106 HOW TO APPLY Australian Catholic University is one of Australia's leading and fastest-growing public universities. With more than 22,000 students at six campuses across Victoria (Ballarat and Melbourne), New South Wales (North Sydney and Strathfield), Queensland (Brisbane) and ACT (Canberra), we have a strong national presence within Australia.

Not only is ACU a leader in the fields of education, health sciences, human services and theology, we have also established a reputation for quality and innovative teaching across several disciplines such as Arts • Business

- Information Systems Education
- English Language Environmental Science Exercise Science Marketing
- Media and Visual Arts Nursing
- Psychology Social Sciences Theology Visual Arts and Design.

Our specialist undergraduate and postgraduate courses are specifically tailored to address the requirements of a workplace, making it possible for our students to find excellent placements and graduate employment. Many of our students find that this, combined with the opportunity to engage with the society around them through our community initiatives, offers them the opportunity to add to their skills and gain a variety of real life experience.

ACU was established in 1991 as the result of the amalgamation of four Catholic tertiary institutions with histories dating back to the mid-

community, these institutions specialised in providing training in teaching and nursing – a legacy ACU has upheld.

As an academic institution, we place ourselves against the historical backdrop of the Catholic intellectual tradition woven from two thousand years of living faith and reflection. Today, ACU emulates the same spirit of intellectual and philosophical inquiry by encouraging a dialogue among disciplines as diverse as philosophy, business and science.

As a social institution, ACU's ethos derives from values of social and moral responsibility, ethics and social justice, dignity for all human beings, and the common good. At ACU, we believe that this development is as much about recognising and addressing our responsibilities as members of a larger community, as academic achievement. Most of our courses place emphasis on ethics and social values, and we have a thriving community-engagement program that brings together our staff and students to work collaboratively, both locally and internationally, for various social causes.

ACU is Australia's only public Catholic university and is part of the government-funded national system of Australian universities. Our degrees are recognised within the Australian Qualifications Framework, which is the Australian Government regulation body for education and training qualifications.

The University is registered with the Commonwealth Register of Institutions and Courses for Overseas Students (CRICOS), which gives us authorisation to enrol international students.

ACU is also a member of the International Federation of Catholic Universities, giving us valuable connections and networks around the globe. In addition, we also have more than 150 international partner universities, offering both staff and students exchange and study abroad options across Asia, Europe, USA and beyond.

We welcome students from all walks of life, regardless of nationality, culture or religious background. With almost 3,500 international students, we pride ourselves on a high national ranking for both Indigenous participation and cultural diversity.

Travelling to a foreign country to study can be a challenge. At ACU we understand this and aim to maximise your learning and development opportunities, and make you feel at home. We offer a number of academic and social support services to ensure that you are always looked after and are in the best position to achieve your academic and personal goals.

DEDICATED SERVICES FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

You will find dedicated ACU International Offices in Brisbane, North Sydney and Melbourne. At ACU International you will be able to access staff that can offer specifically tailored advice for international students as well as offer free advice on enrolment and course selection, accommodation, finance and general advice on student visas. Across all of our campuses, you will also have access to a network of International Student Advisors who are available to assist and support international students with a variety of issues, both academic and personal.

AIRPORT PICK -UP

ACU's Airport Reception service is available to all international students. We will meet

you at the airport and provide you with a one-way transfer from the airport. To learn more about this service, please visit www.acu.edu.au/international.

INTERNATIONAL ORIENTATION

International students receive a comprehensive orientation program to familiarise them with university procedures, Australian study methods and social customs and culture. Campus tours and "welcome events" are also part of the international student induction.

ACCOMMODATION

Most Australian students living away from their families share apartments or houses with other students. The International Student Advisers at ACU can provide advice about accommodation options suitable for your needs.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE PROGRAMS

English Language Centres are run in Melbourne, Sydney and Brisbane. We offer programs to enable you to meet the University's entrance requirements.

OFFICE OF STUDENT SUCCESS

Imagine, Believe, and Succeed!

This dedicated office incorporates the Academic Skills Unit, Career Development Service, Counselling Service, the Equity & Disability Unit and Campus Life, meaning that if you need support in any of these areas you will usually find it in one place.

CAREERS ADVICE AND GUIDANCE

Through the Career Development Service, Careers Advisers are available on each of ACU's campuses to assist students with career development and/or employment-related decisions.

We offer individual appointments, group workshops, seminars, print, and web-based career and employment related resources. Careers Advisers can also assist you in developing your career direction and making informed career decisions.

Career Advisers can provide advice to help students gain skills to find employment and how to access information on part-time, graduate and full-time employment opportunities through the online resource, CareersHub.

COUNSELLING SERVICE

A confidential counselling service is available to all students to provide support across a broad range of issues, both personal and academic. ACU Counsellors can provide support with stress-management, grief, depression and relationship difficulties, as well as referral to support services outside of the University.

ACADEMIC SKILLS SUPPORT

Each of our campuses has an Academic Skills Unit with advisers who can assist you to study successfully at university. The Academic Skills Advisers help you to develop learning, writing and language strategies through free workshops, individual and group consultations, and online and print resources.

DISABILITY SERVICES

Each campus has a Disability Adviser who assists students with disabilities or long-term medical conditions to fully participate in the life of the University. This free service identifies and coordinates provision of appropriate individual educational adjustments. Students are encouraged to contact the Disability Adviser as soon as possible and preferably before arriving in Australia. Students accessing the service need to provide relevant documentation, from a qualified treating health professional, which verifies the nature of the medical condition or disability.

CAMPUS LIFE

Across all six campuses, Campus Life staff are dedicated to offering you the very best in student experience through the facilitation of an enjoyable, diverse and caring campus culture incorporating many of the student-led activity groups such as ACUMates and our student association, ACUNSA.

CAMPUS MINISTRY

Campus ministers facilitate a range of activities including opportunities for prayer, reflection and retreats, leadership formation, 'Exploring the Mission of ACU' workshops, pastoral care, opportunities to be involved in social justice and community engagement, and a weekly Eucharist celebration.

SCHOLARSHIPS

INTERNATIONAL STUDENT SCHOLARSHIP

ACU offers scholarships for 50% of the full-time tuition fees for up to 20 international students commencing undergraduate or postgraduate coursework programs each year. We also offer full tuition scholarships (plus generous stipend) for up to two international students commencing research degrees each year.

International Student Scholarships are awarded on the basis of academic merit. Each scholarship will be awarded for the duration of the recipient's course, subject to satisfactory academic progress.

The scholarship does not cover visa application costs, Overseas Student Health Cover, air fares, accommodation, excursions, text or reference books, conferences or other costs the student may incur in pursuing his/her course or in travelling to or from Australia and the campus at which he/she is studying.

Applications for 2013 will be accepted from 1 September until 30 September 2012.

FACULTY OF BUSINESS EXECUTIVE DEAN'S SCHOLARSHIP

The Faculty of Business offers scholarships for all international students who commence full time study of a Faculty of Business program in 2013. The scholarship is valued at up to \$8,000 (depending on duration of course).

- + The Scholarship will subsidise tuition fees by AUD \$1,000 in the first semester of study.
- + Upon successful completion of all enrolled units, tuition fees in the next semester will also be subsidised by AUD \$1,000.
- The Scholarship will continue for all semesters in the program, providing successful completion of units is maintained.

Applications do not need to be submitted for this scholarship. ACU International Admissions will issue the scholarship to all eligible students.

ELICOS SCHOLARSHIP OFFER

Australian Catholic University offers a 10+2 scholarship to all international students commencing English Language Programs in 2013. This means that for every 12 weeks of study, students will pay for 10 weeks, and receive two weeks free.

Applications do not need to be submitted for this scholarship. ACU International Admissions will issue the scholarship to all eligible students.

INTERNATIONAL POSTGRADUATE RESEARCH SCHOLARSHIP (IPRS)

The IPRS is the main scholarship funded by the Commonwealth Government for international students, and is administered by ACU. These scholarships are open to international students applying for Higher Research Degrees.

The scholarship covers tuition fees for up to three years and includes a stipend (valued at AUD \$25,000 in 2012) as a living allowance.

Applications for 2013 will be accepted until 31 October 2012.


OUR CAMPUSES


GANBERRA



POPULATION OF NSW 7.23 million*




POPULATION OF SYDNEY

A five-minute train ride over the famous Sydney Harbour Bridge from Sydney's city centre, the campus is conveniently located in the North Sydney business precinct. North Sydney campus life is centred around a large outdoor courtyard and student recreational area where students congregate between classes. The campus is small, multicultural and friendly, and is accessible by excellent bus and train services.

Situated in one of the older, established suburbs in Sydney, the Strathfield campus is located 15 kilometres west of the Sydney city centre. 



ACU's Melbourne campus is conveniently located on the fringe of Melbourne's Central Business District (CBD). It is a short walk from the popular and bustling Brunswick Street and Smith Street, known best for their cafes, shops and art galleries. Some of Melbourne's finest parks, gardens and recreational facilities are also within easy walking distance of the campus. The main campus building is a multi-storey complex that has been completely renovated to provide students and staff with purpose-built facilities. It is a modern, compact study environment that bustles with activity throughout the week.

A new \$75 million building is due to be opened at the Melbourne Campus in May 2012. Aiming for a 6 Green Star Energy rating, the National Centre for Health and Wellbeing will incorporate rainwater harvesting and wind turbines as part of ACU's environmentally sustainable initiatives. It will also include state-of-the-art learning facilities, gym, bookshop, chapel, student centre and rooftop garden.



BRISBANE

Brisbane is Australia's fastest-growing city and the state capital of Queensland. As with the rest of Queensland, Brisbane is well known for its coastline, sandy white beaches and sunny blue skies.

FITZROY HOMEWORK SUPPORT PROGRAM (HSP)

ACU students from each campus participate in the Homework Support Program for children from refugee and disadvantaged backgrounds. The Homework Support Program is more than capacity building; it is a pathway to social inclusion through education.

In Fitzroy (Melbourne), more than 100 local primary school children meet at the Atherton Gardens Housing Estate every week for one-on-one or group help with their homework, which promotes literacy, numeracy and social connection. The majority of children have Vietnamese, Chinese, or African backgrounds, and speak 15 different languages.

EXPLORING ARTS TOGETHER

Creative sparks were flying at ACU's Melbourne Campus when more than 80 children of refugee background recently participated in Explore Arts Together (EAT) – a community-based arts project designed to promote inclusiveness and social learning. The program was a collaborative initiative among ACU's Institute for Advancing Community Engagement (IACE), the Melbourne Institute for Experiential & Creative Arts Therapy (MIECAT), Campus Ministry and ACU staff and students

The children joined more than 20 Education and Visual Arts and Design students for a day of experiential art activities. Together, they explored the arts through a variety of mediums – painting, photography, sculpture, drawing and music – to find meaning in their own experience and life story. The artwork was showcased at the Melbourne Campus providing an opportunity for public viewing.

IN THE OUTBACK

Ten Health Sciences students and a lecturer from ACU's Ballarat Campus recently visited Tennant Creek in the Northern Territory as part of a study unit on Indigenous health. The program ran for two weeks and involved working with the local community on a wide range of health activities such as drug and alcohol prevention, infectious diseases

screening, mental health care, and mother and baby care. The students also spent quality time at the local hospital.

ACU STUDENTS DEVELOP COMMUNITY PROJECTS FOR NORTH CANBERRA

Students from ACU's Canberra Campus recently presented their research findings on specific community development projects to Northside Community Service (NCS). The 16 students have been designing community development projects for North Canberra as part of their final year of social work studies. The project briefs placed emphasis on real life projects including new suburbs, a playgroup for children with a disability, community garden mentoring program and an autism Spectrum Disorders support group.

Through the Vice Chancellor's Travel Grant, he received financial assistance from ACU which paid for the cost of flights to the US. Emil returned to Boston in late 2011 to complete exams that will provide him with extra accreditation to work with athletes in the US.

COME FROM YOUR HOME UNIVERSITY TO STUDY PART OF YOUR DEGREE AT ACU

STUDY ABROAD

The ACU Study Abroad program is open to students from any recognised university or college outside Australia. It offers you an opportunity to study at ACU for a short duration as part of your degree program.

As a Study Abroad student, you can choose to enrol for full-time studies at any of the six ACU campuses in Australia for either one or two semesters. A flat fee will be charged by the University to cover the cost of tuition.

It is recommended that you discuss your Study Abroad plans with an adviser at your home institution before applying, and find out if your home institution will allow you to transfer credits for units studied at ACU.

STUDY ABROAD + INTERNSHIP

At ACU you can enhance your study abroad experience by combining a practical internship placement with academic study. The ACU Study and Internship program is available at our Brisbane Campus. It allows you to enrol in 2–3 elective units while also taking a professional internship at a local company. You will gain experience in an Australian workplace and take home academic credit upon completion of your semester at ACU.

STUDY ABROAD + COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

INBOUND STUDENT EXCHANGE

The ACU Inbound Student Exchange program is only open to eligible students who are enrolled at one of our official exchange partner universities or colleges. If you are not sure whether your home institution has a student exchange agreement with ACU, check our partner website for details: www.acu.edu.au/63517.

As an exchange student you can enrol in full-time studies at ACU for one or two semesters with the approval of your home institution. You are not required to pay tuition fees to ACU, but you will usually still pay your regular fees at your home university. Your exchange application must be approved by the international office at your home institution before you apply to ACU. In most cases, your international office will then submit your details to us on your behalf.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND STUDY ABROAD

At ACU, we understand that even if you are eligible to enrol in our Study Abroad or Exchange program you may need some extra English language support. We have designed a range of English language programs to suit your needs. Our students are allowed to take one or more English classes during the ACU Study

Abroad or Exchange semester. More information about the ACU English language programs can be found on page 18.

COURSE STRUCTURE

This course enables students to develop fluency, accuracy and confidence in listening, speaking, reading and writing in English in everyday situations. It is designed for students who require English for general communication in their jobs or social life, or who need to improve their English language skills before moving on to an academic English program.

Students in General English will develop:

- + Confidence in listening, speaking, reading and writing English through tasks relevant to their interests:
- + Accuracy in speaking and writing through extending their knowledge of English grammar and pronunciation;
- An understanding of Australian society and culture through activities in the classroom and off campus, such as excursions to places of interest.

COURSE STRUCTURE

IELTS Test Preparation aims to prepare students to take the Academic Module of

the IELTS Test or ACU English Test. It focuses on giving students a clear understanding of the IELTS Test and the skills and strategies they need to be successful. The course is organised around a series of topics that match those commonly found in the IELTS Test, such as technology, society and the environment.

Students in IELTS Test Preparation will develop:

 Confidence and fluency to communicate on a wide variety of topics;

- The ability to quickly and accurately explain information and express opinions;
- Listening skills to cope with a range of situations;
- The skills needed to quickly read and comprehend complex articles.

Students who successfully complete the 12-week IELTS Test Preparation program may expect to improve their overall IELTS level by at least 0.5 band.



COURSE DESCRIPTION

The Bachelor of Psychological Science provides the first step for career preparation to be a professional psychologist. Potential psychologists require three years of approved undergraduate training before becoming eligible to enter postgraduate study and eventual registration as a psychologist. For those who wish to move in alternative career directions, completion of the Bachelor of Psychological Science will offer potential employment in a broad range of areas including counselling, human resources and marketing, child welfare, community work and education.

An important aspect of the course is its currency in meeting the need to equip future psychologists with the skills necessary for professional practice in the rapidly changing, increasingly multicultural global society. The

course includes an Indigenous/multicultural issues component in all units.

PROFESSIONAL RECOGNITION

The Bachelor of Psychological Science is recognised by the Australian Psychology Accreditation Council as an accredited three-year undergraduate degree in Psychology.

COURSE STRUCTURE

Students must complete 240 credit points from:

THAI-BURMA BORDER PROGRAM

A partnership between the University, Open Universities Australia and the Association of Jesuit Colleges and Universities, this program offers distance tertiary education to refugees living in a camp of 145,000 people on the Thai–Burma border. The program generates hope in the disadvantaged communities which it services; many of the graduates who remain in Thailand continue to work for refugees and migrants, while those who resettle in other countries are able to gain entry to university with a scholarship on the basis of their ACU testamur.



On 6th August 2010, in a remote town on the Thai side of the Thai–Burma border, 16 young Burmese refugees graduated with the ACU Diploma in Liberal Studies.







PATHWAY ONLY

Tertiary Preparation Program (Health Sciences) is intended as a pathway leading to the ACU

Bachelor of Nursing, Bachelor of Exercise and Health Science, and Bachelor of Exercise and Sports Science programs. Students who do not qualify for direct entry into a degree program may enter after successful completion of the Tertiary Preparation Program (Health Sciences).

This course, while not designed to be a professional qualification for health sciences, is designed to prepare students to successfully pursue their academic studies in the area of the health professions using effective English language communication skills. Opportunities are provided for students to develop the communication skills used as a health practitioner. In particular, students will explore the language of medicine, verbal and written material, communication with patients and their relatives, and how to deal with issues in the health professions.

Students will be introduced to critical thinking and problem solving. Emphasis will be placed

on working independently and as a team member, on self-directedness, and on building confidence.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The Bachelor of Occupational Therapy aims to provide students with the theoretical knowledge and practical skills to become competent and effective practitioners of occupational therapy. Occupational therapy is a profession that promotes the health and wellbeing of individuals, groups, organisations and communities through participation in their daily activities. Occupational therapists work with a range of individuals from children to the elderly who, due to injury, illness, disease or disability, have a physical, psychological or social barrier to this participation. Occupational therapists work with these individuals to assess their environment and help them adapt and continue to participate in daily activities which are meaningful to them. Occupational therapy is practiced in a wide range of settings including: hospitals, community health centres, people's homes, workplaces, schools, rehabilitation centres and aged-care facilities.

PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE

Students must participate in clinical experience to become a registered occupational therapist. Within the four-year course there are two components: fieldwork and supervised clinical placements.

FIELDWORK (YEARS 1-3)

During the first three years of study, students will be required to undertake assignments that involve going out into the community and interacting with health-care consumers. These practical learning experiences will provide exposure to the role of an occupational therapist.

CLINICAL PLACEMENTS

Students will complete a minimum of 1,000 hours of supervised clinical placements in a range of settings. This experience will help equip graduates with the skills and practical knowledge to be competent and successful in practice.



Young people were taken out of their comfort zones and had their preconceptions challenged recently through the annual Young Muslim Leadership Program at ACU's Strathfield Campus. Workshops focused on faith-based leadership and the different ways to exercise leadership while remaining authentic both to the Islamic faith and Australian citizenship. Speakers from both the Islamic and non-Islamic communities shared their experience and wisdom with the group.








ACU RESEARCH CENTRES

ACU actively promotes informed debate and community engagement as part of our research programs. We have six University Priority Research Centres and a number of emerging research strengths. ASIA-PACIFIC CENTRE FOR INTER-RELIGIOUS DIALOGUE

The Asia-Pacific Centre for Inter-Religious Dialogue (APCID) aims, through research and scholarship, learning and teaching, and community engagement, to promote dialogue, mutual understanding, respect and collaboration among Christians and followers of other religions. A major objective is to make a sustained intellectual contribution to such dialogue from the perspective of the Catholic tradition, and to foster similar intellectual enquiry in other-faith traditions.

CARDIOVASCULAR RESEARCH CENTRE

The Cardiovascular Research Centre (CvRC) was established in 2009 as a joint collaboration among St Vincent's Hospital Melbourne, ACU and the University of Melbourne. It conducts interdisciplinary research using a collaborative approach – with results being directly integrated into clinical practice.

CENTRE FOR CREATIVE AND AUTHENTIC LEADERSHIP

The Centre for Creative and Authentic Leadership undertakes research, consultancies, leadership development programs and reviews of educational systems. The focus areas are: Moral and Ethical Leadership, Leadership for Social Justice and Social Responsibility, Leadership Capabilities, Indigenous Leadership, Intercultural Leadership, Leadership for Learning and Multi-Level Leadership.

CENTRE FOR EARLY CHRISTIAN STUDIES

The Centre for Early Christian Studies is a research and teaching centre with expertise in the fields of biblical studies, church history, art history, Christian literature, and Christian languages (Greek, Latin, Coptic, Arabic, Syriac, Armenian and Chinese) from the period of the New Testament to the eighth century.

CENTRE OF PHYSICAL ACTIVITY ACROSS THE LIFESPAN

The Centre of Physical Activity Across the Lifespan (CoPAAL) conducts research into the role of exercise in preventative medicine and sports science. The aim is to advance the understanding of how physical activity can make a difference to health outcomes across the lifespan.

GOLDING CENTRE FOR WOMEN'S HISTORY, THEOLOGY AND SPIRITUALITY

The Golding Centre for Women's History, Theology and Spirituality is building more comprehensive understandings of the contributions of women from historical perspectives, in particular in regard to social and cultural aspects of their thoelogies and spirituality.

INSTITUTE OF CHILD PROTECTION STUDIES

The Institute of Child Protection aims to enhance the wellbeing of children, young people and families through quality research, evaluation, training and community education. The Institute links research and practice through collaborative partnerships, with a commitment to prevention, early intervention and tertiary services, with a particular emphasis on participatory research methods.

MATHEMATICS TEACHING AND LEARNING RESEARCH CENTRE

The Mathematics Teaching and Learning Research Centre promotes quality research and a national perspective on mathematics teaching and learning. Using local, national and international linkages, members of the Centre are committed to addressing and raising the social and ethical dimensions of mathematics education, and providing advice to government, education systems and professional organisations on policy development.

NATIONAL CENTRE FOR CLINICAL OUTCOMES RESEARCH

The National Centre for Clinical Outcomes Research (NACCOR) conducts rigorous, collaborative and multi-disciplinary programs of international and national nursing, midwifery and health services research across five priority areas: acute care, chronic care, innovative healthcare delivery, implementation research and vulnerable communities.

PASTORAL PROJECTS OFFICE

The mission of the Pastoral Projects Office is to assist the Catholic Church in Australia at all levels in understanding the cultural, social and personal dimensions of religion in the changing contemporary context.

PLUNKETT CENTRE FOR ETHICS

The Plunkett Centre aims to advance knowledge and understanding of the ethical standards relevant to human health and wellbeing, and in particular to clinical practice, medical research, business and management practices in healthcare, and the allocation of healthcare resources. It is a joint centre of the ACU and St Vincent's and Mater Health Sydney.

QUALITY OF LIFE AND SOCIAL JUSTICE RESEARCH CENTRE

The Quality of Life and Social Justice Research Centre conducts research related to improving health and wellbeing outcomes for Australians, especially for disadvantaged groups including those with an intellectual disability and seniors, and promotes community engagement, social and family policy and youth spirituality.

SIMERR ACT

Applicants require a Master's degree in Education or equivalent, with an average of Credit or equivalent; at least five years' relevant work experience; and two confidential referee reports attesting as to the applicants suitability as a candidate for the degree and their capacity to complete the thesis (at least one must be an academic reference; one may relate to the applicant's professional experience). Applicants also require an overall academic IELTS score of 6.5 (with no subtest less than 6.0).

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The Doctor of Education (EdD) provides an advanced course of study at the doctoral level in common with the traditional Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) degree. The EdD is research-based but concerned with the reflective application of advanced knowledge to problems of professional practice. The degree is designed for professionals who wish to expand their theoretical bases for practice, to analyse current ideas and issues, and to address problems in educational practice. Three coursework units provide structured training and support to the development of the thesis. Participants are encouraged to take up research questions that are relevant to their current or projected career interests.

An Interview with Nicamil Kalalang Sanchez, Philippines

PhD student and Australian Leadership Awardee 2011

WHY HAVE YOU SELECTED TO DO YOUR PHD AT AUSTRALIAN CATHOLIC UNIVERSITY?

As a recipient of the prestigious Australian Leadership Awards 2011, the University's mission is based on forming students to become professionals and leaders in their own field. ACU is my first choice because of its seasoned lecturers in the field of social sciences and its long tradition of Catholic education. Also, ACU has the most extensive international network with other Catholic universities around the world, and it is currently pursuing collaborations through exchange programs that are beneficial for its students as they have an international experience of living and studying. Lastly, I believe that ACU is the primary university in forming citizens with character, integrity, and honour.

WHAT DO YOU LIKE ABOUT ACU?

ACU is proactive and sensitive to the needs of its students as

well as the community. I share the mission of the University in promoting positive change at communities through innovative research and advancement of knowledge in different areas, and ultimately, to be of service to people. Also, ACU is pioneering community engagement that provides opportunity to disadvantaged individuals to pursue their university education. Furthermore, ACU develops a culture of caring for one another to ensure that students will have a worthwhile experience.

TELL US ABOUT YOUR RESEARCH TOPIC AND WHY YOU WANTED TO INVESTIGATE THAT AREA?

My research topic is about successful ageing and its implications to the social work knowledge and practice. Population ageing is a worldwide phenomenon that will affect both developed and developing countries, and will have a greater impact on countries like the Philippines. Successful ageing is a life-long journey which requires preparation to adapt to an environment of being an older person: maintain independence, age well, and continuously participate and interact. The wider aim of my study is to provide empirical evidence as well as deeper understanding of successful ageing in the Philippines. The findings of my study will be useful in influencing the Philippines' social welfare policy and program, and contribute to social work knowledge and practice with older persons.

DOING A PHD MUST BE QUITE DEMANDING! HOW DO YOU BALANCE YOUR RESEARCH WORK AND SOCIAL LIFE?

The secret is to invest about 30 hours per week to finish in four years. A PhD dissertation is like a triathlon that every athlete is dreaming to complete – it requires preparation; I organize my personal schedule through planning for daily, weekly and monthly goals. One of them is to maintain quality relationships with friends and loved ones via Skype or Facebook in the Philippines, and going out on the weekends or for a coffee after work. Additionally, I always remind myself of the word "Life". For me that means that my PhD journey is about living a life that is inspiring, fulfilling and exciting. The dissertation is a significant chapter of my life and should not be a hindrance to maintain quality relationships.

WHAT ADVICE WOULD YOU LIKE TO GIVE TO OUR FUTURE PHD STUDENTS?

Continue to be passionate, caring, idealistic, and most importantly, step forward to make a difference. Don't lose your passion in searching for new knowledge, and remember to care about what's happening in your community and the society at large, and most importantly, contribute toward the improvement of quality of life. At the Canberra Campus, we have initiated the "Meeting of Minds", which is a monthly forum to encourage interaction among postgraduate students, and it is open to all students who are thinking of doing a higher degree course. Remember the saying that "there are many called, but few are chosen".

FEES

DIPLOMA AND DEGREE PROGRAMS

TOTAL REFUNDS

A total refund will be made in the following circumstances:

- + If an offer of a place is withdrawn by the University all tuition fees are fully refundable. If the offer was made on the basis of incorrect or incomplete information being supplied by the applicant/student the University reserves the right to retain 10% of one full semester fees and the diploma enrolment fee.
- + ACU is unable to provide or ceases to provide the course for which the student has applied or is enrolled.
- A student who fails to meet degree/ diploma progression rules and who is thus not permitted to re-enrol will be eligible for a refund of those fees paid in advance of notification of exclusion.

PARTIAL REFUNDS

If a student, after accepting an offer of a place, informs the University of an intention to withdraw, the University will provide a refund but will retain a percentage of the semester fee to cover administrative costs. This fee is determined by the amount of notice given, as follows:

- Four weeks or more notice before the commencement of the course will invoke an administrative fee of 10% of one full semester fees; and
- Less than four weeks' notice before course commencement will invoke an administrative fee of 50% of one full semester fees.

NO REFUNDS

A student who withdraws from a course, for whatever reason, after the fourth teaching week of the course will not be eligible for a refund. Students who are granted permanent resident status during the course are required to pay the fees for the remainder of the semester in which they are currently enrolled.

REFUND PROCESS

Any student who wishes to obtain a refund on the above or any other grounds should make an application in writing to the Associate Director, International Admissions and Student Relations for a decision by the Executive Director, International. If the student is not satisfied with a decision of the Director, appeals should be made in writing to the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Administration and Resources). Refunds will be made in Australian dollars and the University reserves the right to make refunds payable in the country of origin. Agency fees, if applicable, will not be refunded. In the case of an approved transfer to another educational institution any balance of fees will be sent to that institution upon request. This agreement does not remove the student's right to take further action under Australia's consumer protection laws. The University's dispute resolution processes do not circumscribe the student's right to pursue other legal remedies.



RELEASE POLICY

Approvals for release to enrol at another education provider are not automatic. Students must formally apply for approval from the Executive Director, International or delegate. A copy of the new provider's offer letter must be included with the request. Students do not require a release letter under the ESOS Act 2000 once they have completed six calendar months of their principal course (i.e. Bachelor Degree rather than pathway program).

REFUSALS

The University will not grant release letters in the following circumstances:

- If students commencing their principal course wish to transfer from a higher-level course to a lower-level course (i.e. Degree to Diploma);
- + If the request is considered detrimental to the student's wellbeing; or

+ If the student is indebted to the University.

Students who are refused have the right to appeal in accordance with the University's complaints and grievance process.

APPROVALS

Release letters will normally be issued on the basis of the following criteria:

- The University not being able to provide a course;
- The student not being able to proceed in their course due to prerequisite and or academic progression problems;
- + Completion of one full academic session; or
- + Written advice supporting a change from a government sponsor.

ACADEMIC INFORMATION

ACADEMIC PROGRESS

A student's enrolment in a course may be deferred, suspended or cancelled in accordance with University regulations. These regulations are detailed in the yearly handbook, accessible via: www.acu.edu.au/142401.

ASSESSMENT METHODS

Assessment at ACU may include a range of methods such as formal end of semester examinations, continuous assessment throughout the semester, written assignments, essays, and field trips/projects. Students will be advised at the commencement of their studies as to what methods will be used.

PROFESSIONAL RECOGNITION

Students should check with the professional bodies in their own country in regard to the recognition of courses which they undertake outside their country, to ensure that they meet local professional standards and guidelines.

CREDIT TRANSFER

ACU may grant credit or advanced standing for a student's previous tertiary studies and/or recognised prior learning. The maximum amount of credit which can be awarded is normally:

- + Up to two thirds of an undergraduate qualification, depending on the program for which entry is sought; or
- + Up to half of a postgraduate qualification, depending on the program for which entry is sought.

Credit is normally assessed at the time of enrolment, not at the time of application.
Credit will not be granted for any academic study completed more than seven years before admission to candidature.

APPLYING FOR CREDIT

International students seeking to apply for credit or advanced standing should bring with them as much information as possible about the courses already studied, including certified academic transcripts in English with full subject descriptions. Upon commencement of studies at the University, students will need to liaise with their Course Coordinator to formalise recognition for prior learning or any credit advised at the application stage.

SEMESTER TIMETABLE

Semester One commences 1st week in February and finishes 3rd week in June.

Semester Two commences 2nd week in July and finishes 2nd week in November.

This information is a guide only. Students who do not arrive in time for the commencement of semester will miss essential orientation information.

VISA INFORMATION

ABOUT STUDENT VISAS

Student visas generally last for the period of the course, and are granted on the condition that students must leave Australia soon after completion of their studies. The University is required to report any student who does not attend classes or who is not making satisfactory academic progress. International students are required to complete the course within the minimum duration as provided on the eCOE. If you wish to stay in Australia for the graduation ceremony (which takes place early in the year after completion of a course) you may need to apply in Australia for a visitor class visa.

FAMILY (DEPENDANTS)

If you intend to bring family members with you to Australia, you should first check with your nearest Australian Consular Office whether your visa allows for this. While you are in Australia, you will be responsible for supporting any dependants (i.e. family members). Tuition fees must be paid for school-age dependants who study in Australia.

STUDENTS WHO OBTAIN PERMANENT RESIDENT VISA STATUS

If you are granted permanent resident status after commencing a semester as an

international student, that semester of study may be completed but it will be necessary to reapply for the course as a local student for subsequent semesters. Although every consideration will be given, there is no guarantee that you would be accepted back into the course, as the quotas for international students and local students are separate. After becoming a permanent resident you would be liable to pay the local fees from the date of permanent residence, unless it is after the relevant semester census date. In this case you would be liable for local fees from the subsequent semester onwards.

LIVING IN AUSTRALIA

The cost of living varies from city to city. Students require approximately AUD\$18,000 per year for living expenses. This covers accommodation, food and transport, but does not allow for luxuries, entertainment or a car. In addition, an initial establishment cost is usually needed to cover rental bonds for accommodation, furniture, electricity and telephone expenses. Other expenses may include textbooks and study aids.

OVERSEAS STUDENTS HEALTH COVER (OSHC)

The Australian Government requires all international students and their dependants to obtain health insurance for the duration of their visas. Visa-length cover must be paid with the first semester's tuition fee. OSHC covers 85% of the government-scheduled fees for private doctors, pathology and x-rays. Students must make up the shortfall. Please note: OSHC will not cover any pre-existing conditions (ie those which existed within 18 months before the student began study). The University's preferred OSHC provider is Worldcare: www.oshcworldcare.com.au.

EXTRAS

Travel Concessions State Government travel concessions are available to international students in Queensland and the Australian Capital Territory.

HOMESTAY

Homestay offers international students the opportunity to live in a local home while studying in Australia. By living with an Australian family you will improve your English and get a closer understanding of Australian life. Students should budget approximately AUD\$250–270 per week for Homestay, which

includes utilities and most meals. A placement fee of AUD\$230 is also payable.

ACCOMMODATION

PRIVATE RENTALS

You may choose to live in private rental accommodation near your campus. If necessary, your International Student Adviser can advise you on how to find a suitable property. You should budget approximately AUD\$120–150 per week to rent a property shared with others. Utilities and food are not included.
