roll out of bed at five to nine and still be in the classroom in time for your first tutorial

Facilities include:

- 100 self-contained flats containing six to eight bedrooms
- Fully-equipped kitchens
- Private en-suite facilities in 340 rooms
- Free Internet connection
- Coin-operated laundrette on site

#### Arc

If you need to recharge your batteries, our modern sports and recreation facility, Arc, has two superbly-equipped gyms and sports halls and a hair and beauty salon. Offering a variety of morning, lunchtime and evening fitness classes, with discounted membership rates for students, there's something for everyone.

#### Students' Association

The GCU Students' Association exists to represent the students at Glasgow Caledonian University. It is run by elected students, who work with the University to ensure everyone has the best possible experience. You can get involved by joining one or more of the many clubs and societies run by the GCUSA (or start one of your own, if you like) or by becoming a student representative. You can also volunteer for one of the many GCUSA activities or projects, from welfare volunteering, to writing for the student magazine Edit - not to mention the Nightline service or the radio station, Radio Caley all of which are run by students for students.

#### Student mentors

Through our Student Mentoring Scheme, you can contact existing GCU students who have 'been there, seen it, done it', many of whom have already made the move from college to university. They will be able to share their knowledge and experience with you and answer any questions you may have regarding all aspects of university life.

#### International students

Many overseas students come to Glasgow Caledonian having first studied at a further education college in the UK. We offer our international students help with accommodation in Caledonian Court or advice on private housing in Glasgow. Our International Student Support Service gives practical advice and support to our overseas guests and the International Students' Society organises a wide range of activities for international students.

### Positive Living and Disability Service

GCU is committed to creating an inclusive learning environment where all students are able to participate fully in university life. The University's Positive Living and Disability Service offers invaluable information and advice to both applicants and students suffering the impact of an illness or impairment.

The Service is an accredited Needs Assessment Centre and can help students access additional services and facilities, as well as recommending necessary adjustments to teaching and assessments.

It also provides valuable support and counselling to students through troubled times, including periods of high stress, low mood, poor self esteem and relationship problems. Many students find it hugely beneficial to explore their thoughts, emotions and behaviour in a confidential counselling setting.

#### Students with children

All full-time Glasgow Caledonian students with children can apply for financial help towards childcare costs for pre-school children, regardless of whether or not there is a place available within our nursery on campus. Help and advice is available from both the Saltire Centre and the nursery itself.

#### Chaplaincy

You can find spiritual guidance on site in our Faith and Belief Centre, which is dedicated to the many faiths and beliefs of Glasgow Caledonian students. The Centre is open seven days a week, with quiet spaces for prayer and meditation, as well as a private room to consult a chaplain. Our visiting chaplains can put you in touch with places of worship for all the major religious groups in Glasgow.

#### John Smith's Bookshop

For most degree programmes, you'll have to buy some essential text books and John Smith's Bookshop, located on campus, is the ideal place to go. The shop is open throughout the week between 9am and 5pm. If they don't already have the book you need in stock, it can be ordered in for you. There's also a second-hand service available, where you can get cash back for unwanted text books. A list of titles is available in store.

### How to apply

At Glasgow Caledonian University, we aim to give applicants and advisers as much support as possible. The following is a selection of frequently asked questions about applying to university.

### Do universities have their own application forms?

No, when applying to university in the UK, for full-time undergraduate courses, you must make your application through UCAS – the Universities and Colleges Admissions Service. You must make your application via the UCAS online Apply system. UCAS will forward to your choice of institution.

Remember, you will need the University's code (GCAL G42) and the course code of the programme to which you are applying (you'll find this on the relevant programme page in this prospectus).

#### When do I apply?

The deadline for UCAS applications, including any references, is **January 15th** of the year you hope to start your programme. Applications received after this date will be considered as late.

#### How many choices can I make?

You can make any combination of up to five choices on your application form. The application fee is £22 or £11 if you are only applying for one programme.

### I am an international student, how do I enter my qualifications?

You should enter your qualifications in English through the on-line UCAS Apply system. Send a copy of your certificates, with a note of your UCAS number, directly to the university. Please do not send UCAS original exam certificates or copies.

### What should I include in the personal statement?

You should explain briefly your reasons for applying to a particular programme and convey a knowledge and enthusiasm for what the programme involves. Do you have work experience? For certain programmes, particularly careerfocused programmes, relevant work experience is essential. Other work experience, such as a part-time job, can equip you with skills such as good communications and teamworking.

Mention your career aspirations. Where do you want to go after graduation? What type of job do you want? Will you want to undertake further study? This should be a unique statement, which you should have written entirely yourself. See the UCAS website for more information.

# What happens after I have submitted my application?

When UCAS have received your application, they will forward it on to the institution to which you are applying. Admissions staff will consider your application and UCAS will tell you if your application has been successful or not. Each university you have applied to will respond. You will then have to make your choice of a firm acceptance and an insurance acceptance.

## I'm at FE College, how do I apply for advanced entry?

The year of entry should be made clear in the 'choices' section of the UCAS Apply online application where it indicates 'point of entry'.

When applying to year one of a programme, this box should be left blank. For entry into the second or third year of a programme, you should enter the year in this box. For example, if you are applying to start in Year 2, put 2 in the box.

#### I would like to study part-time. How do I apply?

Provided you are able to study your preferred programme on a part-time basis, you should apply to the university directly. Visit www.gcu.ac.uk/study/part-time/degrees to find out more.

### Do I have to accept the offers made to me?

If you don't wish to accept any of the other offers made to you, you can decline them. UCAS Extra now allows you to make further choices, if you didn't receive any offers or if you've declined offers made to you, UCAS Extra applications can be made on-line, just like standard UCAS applications. The on-line system also allows you to monitor university responses to the applications you make.

#### What's Clearing?


Clearing takes place in August when all of the exam results have been published. If you haven't managed to secure a university place, clearing information will be forwarded to you by UCAS. You can then apply to institutions that are still accepting applications.

### Can I visit the University to have a look around?

Most universities hold open days at various times of the year. This gives you the opportunity to meet with staff to discuss your options and to ask any questions you may have. We usually hold our open day during the first or second week in September each year. What you'll learn: The programme is made up of six work based learning modules: Personal and Professional Development through Work Based Learning; Organisational Issues in Practice; People Issues in Practice; Change Issues in Practice; Quality Issues in Practice; and an Integrated Work Based Learning Project.

**Note:** You need to be in full or part-time employment with access to the internet.

**Note:** This is a unique programme, designed specifically for holders of an HND (or equivalent qualification/experience) in employment who wish to top up their diploma to a degree, providing real benefits to both student and employer.

Glasgow Caledonian University has developed Work Based Learning modules to allow a holder of a Higher National Diploma or equivalent to complete a degree in as little as 12 months, through linking academic studies to learning in the workplace. Workshops are held on Tuesday evenings at the city centre campus.

This programme is work-based so students must be employed.

#### Why Caledonian?

The programme is currently unique to Scotland in offering a work based learning route to achieving an undergraduate degree. It is designed to improve the learning and development skills that can contribute to both your personal development and to your work. These skills will also enable you to design and complete an Integrated Work Based Project relating to your role at work. Throughout the programme, students play a major role in designing

their own assessments based upon work activities.

The BA by Learning Contract offers a top-up programme from HND to degree level. Modules will be delivered through workshops, supported study and work-based and online activities. This programme is delivered on Tuesday evenings, two modules at a time.
